PASTOR VIVIDLY UPHOLDS MEXICO

Ann Arbor Minister Makes Bitter Slam On American Viewpoints: Openly Scores Church.

Last Sunday evening at the People's Church, Dr. H. A. Jump of the First Congregational church of Ann Arbor brought a message to the students of M. S. C. and to the residents of East Lansing concerning the United States of Mexico. It proved to be a series of revelations of the astonishing truth about the new Mexico.

Last spring when all the heat about Mexico was being generated in the United States, Dr. Jump and about twenty other American thinkers decided to get the truth at first-hand. Accordingly, they went to Mexico and the facts which they brought back with them prove astounding.

Terms Mexican Rule Remarkable.
According to the testimony of Dr. Jump, backward Mexico, our neighbor to the south, was not one step ahead of us. While we have been busy in comparatively recent years with ourselves, and surrounding ourselves with the best technique of government possible where the human element was still needed, Mexico has quietly gone ahead and is now fully establishing a remarkable government under a constitution that seems to mark the furthest step this far in the gradual evolution of a perfect government. Not of course, that this new government will be perfect, but it is to be inferred from Dr. Jump's statement of facts, that the ideas contained in the new constitution show the result of more intelligence and logic than are manifested in any one of our big modern governments.

This remarkable change in the state of affairs since we last knew anything about Mexico has been brought about by a group of intelligent, conscientious young men who have a vision as to what we should be getting if we were to have a better government.

This group of men, headed by a lawyer, has been called by the government when they were shifting the blame on Mexico's reaction, but some of them have made their own government and are planning to build a better one.

DELAY CONSTRUCTION OF WEATHER BUREAU

Plans Must Be Altered to Reduce Cost to Appropriation of

Awarding of the contract for the new weather bureau has been delayed for several weeks, due to bids exceeding the appropriation. Bids were opened in Washington, Nov. 12, but have been returned. The plans are now being altered to bring the cost down to the funds appropriated.

It is hoped to have the plans revised contract awarded, and construction started by the first of the year, said D. A. Seales, head of the local station. The new building will be financed through funds appropriated by the federal government, the state highway department and the college. The entire cost of the new structure will be \$28,000. Of this amount the state highway department will pay \$15,000, the cost of the section of the property used when the new pavement was built. The college will pay \$10,000 for the old building. The remaining \$13,000 will be furnished by the federal government.

The new structure will be erected near the hospital, facing Michigan avenue, and will be complete and ready in all respects. The college architects have designed the quarters in harmony with other buildings on the campus. The building proper will be 42 feet by 57 feet. Offices of the weather bureau will occupy the first floor, while living quarters are planned for the second.

NEW COURSE IN DRAWING AND DESIGN NEXT TERM

An important new course has been added to the college curriculum under the department of drawing and design, according to announcement this week by Prof. R. K. Steward of the division of engineering.

The course will be one treating architectural drafting, and it will be known as Drawing and Design 9A. The initial appearance of the course on the college program will be at the start of the ensuing winter term, the announcement stated.

There has been sufficient demand for such a course, and this has prompted the department to expand in that field. The only prerequisite will be either Drawing and Design 4A, 4B or 4C.

All students who are interested in this new course treating architectural phases are urged to communicate with Prof. R. K. Steward, prior to registration for winter term. His office is located in room 312, Olds hall of engineering.

LOAN TWO MOTORS TO ELECTRICAL ENGINEERS

Cooperation of Manufacturer Aids in Research Work of Electrical Engineering Department.

Through the courtesy of E. C. Robinson, district manager of the Detroit office of the Century Electric company, the electrical engineering department has again received the loan of two new motors. One is a three-phase, automatic start induction motor, and the other a single-phase, capacitor-start induction motor. These motors are open for inspection to the public, and for testing to the students. This sort of cooperation on the part of the manufacturer makes available to the student new electric motors of the latest design, and makes available to the manufacturer any new information that the students might discover in working with the equipment. A similar arrangement was in effect during the past school year.

FARM LANE BRIDGE TO HAVE NEW FLOOR BUILT

Farm Lane bridge, which is between the campus proper and the experimental plots of the college, is to have a new floor.

At present the floor is in very bad condition, the planks forming the wagon track being decayed to such an extent that they cannot be repaired. The cross planks have been practically destroyed, due to the vast amount of debris that has accumulated, which has never been cleaned off.

The prospective floor will be made of new lumber throughout. Every piece of the old lumber will be torn out down to the iron work. This floor when completed will be an improvement that M. S. C. has long been in need of.

LANDSCAPE ART PLANS EXTENSION PROGRAM

E. I. Grege, graduate of Michigan state college, and former agricultural agent in Allegan county, has been spending the past four weeks with the landscape department of the college in preparation for a landscape extension specialist.

Beginning Jan. 1, 1927, Mr. Grege will devote his time with the county agricultural agents of the state in presenting landscape demonstrations. The demonstrations will be along the lines of rural improvement, rural school grounds, parks, and communities.

Dark Days of Aggie Struggle For Glory of M. A. C. Related

To rise at 5:25, gave ample time for the boys to dress and be at chapel at 5:30 in the days when our college was very young. Then attendance was compulsory, but later this restriction was removed. A number of students viewed a 20-minute chapel later in the forenoon as a great improvement because it furnished opportunity for securing some fresh air along with "campusity."

Dark days hung over the early years of the college. The civil war made appropriations hard to get, and decreased the number of students to 48. The president received only \$1,500 as his salary; the professors of chemistry and zoology \$1,000, and the professor of mathematics \$600. "No member of the faculty had a chair to himself, but occupied a whole section." At one time the professor of botany also taught history, English, algebra and civil engineering. The students, however, did not have a very dull time. Alfred G. Gulley of '48 says: "Our social duties were neither extensive nor expensive, consisting of an occasional reception by some of the faculty or possibly once a year a visit to the female seminary in North Lansing, then called 'Lower Town.' There was but one dancing party on the grounds during my college course, and not another until many years later."
