How Two Boys With a Hobby Made Good

EVEN as children Leopold Damrosch Mannes and Leopold Godowsky, Jr., were expected to follow in the footsteps of their famous fathers and become great musicians—and they did. But they did more than this. They became famous inventors as well.

Though the two boys did not meet until they were sixteen, each had the same hobby—photography. And strangely enough, both had become fascinated by the little-known art of taking pictures in color. They had each pestered their parents into buying them the expensive plates needed in the "Lumiere" process, the first form of color photography. This complicated process caused each to wonder if there wasn't an easier and simpler way of making colored pictures.

Both Leopolds were in the senior class at the Riverdale (New York) Country School

when they became friends. In the beginning they were attracted to each other through musical interests since each knew well the name of the other's famous father. The first time they had any idea, however, that their hobbies were the same was when they began to take long walks together for exercise. Their talk turned from music to science. They soon realized that they were thinking along the same lines. One day they decided to see just how alike their ideas on color photography actually were. The boys sat down under neighboring trees and each wrote out in full his ideas for a better method of making color photographs. When they compared notes they found that their ideas on the

subject were almost the same! The boys shook hands and agreed to work side by side until they had perfected a better method of color photography.

However, the Godowskys moved to California and for the time being their resolve to work "side by side" had to be forgotten. But this handicap was overcome by a cross-country correspondence in which they filled page after page with scientific notes on their continued experiments. Two years later when Leopold Mannes visited Godowsky in Hollywood, they had already worked out a practical method of taking color pictures that was easier than the old process. With great difficulty they persuaded their

and spent long hours experimenting at night

parents to use some of the money intended for their musical education to build a special movie camera with twin lenses for taking movies in color. With this camera they photographed everything and everybody.

Full of enthusiasm, the boys returned to New York and tried to sell their new process. The most exciting day in their lives was when Hugo Reisenfeld, then director of the Rivoli and Rialto theatres, agreed to a demonstration in one of his theatres. Imagine their disappointment when Reisenfeld turned down their process after he discovered the extra amount of labor that was necessary to change the lenses on the projectors for color films.

Discouraged for a while, the boys gave up their interest in photography. They devoted themselves entirely to their music, in which they were now beginning to gain reputations.

But photography was too strong an interest to be put aside lightly! They threw away everything they had done up to that point and started out on an entirely different track. They thought that the answer perhaps lay in chemical dyes rather than in changing lenses. With what little money they could scrape together they rented a laboratory in the office of a New York doctor where they met at night, trying experiment after experiment. Time and again they were unsuccessful, but they stuck to it. Finally, they hit upon a chemical process that would produce automatic coloring at the time the film was developed.

Still one big problem remained — could they find a process that would be cheap enough to sell to the general public? After many unsuccessful attempts to get backing, they persuaded a group of New York bankers to put up money for their work for a few years.

With this help, Mannes and Godowsky rapidly approached the point where their results could be brought to public attention. That point came in 1931 when the Eastman Kodak Company of Rochester, New York, placed them on its staff and set them to work on color photography. For four years the two musician-scientists enjoyed the most ideal conditions under which they had ever experimented, and in April, 1935, Kodachrome was given to camera fans as a workable, practical method of color photography.

Today, when Mannes and Godowsky see their process used so widely, they must think of their own exciting story which brought them from fun

in boyhood to fortune in manhood.




