LITTLE THINGS Can Help Win the War

OUR NATION IS AT WAR! That means that you and I are at war just as truly as General MacArthur or any member of our own or our Allies' fighting forces. What are you going to do to help win that war?

Perhaps you think that you are not in a position to do anything of any value, but if you do, you're wrong! There is not a single one of us who cannot contribute service or time or money in some useful way. Even if you are a schoolboy or girl there are many ways you can help your country.

First of all, you must help yourself. You must be careful of your
health. The whole nation must be
extra strong in wartime, so that
every one will be capable of doing
extra hard work in the emergency. It may not sound to you
like much of a contribution . . .
just eating wisely and sleeping
regular hours . . . but it is one of
the first patriotic duties of every
citizen.

Then you can help the nation by helping those who are in positions of direct responsibility. For instance, if members of your family are in the service or are doing defense work of any kind, you should make every effort to relieve them of worry and to keep their time free from less important tasks. Look around your own household and see what little jobs you can do to make the rest time of working members of the family really restful, so that they will build up a reserve of strength and

do their work more efficiently. See if there are not some every-day chores that you can take over, so that others may give more time to Red Cross or Civilian Defense work. And seek out jobs you your-self can do for such organizations, even though you have limited time to offer. They need many hands to do small jobs, many feet to run errands, and every little help adds to the big help they are giving.

In direct contribution, of course, you cannot give too much or too little. Penny upon penny, dime upon dime, the total amounts grow amazingly fast when every one contributes. No war can be won, on the high seas or in the trenches or in the air, without financial support . . . supplied by the men and women, boys and girls at home. So remember that even your smallest savings put into Defense Stamps or Bonds is not too small to play its part in winning.

And most important of all, don't discount the importance of that little thing, confidence. No cocksureness, but strong faith that we shall win, will take us over the rough spots war is going to bring to our own lives sooner or later. Confidence will make our work and our sacrifices worthwhile. It will give us the courage to take bad news as well as good. We will have the vision to see beyond today and its efforts and worries to the glorious day when we can all say, "We, too, have fought a good fight and, all pulling together for the right cause . . . we have won!"

BUGLE SOUNDS, THE Wallace Beery is an old-time sergeant in the II. S. Cavalry who is heartbroken over giving up his horse for a tank when the division is mechanized. After an accident the Colonel suspects that saboteurs had tampered with the tanks and persuades Beery to violate all known Army regulations (this isn't difficult as he's a pretty tough hombre) in order to get himself discharged knowing that Beery will then probably be approached by the enemy agents to work for them. This is just what happens and how Beery foils them makes a timely story. (MGM).

GOLD RUSH, THE Charlie Chaplin made this picture before you were born and it was a classic of humor and sentiment. Now he has added dialogue in his own voice and all who remember the picture can scarcely wait to see it again. As for you, you're lucky to have this opportunity to know the Chaplin of younger and more light-hearted days. (U.A.)

HELLZAPOPPIN Here's as rany a dish as was ever set before a camera with four times four and twenty laughs in it. 
Billy Lee is one of the most talented of younger actors and with John Boles as his father they make such a likable pair you are bound
