### FOOTBALL STARS SCORE BIG HIT

**Clever Plot of "Believe Me Xantippe" Bring Out Surprising Talent.**

Heralded as one of the best plays ever given by Theta Alpha Phi, national honorary dramatic fraternity, "Believe Me, Xantippe" played to a full house in the Little Theatre both nights of the two-night run, March 10 and 11 with more than usual success. Possessive of clever plot, the play was ably given with "Dick" Lyman and Pauline Scott playing the lead roles to a perfection.

"Dick" Lyman, Michigan State grid star gave concrete evidence of his versatility by clever acting behind the footlights. His portrayal of the idle, carefree bachelor, George MacFarland was beyond reproach. From the comforts of the luxurious New York apartment to the trials of western life, MacFarland changes in short order for the adventure and for the satisfaction of a bet with his friends. Miss Scott playing opposite Lyman, neatly played the part of the feminine deputy sheriff, Dolly Kamman, who captivated MacFarland.

Ruby Boehringer as the masterful detective, Arthur Sole, and "Bill" Schulgen in the part of Thornton Brown, added some clever diversions to the play in their transactions with MacFarland. It is with these gentlemen that MacFarland bets that he is capable of evading all officers of the law for a period of one year. However, he seems destined to lose his bet after a long run, when Dolly proves his undoing. However, MacFarland wins the bet in the final scene, when it is revealed that Miss Kamman was not a representative of the arm of the law when the capture was made. Needless to say, however, MacFarland refuses to be released from bondage with the newly appointed deputy.

In supporting roles, which were very capably played, J. Dale Medill as "Buck" Kamman; Max Hilton as Wrenn Riddle; Edward Jerome as "Skip" Calloway; Sylvia Schimmell as Violet Ruth Featherley as Aunt Martha; and Roy Spiekerman as William finish off the play to a nicety.

**Complete Equipment Installed This Week.**

An elaborate X-Ray machine is the latest addition to the equipment of the college hospital having been installed in the basement of the hospital the early part of the week.

Equipment for the developing of the plates has also been installed. The machine has been manufactured by the Acme X-Ray company of Chicago and cost over \$2,000. Dr. F. W. Barry is the operator of the machine.

Many cases of sprains necessitating x-rays has led the college to purchase the machine. Some weeks as many as ten cases of ligament or bone injuries come to the hospital.

### ELIGIBILITY RULE IS MAIN ISSUE

**Vote at Union Building This Year; Polls to Be Open From 8 A. M. to 8 P. M.**

Eligibility rules for students entering all-campus activities is the main issue to be decided today in the all-college elections in addition to the election of organization officers and student publication heads.

There has been some agitation on the campus for eligibility rules which would place all students taking part in campus activities on a par with those who are trying out for athletic teams and subject to the same scholastic regulations.

The question will be placed on the all-college ballot in three sections: 1. Do you favor eligibility rules for campus activities? 2. Do you favor the requirement of a "C" average? 3. Do you favor the same rules which apply to athletics? (A deficiency of more than 8 points or 8 credits rendering the candidate ineligible).

The polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 8 p. m. Members of the student council will be in charge, checking off the names of the students in the student directory as the ballots are passed out.

Voting will be done this year in the Union building.

Every possible effort has been made to make the student body acquainted with the candidates whose names will appear on the ballot and it is urged that every student take advantage of the opportunity to vote. The hours have been arranged in such a way that it will be possible for every one to find some convenient time during the day to cast his or her ballot.

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### TIME TO THINK

Socrates never wrote a book, never made a formal address, held no public office, wrote no letters, and yet his words have come down to us through the ages, his life was the subject of many writers of his time, and the products of his mind furnished an inspiration to many noted philosophers who followed him in history. And why was all this true? Because he deliberately set about to think, to know himself, and to know humanity. He was a sculptor by trade but it is not the product of his hands but the product of his brain for which he is remembered.

In this age of speed and efficiency, rapid transportation, improved methods, and specialization, the wizards of industry are the ones who get things done. We judge our fellow men on the basis of accomplishment. Competition and economic pressure are leading the world on and on at a faster and still faster pace. The individual who is not spectacular is lost in the surging tide of humanity and fails to receive the recognition from the world which he may merit.

The student is perhaps too apt to be rated on the number of outside activities he can take part in. Athletics, student publications, various student organizations representing the whole student body and those that represent the classes, dramatics, vaudeville, glee club and orchestra, to say nothing of the myriad of social activities that take their toll in hours—every one worthy of the best effort a student can put forth and a valuable phase of college education. The problem to decide is where to leave off with academic work and where to start with activities.

