The Forestry Department has been asked to write a chapter on historical trees in a booklet on the identification of trees of Michigan. The booklet will be published by the American Tree Association of Washington, D. C., and distributed to school children and others throughout the State. Mr. Charles Lathrop Park is President of the Association. Professor R. F. Kroodsmas, Extension Forester in the Department, is compiling a list of the historic trees of Michigan. Most of the information received so far has been on historic trees in the southern part of the State, principally in Jackson, Kent, Kalamazoo and Calhoun counties.

### STATE NEWS TO BE MAILED SOON

Student List and Addresses To Be Revised; Make Stencils for Addressing Machine.

Preparations for mailing the Michigan State News to each subscriber have been started and the mailing will be begun as soon as the addressing stencils can be made.

It cannot be said at the present time just how long it will take to make the stencils as it requires a great deal of time and work to prepare these stencils so that the addressing of 2,500 can be done quickly and economically. A complete list of the students was made for the State News at the registrar's office last week.

Students who have changed their address since enrollment at the beginning of the term and have not notified the registrar, should notify the State News at once so that the stencils can all be made with the correct address. This will also eliminate the expense of making a new stencil. The stencils are made on steel plates and the addressing done by a machine in a manner that is similar to printing.

Because of the fact that this is the first year that the student fee system has been tried out at Michigan State but this system of distribution was not devised upon definitely until after the beginning of the school year.

At some other schools where the fee system is in use, the papers are distributed as they are at Michigan State but this system of distribution has not proved entirely satisfactory here.

The mailing will add a large additional cost but it is believed that with the present financial condition of the State News, which is the best for several years due to the fee system, that it can be done without causing the paper to lose financially.

### EXPERIMENTAL LAB. INSTALLS HUGE MOTOR

New 50 K. W. Motor Generating Set Installation Practically Completed.

The installation of a new 50 k. w. motor generating set in the engineering experimental laboratory is practically completed.

Last spring the work was started by building concrete bases for the motor base and although the switch board is not fully installed, by temporary wiring the motor can be used.

The Westinghouse motor operates directly from a 2,300 volt alternating current generated at the State power house and supplies a 125 to 250 volt direct current for use in the laboratories.

According to Prof. B. K. Osborn, the generating set is one of the largest found in experimental laboratories.

The first big party of the year will be held in the Union ballroom Saturday night, Oct. 21, when the senior graduating class will hold away with the senior class fall term party.

The senior committee in charge of the occasion is headed by June Ramsey. Assisting her are Gerald Reynolds, Walter Meebaks, and Monty Pace.

This party will come the evening of the game with Lake Forest and is seen as a fitting place to give vent to the joys of an anticipated victory.

Only 236 Not in Military of 1411 Men Enrolled; Advanced Students More Numerous.

The largest enrollment ever to enter the military department during its regime at Michigan State is taking its tri-weekly workouts now under the stern guidance of the regular army officers.

Including the men in the band of whom there are 110, the number of men in all departments is 1,085. This is the largest number of men ever entered at the military department.

In the infantry, 165 freshmen, 85 sophomores, 18 advanced students are enrolled, making a total of 268. The cavalry division drew 203 freshmen, 8 sophomores and 25 advanced students for a total of 236. In the artillery, 293 freshmen, 111 sophomores and 69 advanced students bring the biggest total of a single division at 473. The band of 110 members boasts 47 freshmen, 27 sophomores, 36 upperclassmen.

Out of 1,411 men enrolled in the whole college, only 226 are not taking military. The advanced students are becoming more numerous, but they are just about in proportion to the increase of freshmen and sophomores. The artillery seems to be the preference of advanced students, as they have more than twice as many as the other two departments put together.

The freshmen seem to have taken the cavalry as their favorite division, 203 men having entered. The artillery is second with 291 men and the infantry is last with 165 men.
