

things with probably more expensive equipment, more hand labor, and yes, probably with more increased water usage. Increased water usage you may say? A little fun fact that you may not know is that the hand/backpack blower was invented as a response/need resulting from the 1977 California drought. People couldn't hose off their driveways or sidewalks anymore and a need to keep areas clean and free of debris were realized. Hence the invention of the backpack blower and a savings of water usage. It would be probably safe to say that with these items gone from the California marketplace our water usage at our facilities would increase. Either that or we would have to use more manpower to keep clubhouse areas neat and tidy.

These two-cycle engine products attribute to only less than 1% of all the total air emissions in the state of California, yet make up over 8% of the total U.S. market in sales; a huge figure that suppliers and manufacturers wish to keep improving on. These suppliers/manufacturers that are fighting this proposed regulation change belong to an organization called PPEMA or The Portable Power Equipment Manufacturers Association. Hopefully with allied industry help the PPEMA will be able to stall and keep the CARB regulations of 81% reduction from being implemented. The CGCSA is presently being advised by our lobbyist, George Steffes, on how to response properly to this issue. More updates will be give as issues materialize.

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

Cantankerous Coots

his time of year, any golf course with a lake or pond is suffering through the mess and damage caused by our feathered friend — the coot. The Kanny brothers at River Ridge Golf Club compiled some excellent information on coot control that was published in California Fairways magazine (July/ August 1993, pp. 6-8) that might be helpful this time of year. The following article summarizes some of this information along with an update on other methods being tried in the Southwest.

Coots, or mudhens (Fulica americana) are migratory birds that come to the Southwest in the fall when the first cold front hits Canada. The birds normally arrive in September, with the highest populations normally evident from October through January. Any coots left over by April are here to stay. They damage trees and greens and other closely cut turf areas with their voracious feeding habits, nibbling the plant down to the root. The copious amount of excrement left behind by the coots is messy, disrupts the playability of greens, and tends to burn the more sensitive grasses such as Poa annua and creeping bentgrass. Coots are covered by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (16 U.S.C. 703-711) which allows the control of migratory birds, but only with a permit from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Coots are not covered by the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16U.S.C. 1539). The National Audubon Society concedes that coots can be a pest, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has encouraged depredation using authorized methods.

Where does that put us today? Coots are damaging our golf courses, but it is not politically correct to control them. What are your options? The following is a list of control measures to minimize coot damage on your course:

- · Shooting is the principle method of control, but is unpopular in urban settings due to noise, safety concerns, and public sentiment. Permits are normally required, and you should also contact the police or sheriff in your area before shooting.
- · Trapping with nets has been tried, but is somewhat unsuccessful.
- · Anesthetic bait has been used successfully to tranquilize the birds and remove them from the site for euthanization. This is a quiet operation and far less controversial than shooting the coots. Licensed pest control operators are available to perform this operation for you.
- · Harassment, using trained dogs, is somewhat successful for coots but better for Canada geese. Shoreline Golf Links in Mountain View, California, purchased a trained border collie to chase the coots, and they are very satisfied with the results.
- · Monofilament fishing line or barrier netting has been used around the edges of ponds with some success. The barrier is held by rebar stakes that are placed around the perimeter of the pond and angled back toward the water.
- · Noisemakers, such as scare shells or cannon, are not recommended for golf courses. The random noise is distracting

- to golfers and homeowners.
- In some instances, providing alternative food or habitat is effective. Jeff Stroup at Industry Hills Golf Courses has been able to keep coots away from the greens by piling grass clippings near the ponds (but away from play) for them to eat. It has also been suggested that providing a tall vegetative buffer at the edge of the lake helps keep the coots in the water and off the grass.

According to all the people I talked with, there are no totally effective methods to eliminate coots once and for all. The anesthetic baits are working the best at this time, but you should probably hire a licensed pest control operator in your area for this job to avoid hurting nontarget species. According to the Kanny's, it is necessary to use several methods to crate a hostile environment for the coots including harassment, barrier fences or netting, an shooting. Unfortunately, I am not aware of any research regarding coot control. For the moment, all you can do is be persistent and keep them nervous.

USGA News Notes: Speaking of cantankerous coots the Wester Region of the Green Section has been split, and Larry Gilhuly is now the Director of the Northwest Region. He will continue to cover the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Wyoming, Hawaii and British Columbia. Pat Gross was recently named the Director of the Southwest Region. As they have done for the past three years, Pat and Mike Huck will continue to serve the states of California, Nevada, Arizona, Utah and Colorado.

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

GCSAA Survey Reveals Member Superintendent Responsibilities, Perceptions, Attitudes

A recently-completed Golf Course Superintendents Association of America (GCSAA) survey indicates members at all types of golf facilities are heavily involved in administrative and financial decisions executed by themselves and/or management.

In measuring decision-making responsibilities, respondents were asked to rank their influence in numerous areas on a scale of 1 (having no impact at all) to 5 (being the decision maker). Golf course superintendents had the greatest influence in the areas of chemical application (94.4 percent listed No. 5), mowing and maintenance schedules (93.7 percent listed No. 5) and chemical product purchase decisions (96.0 percent listed No. 4 or No. 5).

The survey also revealed superintendents are influential in expenditures of capital equipment (93.3 percent listed No. 3 through No. 5) and equipment (97.4 percent listed No. 3 through No. 5). In terms of golf car purchases, 46.9 percent are influential in categories No. 3 through 5.

Naumann's NorCal News

Respondents also provided information as to the latest changes in the industry that have affected job performance. Results were divided by operating budget, with the lower end being less than \$250,000 annually and the upper end at more than \$700,000 annually. Regardless of budget level, one of the most frequent responses concerned providing conditions to meet the higher expectations of golfers while keeping within budgetary limits. Associated with that, facilities at all levels expressed a concern of finding and maintaining qualified labor to serve on golf course maintenance crews. A strong economy and non-traditional work schedule directly affect the available labor pool. Superintendents were virtually unanimous across the board in the positive impact alternative spikes have had in their work. Keeping abreast of the latest environmental issues was also a common response of all members.

Proposed Dues Increase To Appear On Ballot

The GCSANC Board of Directors unanimously approved a recommendation from the budget committee to place a dues increase before the membership on the April ballot. The budget committee' recommendation came after a thorough review of the GCSANC's current and projected financial status. Citing rising operational costs and the need to develop additional revenue for future programs Budget Committee Chairperson, Dave Davies, CGCS, proposed the following dues structure: Class A, B, C, and Associate - \$100.00. If approved, the budget committee proposed a similar increase for Affiliates of - \$145.00, Students - \$40.00, Retired - \$25.00, and Class A Life - no charge.

"The proposed fee schedule represents an approximate increase of 20% for Class A, B, C, and Associate members," Davies concluded. The voting member will have a chance to approve or disapprove the proposal at the Annual Meeting scheduled for April 6th at Castlewood Country Club.