One of the most important purposes of the college is to train for leadership and there is perhaps nothing that will do more to develop this phase of character than student activities. Associations in college add that element of character which is likewise important. But without the discipline of the mind, the assimilation of necessary facts, and the general broadening influences that are secured through conscientious application in the academic work, the value of a college education would be sadly reduced.

Mere exposure is not sufficient to educate. It is the person with the inquiring mind, who does not necessarily accept everything at face value, the one who works out his own problems, who prepares himself to get the most out of life by being able to put the most into it. The daily program of the average college student is a wild rush from morning to night with never a moment for constructive thinking and to meet one's self face to face.

There is a time for every phase of college life but let us not forget nor neglect the time to think.

## MEN'S DEBATE TEAM LOSE SPIRITED TILT

Loss to University of Detroit Last Friday Night by Two to One Score.

Contesting strenuously every issue of the question, the men's affirmative debating team lost a spirited forensic tilt by a two to one decision, to a polished team representing the University of Detroit last Friday evening on the centralization of government. L. C. Greene, 28L; E. I. Post, 26A; L. R. Miller, 28L; and Coach D. C. Eckerman made the trip.

Standing for a policy of moderate centralization, the State squad based their case on economy, effectiveness, and efficiency as reasons for a gradual concentration of power in the hands of the national government. The Detroit men met this with charges of attempting to destroy our dual system of state and federal control and pressed their points so skillfully as to gain the extra vote.

The affirmative team expects to profit by their defeat when they meet Purdue university Thursday evening on the home platform with the same question on the boards for discussion.

Jack Hornbeck easily won the straight pool tournament from Lyman Primodig. Hornbeck in accomplishing the feat made a high run of 24. The score in this event was 100 to 74.

E. G. Johnson, a senior student won the straight-rail billiard laurels by an easy victory over the faculty champion by a 100 to 84 count. Johnson held the lead over his opponent throughout the match.

Jack Hornbeck dropped his second match of the evening to Miles Casteel, who won the three-cushion tournament by a 20 to 14 count.

Several records for high runs were set in the Union billiard hall during the meets. Hornbeck set a 24 point record in straight pool, P. H. DeVries, a member of the faculty, set a record of 15 for high run in straight-rail billiard, and their record for three-rail billiards is held jointly by three different individuals, the high run being four.

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## Loomis never dreamed he'd make a salesman

E. W. Loomis started life as a farmer boy—a real "dirt" farmer—as did his parents and grandparents before him.

Across the corn furrows, however, he would catch sight on the road of the only kind of engineer a

farmer boy of that day saw—a civil engineer—and a civil engineer Loomis determined he would be.

At Delaware University, however, he got a job in the electrical laboratory—he also waited table, played football, wrestled, was commissary of the Commons, ran the battalion and did a number of other things, besides studying electrical engineering. One day a kindly professor said to him—"You understand men

even better than you do electricity and engineering, why not go in for the sale of electrical apparatus?" Loomis liked the idea—came to Westinghouse—took the student course—then off to the New York Office as a "cub" salesman.

He worked—he always had—both on the farm and in college. In three years he was head of a section of the industrial sales department. By 1922 he was

manager of the Industrial Division of the New York Office—charged with responsibility for the sale of Westinghouse apparatus to all industrial customers in New York State and in the northern half of New Jersey.

Loomis has fifty-two men working under his direction. It is barely eleven years since the wise old professor remarked to him—"Consider selling; it's a promising field."

## INTERSCHOLASTIC SWIMMING MEET ATHLETIC ATTRACTION OF WEEK.

The third annual Michigan High School Athletic association swimming meet is on the boards for Friday and Saturday, March 19-20, in the Michigan State natatorium. The preliminaries will take place at 7 o'clock Friday and the finale will begin at 1:30 Saturday afternoon. The National Collegiate Athletic association swimming rules will govern the preliminaries and finale of the meet.

There will be eight events in which the prep school natators will be entered. They are the 240 yard relay, 100 yard breast stroke, 50 yard free style, 100 yard back stroke, 100 yard free style, fancy diving, 220 yard free style, and the medley relay. The medley relay will be 100 yards, the first man swimming 50 yards back stroke, the second man doing the 50 yards breast stroke and the last man free style. Four required and four voluntary dives are listed for each contestant.

There will be four places in each event, scoring 5 points for first, 3 for second, 2 for third, and 1 for fourth.

Permanent trophies will be given the team scoring the most points, the winner of each relay and the team scoring second high in the meet. A gold medal will be given to each member of the winning relay teams, and winners of first place in each of the other events. Silver medals will be awarded the second place winners. Bronze medals will be given to the third and fourth place winners.

The only teams so far to send their entries are Pontiac, Ann Arbor and Redford, but they will all be in by the first of next week, it is expected at the athletic office.
