1. Keep records or have available to you what weather you have month by month over a period of years so that you can hope to forecast what it will be like for a given month.
2. Use the most draught resistant varieties of grasses, compatable with your soil and area.

Any of you who are severely rationed know what I am saying and hope we never have to suffer through another year like this one.

CERTIFICATION CLASSES OFFERED - A certification training class is now open for registration for Golf Course Superintendents and their assistants. The class will provide preparation for the core certification test and workshops to prepare for specific category testing. The deadline for becoming certified is October 21, 1977. We have been informed that enforcement of this law will not start until January 1978. This course will include 12 hours of instruction and 4 hours of testing. The actual certification test will be administered by the State of California Department of Food and Agriculture at the conclusion of instruction on the second day. The instruction will include the core material preparation plus training in "Turf & Ornamental Pest Control" and Aquatic Pest Control." Testing for these two specific categories will also be offered on the second day.

Dates - October 20 and October 28 Time 8:00 A.M. - 5:00 P.M.

Place - Holiday Inn - Downtown, 282 Almaden Blvd, San Jose, CA

Cost - \$25.00 per registrant

Each registrant will receive the following:

1. Hot buffet lunch on both days.
2. "Laws and Regulations Study Guide" - State of California
3. "Apply Pesticides Correctly" - E.P.A.
4. "Pesticide Applicator and Safety Training" - University of California
5. Study guides for the six specific categories of certification
6. Chapter questions for review.

It is mandatory that registrants attend both days of instruction to be prepared to take the examinations. When you write up your specifications for that new item, keep these things in mind: Will it do the job you want it to? is your maintenance program adequate to maintain it? will the operator be able to handle it with a minimum amount of training?
