STATE RELEASES FUNDS TO BUILD NEW ARMORY

Plans Completed and Approved; Work to Be Done Under State Construction Department.

START IMMEDIATELY

Total Appropriation Made by Legislature is \$250,000; Building to Cover 160 by 280 Feet.

The sum of \$500,000 was released yesterday by the state administrative board with which to begin the immediate construction of a new armory.

The total appropriation made by the legislature for this structure was \$250,000. The work will be done under the direction of the state construction department.

The building will be built in the Romanesque style of architecture, which will harmonize very well with the present buildings on the campus.

The new armory will contain the offices of the military department and will be used mainly by the R. O. T. C. However, it is also planned to use the building for the great need of a big auditorium, which is lacked by the college at present.

It is planned to have a cinder track with a tan bark covering laid within the structure. This will be used for the annual intercollegiate indoor track carnival, but will not be available for daily use.

R. O. T. C. TO VOTE ON SPONSORS

HATS OFF TO CORNELL

It is gratifying to know that Michigan State has made a lasting impression on Cornell University. From the reports of those who attended the game at Ithaca, Cornell made a good impression with them. The team and all the members of the student body who attended the game were shown the utmost respect, courtesy, and hospitality.

The good sportsmanship of Cornell may perhaps best be shown from the account of the game which appeared in the Cornell Daily Sun, student newspaper. Witness the headlines of the football story: "Lucky Breaks Give Cornell 24 to 14 Victory Over State"; "Smith's Pass Fatal"; "Kap who intercepts during heavy rain from behind goal giving Cornell score"; "Varsity's Power Play"; "Red and White line loses aggressiveness in last half as Michigan rallies"; "Visitors Near Victory"; "Green and White cuts lead to three points; aerial attack proves effective"; "And then the story of the game written in a manner as fair as any Michigan State follower might have written it. "Dane nature smiled widely at Cornell Saturday and gave them an undeserved advantage of several breaks in the game with Michigan State. After being held scoreless for the first half of the game State came back with a spirited and determined drive that netted them 14 points as much as against Cornell's 24. At the start of the final period the Red and White were leading by the narrow margin of three points. A swift pass from Boehringer to Smith proved too difficult for the latter to handle and it slipped through hands. The accident precipitated what looked like a sure touchdown for the Green and White as the visitors at the time were on Cornell's 48 yard mark, after having obtained two first downs in succession."

The writer then continues by praising State droops when he says, "The State eleven played hard and gave all it possessed for a much desired victory but an ill-timed pass from Smith as he was standing in the end zone was intercepted inches away from his own goal. State was playing to win and continually pushed when deep in its own territory. Smith's defiance to the ethics of football averted and thrill of the spectators who had sprung to life when Cornell's downfall seemed apparent. Michigan played a defensive game for the most of the time content to let Cornell tire itself out with persistent rushing and then took

trip possible. To Secretary H. H. Halladay should go a large part of the credit for securing the funds to make the trip possible.

Another viewpoint on the game that is equally as interesting as the student newspaper accounts is a letter from E. B. Hill, assistant to the dean of agriculture, who is now at Cornell taking post graduate work. The following excerpts from Mr. Hill's letter give the angle of student opinion.

"Needless to say, Cornell now has a greater respect for Michigan State than it had formerly. I never before felt more proud of Michigan State and of the men who represent her than I do at the present time.

"The team and the band made a hit with the faculty and student body, as evidenced by the writeup about the game; the editorial in the Daily Sun and the student discussion in the fraternity house where I now stay. They are still talking about last Saturday and there is nothing but the highest of praise.

"The writeup of the game is a good one. There is a slight oversight which should interest you. In the Syracuse Army game, Syracuse was penalized a total of 125 yards. Following one of these penalties, the Syracuse quarterback got into a fist fight with the referee. State at Cornell was penalized a total of 212 yards yet without visible signs of unsportsmanlike protest. The comparison is obvious, especially since many felt that State was rather heavily penalized.

"They all wanted to know how we were able to maintain such a fine band. It is difficult for them to understand student interest and spirit at M. S.

"Cornell students commented alike on the fine fighting spirit of the team, band and rosters. In fact M. S. C. spirit and fight appeared to be contagious as Cornell itself showed more spirit last Saturday than is customary.

"All in all it was a wonderful day for all concerned and the day will be long remembered by Cornellians."

"What finer spirit of good sportsmanship could be imagined than that shown by Cornell. May other schools that have occasion to send athletic teams or other organizations and rooters to Michigan State be able to see

We are proud of our band and believe it is the best college band in the country. The time and money expended to make the trip possible were well worth while. It was the efforts of a few individuals who hold a deep interest in the band that made the

as much of the hospitality and good sportsmanship of us as we are able to say for Cornell, and may we be as fair and hospitable to our visitors as Cornell is to her visitors.

Out of such interscholastic relationships as these grows the spirit that is greater than victory or defeat.

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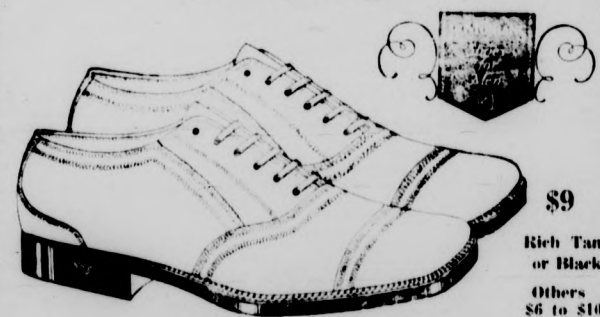

Lake Forest Team Considered Easy Last Year But Turned Tables Beating State 6 to 0; Coach Young Hands Out Stiff Drills All Week; Deacon Appears to Have Won Regular Quarterback Berth in Cornell Game.

Revenge to no uncertain degree will be sought by Michigan State College's football team Saturday afternoon in the stadium when Lake Forest appears here. One year ago the Illinois team was considered a soft one but came up here and turned the tables by beating State 6 to 0. One star, Folgate, a man who ran, passed, and kicked, defeated the Spartans. Folgate is not with the Lake Forest team this season. Reports say all the other men of last year's team will be in the lineup though.

Young Works Men

Last Saturday Lake Forest trounced Central College by a decisive score. That is about all the dope that is available at present except that the Illini eleven is undefeated this year.

Coach Young has not been taking any chances, however, and has handed out stiff drills to his team all week. The showing made by the

Spartans at Cornell was nothing short of miraculous. If the same spirit that held the team at Cornell continues then Lake Forest is in for a real drubbing.

On the next Saturday State takes its second journey to the east to meet Colgate. The Hamilton, N. Y. team has been going very well this season and a real battle is anticipated. Last year State and Colgate staged a real battle, the Spartans offering one of the best games they played all season.
