

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An Action Program for Community Beautification

The program outlined in this folder is an action program for landscape beautification. It has succeeded in other communities. It can work in yours. You may need to modify it to fit your local conditions, but you can use it to make your community beautiful.

SELECT AN "ACTION" CHAIRMAN

The success of the program will depend upon selecting the right person to spark the program. An action chairman should have the following characteristics:

Enthusiasm for the project and ability to instill enthusiasm in others.

Patience to listen to ideas.

Perseverance to stick to the job until the goal is accomplished.

Amiability in working with others.

Leadership to develop and complete the beautification program that will be best for the community.

SELECT BEAUTIFICATION COMMITTEE

Each member should be selected for his or her special talents in the community. Appoint only people with enthusiasm for the project who are willing to contribute their time and talents.

- * People want neat, clean, and appealing communities.
- * People want attractive buildings with beautiful landscapes.
- * People enjoy plants: trees for beauty and shade; rich, green lawns for beauty and play grounds; and flowers for beauty and fragrance.

YOUR COMMUNITY CAN ENJOY these advantages, but you must work together to achieve them. A community beautification program provides the means for a community-wide approach to beautification.

PLAN AN ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING

Select a date, time and place, and announce the meeting at least 10 days in advance. An evening hour is preferred since most "active" people are busy during the day. Select a convenient meeting place, such as the City Hall, although a library conference room or a home living room are adequate. A simple agenda for the meeting might include:

- Purpose: The purpose of the meeting should be announced and a clear, welldefined "objective" selected. Many committees fail due to the lack of a well-defined purpose.
- 2. Statements of facts: All known knowledge relative to a given "project" should be presented to the committee: Historical background Present condition
 Reasons for situation
 Ownership
 Legal problems
 Other data
- 3. List of all feasible "actions". All reasonable suggestions should be listed along with the advantages and disadvantages of each.
- 4. Select action programs (one, two, or three) for the current year and make assignments to committee members for gathering data as a basis for making final decisions.

APPOINT BEAUTIFICATION SUB-COMMITTEES

SHADE TREE COMMITTEE

Survey present situation. Work with city forester, Boy Scouts, garden club members, utility companies, foresters, park superintendent.

Compile list of trees recommended for street plantings. Include list of trees that are prohibited from being planted in or near public areas. Work with city forester, county extension agent, nurserymen, landscape architects, Department of Horticulture at University. M.S.U. has prepared a list of recommended Trees and Shrub-like Trees for Michigan.

Formulate a community-wide tree planting program. Work with nurserymen, city forester, county extension agent, Boy Scouts, service club members.

Present "action program". Work with overall beautification committee, city officials, residents and mass media.

Supervise maintenance of public trees. Work with city forester, road commission, park superintendent.

BUSINESS-EDUCATION-INDUSTRY COMMITTEE

Urge all businesses, industries, and schools to start beautification programs in cooperation with the community program. Work with Business-Education-Industry leaders, ministers, civic executives, 4-H groups, etc.

Encourage instruction in schools and colleges on the value of beauty in the total environment; establish youth programs.

Establish beautification awards for outstanding accomplishments.



- * Present sub-committee reports at the next formal meeting of the Beautification Committee.
- * Discuss all facts and ideas and take a course of "action".
- * Formulate plans to carry out the program.
- * Prepare a financial budget.
- *Assign each committee a specific responsibility to accomplish by a stated date.
- * Determine which public agency will have responsibility for each action program, particularly maintenance.

Clean Water: It's Up To You



ANTI-LITTER COMMITTEE

Enact anti-litter ordinance. Work with members of city council, mayor, city attorney, town or county supervisors.

Formulate an anti-litter campaign. Work with owners and managers of driveins, street stands and shopping centers, school principals, Scouts, 4-H groups, radio, press, TV, clergy, city foresters, apartment managers, sanitary engineers.

Develop Anti-litter Propaganda. Work with press, TV, radio, schools, 4-H groups.

Conduct Anti-litter Tours. Work with mayor, city council, service club members, other interested residents.

Conduct "Clean-up, Paint-up, Fix-up Week". Work with all agencies, especially youth groups. (Start this type of thinking at an early age.)

WATER AND WATER-FRONT IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE

Survey present situation of lakes and rivers and streams. Work with state or county department of conservation, sportsmen's organizations, skin-diver clubs, sanitation department, industry representatives, county drain commissioner, women's groups, board of health.

Formulate and conduct a clean-up and anti-pollution program. Same as above, plus all community groups.

ABANDONED CAR COMMITTEE

Formulate and enact an abandoned car ordinance. Work with mayor, city council, town or county board, owners of collection centers.

Locate all junk and abandoned cars in the community. Work with police, mailmen, deliverymen, Scouts and residents. Haul junk or abandoned cars to a "collection center". Obtain signed permission where necessary. Work with "vehicle" owners, managers of "collection centers".

Locate or move "collection centers". Find less conspicuous locations or arrange screen plantings along main highways and streets. Work with owners or managers of "collection centers".

PUBLICITY AND PROMOTION COMMITTEE

Stimulate interest and support for the program. Work with radio, TV, press, schools, service clubs.

Write news stories and articles on the action program. (Include: objectives, plans, activities, accomplishments.)

Arrange promotional campaigns. Work with press, radio, TV, authors.

Keep photographic record of project. ("Before" and "after" pictures.) Work with press, camera club, garden club.

Compile a record of accomplishments. (These might be used for Keep Michigan Beautiful Awards.)

PARK AND RECREATION COMMITTEE.

Formulate a Park and Recreation Program. Work with recreation leaders, school officials, youth leaders.

SOME SUGGESTED ACTION PROGRAMS

1. Landscape or improve selected public sites within the community: mall, parks, boulevards, entrances to city, public buildings, etc.

- 2. Stimulate "front yard" landscaping.
- Encourage stores, and business firms to landscape their property.
- 4. Plant "asphalt deserts" to shrubbery and flowers.
- 5. Use container-grown plants in city areas.
- 6. Plan, plant and maintain a community garden (roses, tulips, annuals).
- 7. Start a window box program in areas that cannot afford extensive plantings.
- 8. Establish a shade tree commission to provide a list of recommended trees for street tree plantings.
- 9. Start an Arbor Day Program at all schools. Plant a tree and distribute literature on the value of trees.
- Establish good turf renovation and maintenance for key public areas.
- 11. Renovate parks and cemeteries.
- 12. Prune and fertilize trees and shrubs.
- 13. Remove dead and dying trees.
- 14. Screen views of unsightly but necessary utilities or arrange to move them to new location.
- 15. Establish clean-up programs to keep streets and public areas litter-free.
- 16. Control loss of trash from trucks, trailers, dumpsters, and dumps.
- 17. Establish regular trash pick-up.
- 18. Conduct an anti-pollution program.
- 19. Clean up rivers, streams and lakes.
- 20. Remove or repair and paint old buildings, fences, signs, etc.
