




Though born in London, on March 21, 1889 Bernard Cyril Freyberg was taken to New Zealand at the early age of 2.

What You Can Do to Aid in the

NATIONAL DEFENSE

America will be strong only if every individual helps to make it so. Here are twelve important ways you can do your important part

AMERICA is in greater danger today than at any time during its splendid history. The Nazi plan for world domination threatens our very existence as a nation and our survival as a free people. The utmost effort of everyone is required if we are to build up the strongest possible national defense.

National defense is not a matter to be left to the President and Congress. Everyone can do his or her part. Hundreds of thousands of young men are now serving in the Army and the Navy. Others are working long hours in defense industries. And there are many, many things, which are important too, that adults and boys and girls can do at home to help in the national defense.

If our Army and Navy are to be effective, they must have healthy, well-organized communities behind them. Community strength, therefore, must be built in every city and town and village in the land. Communities can be strong only if their men and women, boys and girls help to make them so.

Here are some of the many ways you can help to make your community strong and aid in the national defense.

(1) Help at home. During these times everyone is so extraordinarily busy that you may consider everyday chores unimportant. But they are a real contribution. When you give a hand in such things as making beds, washing dishes, cleaning, caring for small children, you give others in your household more time for additional duties. Repairing home

equipment is not only a service, but a way of maintaining a safe home. It is also a means of saving money—particularly important at a time when prices and taxes are rising.

(2) Help in the community There are many things you can do in helping to meet local needs and thereby strengthen the entire nation. Making and repairing toys for children who otherwise would have none; collecting books to be sent to hospitals or to Army camps; taking part in community entertainments; developing community gardens, or even just a small plot in your backyard; working for the Community Chest-cach of these things is a very real part of the general defense. Possibly you will find you can do them more efficiently; and get more fun out of them (they can be fun as well as service!) if you do them through a community organization. Such organizations as the Boy Scouts and the 4-H Clubs have extensive programs for community activities that offer many opportunities for service and enjoyment. Find out from its local representatives how you can most effectively cooperate in projects of the Office of Civilian Defense.

, (3) Learn to give first aid. It is important for everyone to know what to do in case of accident, and how to do it. The American Red Cross gives such training as well as training in home nursing, life saving, and nutrition.

(4) Keep healthy. The nation's strength depends on the health of all the people. We

have only recently realized in how large a part the ability "to take it" depends on adequate nutrition. Learn why you need to eat certain foods—and eat them! See, too, that you get plenty of outdoor fun and all kinds of physical activity so necessary for building sturdy bodies and good spirits.

(5) Prepare for your future work. Take stock of your abilities and interests and give careful consideration to what you want most to do for your life work. Talk the matter over with others, then look into the business you choose and find out what training and skills are necessary, and how you may obtain them.

(6) Save and collect old aluminum. Help in saving used and cast-off aluminum in your home and help community groups in aluminum collections. Even though the main drive for aluminum has been held by the time you read this, the need for aluminum still exists. More and more aluminum articles will be ready for discarding.

(7) Give contributions. Give more than usual as much as you possibly can-to local organtzed charities and to war relief funds. Don't hesitate to give only a few cents; every penny helps to increase the totals of your local Community Chest, the American Red Cross, the United Service Organizations for National Defense, Inc., the British War Relief, and other worthwhile organizations. There are many ways of raising money for these purposes. With your club or a group of friends -or even as an individual-

give a party for which you charge admission or charge for food and games and so raise money for such a purpose. Conduct a circus or an entertainment or a dance for the fund in which you are most interested.

The cost of America's defense program is almost beyond comprehension. You can pay your part by buying Defense Stamps. In doing so you are not making a contribution, for you are not giving away your money; Defense Stamps pay interest. You can buy one for as little as ten cents from any post office.

(9) Be a good neighbor. Help

the other fellow-the newcomer to your community as well as the one you've known a long time. Help refugee boys and girls-and those whose parents were born in other countriesfeel at home. Don't listen to propaganda that seeks to weaken America by promoting discord and intolerance among the different racial and religious groups. America is strong because of the variety of its peoples which results in a richness of background. Study your South American neighbors and learn to appreciate their cultures All of us in the Western Hemisphere need each other, and future cooperation will be

easier and more effective if we understand our neighbors' special problems.

(10) Appreciate the democracy you live in. You enjoy a real privilege in living in a democracy. In Germany young people are regimented in their schools. They are required to work in labor camps. They are limited as to what books they read, what radio programs they listen to. There is no free speech, no freedom of assembly. You are indeed fortunate that you are not trapped in one of the European countries either at war or already under the domination of Hitler. You are fortunate to live in a free country, Read the Bill of Rights in the Constitution. And remember that your freedom is something so precious that it is worth spending every effort to preserve.

of your job is to make some sacrifices. Putting all possible resources to work on defense products means production of other articles is curtailed. You may not be able to buy some of the things you want. You may have to limit the amount of gasoline you use. Money may be scarcer in your home because taxes are going up and the cost of living, too. But don't forget that it is well worth giving up something to preserve the democracy under which you live.


(12) Remain calm. It is sometimes difficult not to be upset, when the newspapers, the radio, the conversation around you are so full of exciting and disturbing war news. Remember that hysteria is one of the obstacles to effective defense efforts. If you are doing something—no matter how little—to make America strong, you'll find it easier to avoid worry.

You have been wanting to help. Now you can! Check the list above and decide what you can do best. You will probably think of other things along the same lines that will be useful. America's defense program can be effective only if every individual is willing to do his part!
