ABOUT THE VILLAGES - The Villages is built on 153 acres of old orchard in San Jose in the southeast part of town.

Two courses comprise the acreage 1 - 9 hole pitch and putt course 1 - 18 hole championship course. There are 8 man-made lakes on the course. It plays 6,266 yards from the regular tees and 6,596 from the championship, Par 72, Rated 69.2.

Greens average 6,000 square feet, trapped moderately.

Jim says beware of the Par 3 #6, there is a lake on the right, OB on the left, prevailing wind from the NW.

He also has something that very few of us or probably none of us have -- that is 300 private owned golf carts.

He has asked me to pass on this information to anyone playing golf on April 10 and using electric carts <u>PLEASE</u> obey all rules, please stay out of all roped off areas, stay away from all greens at least 50 feet and stay on paths as much as possible.

T. A. R. P. By Clifford A. Wagoner, CGCS, Del Rio C.C. Modesto

The Turfgrass Adaptive Research Program was initiated at the request of the Golf Course Superintendent members. Those of us who presented this idea to the Northern California Golf Association and the University of California Extension Service envisioned this as a tool to aid us in our quest for information which would help us provide the golfers with better playing conditions. This program has certainly done just this for the Superintendent who has taken the time and interest to attend meetings, conferences, and the two Asilomar Institutes. Several people in the University and Extension Service are spending a great deal of their personal time to make this program a success.

The NCGA has very generously provided funds through direct solicitation from clubs and from their treasury. They are interested in improving playing conditions so they agreed to invest in the program. This program is unique in many ways; first it is a cooperative program between three very distinct groups. It allows the golf course superintendent to name the projects which he believes are the most important to get information on. It provides the Northern California Golf Association the opportunity to plug in the projects they view as important to their member clubs, and it provides funds for the University Extension Service to carry out turf work and to educate students who are interested in turf management.

In all my travels these past few years I have not found any other program that resembles ours. At several meetings in the east our program has been talked about. References have been made to the sand and amendment studies and the publication. Last year I distributed the proceedings from the Institute to the executive committee of GCSAA and several good comments were made. Copies of the two films The Experimental Green and The Drainage System Installation were made available to GCSAA at a nominal cost and are in demand by universities, Chapters and individuals. The work here is recognized nationwide.

Northern California club officials are becoming more interested in the program because the NCGS Bluebook continues to feature it annually. Club officials continuously call those of us who are involved to find out how they can get help from the program.

The golf course superintendent is a key person at the club. Maintenance of the course is his responsibility and he should take every opportunity to explore reliable information. Changing conditions and regulations leave us no alternative but to pursue this diligently.

The program will continue only if we demonstrate an interest by attending meetings and applying the things which will improve our conditions, and by encouraging our clubs to contribute to the NCGA for TARP. At the March meeting GCSA of Northern California contributed \$500.00 to NCGA to be included in the fund.

Several area meetings will be held this year to disseminate information. You and your club will be notified in advance. I sincerely believe not a single golf course superintendent can afford to be absent. Come and bring a club official.

Those of you who did not attend the Pesticide Institute missed what I considered to have been the best week ever spent for learning purposes.

The 1975 Institute will deal with the many areas of personnell as it applies to the superintendent. Since a very large part of our budgets are expended for labor cost, it is very important that everyone attend. We are advised that commitments must be made earlier than in previous years so get your reservation in promptly. If not you may find no space available. DATES ARE MARCH 2-7, 1975 AT ASILOMAR.
