WHAT ARE OTHERS DOING? - by Bob Ford

Since our organization is for the betterment of turf and other related fields, maybe this newsletter would be a better way to spread the knowledge and experiences of others at their courses.

Many people in the turf industry concentrate so much on turf that other problems snowball into larger, more costly problems. Trees are a good example. Everyone takes them for granted until they die.

At Almaden, we now have a gigantic problem with Monterey Pines, Monterey Cypress, and Giant Sequoias. They have developed fungus diseases, pitch cankers, and insect infestations.

We are now working with Dr. Thomas of Forest Ag. and the J. J. Mauget Chemical Company, using 60 trees as a test plot. Injections of Stemix nutrient solution, Plant Vax Fungisol, E₃BC Fungisol, and MSR Insecticide are being fed into the trees. From the progress of our first indicator tree, it appears that many trees can and will be saved.
