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WILDLIFE CONSERVATION AND FISHING Unit II

Things To Do:

- (1) Become acquainted with the Fishing laws of Michigan. Discuss why we have these regulations.
- (2) Know the more common varieties of fish found in Michigan and where they are found. You should be familiar with the fish in your locality.
- (3) Keep a fishing "log"- of at least three fishing trips (date, kind of fish caught, size of fish, kind of bait, type of equipment, time of day, hours spent fishing, etc).
- (4) Learn about fish foods and their homes (this can help you in your understanding of fishing.)
- (5) Demonstrate how to clean a fish and prepare it for cooking.
- (6) Pollution: Check each fishing site.

Additional Activities:

- 1. Invite your local conservation officer or Fish Biologist to give a talk at one of your meetings.
- 2. Learn something about the methods of catching three different kinds of fish and be able to demonstrate.
- 3. Give a demonstration on how to flycast, how to spin cast; or how to bait cast. Be able to identify the different parts of your equipment.
