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

WHEN USING CRUTCHES

Underarm Gusset


A piece of fabric set in at the underarm (a gusset) gives extra room so that clothes don't bind, tear or hike up at the sides when using crutches. Use matching or near matching fabric. A fabric piece can be cut from the tails of "tuck-in" shirts.

1 Cut a diamond-shaped piece of soft knit or woven fabric which is about 4" × 6", depending on the size of the garment.




- 2 Open up underarm and sleeve seams for $2^{1/4}$ inches to $2^{1/2}$ inches.
- 3 Turn back the corners of underarm opening.

With right sides of the fabrics together, pin and sew the diamond-shaped piece into the underarm area of the garment.



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
