Hours for the health service during spring term are as follows: Mondays to Fridays, 8:30 to 10:30 in the morning, 1 to 3 afternoons; Saturdays, 8:30 to 10:30 in the morning. Appointments may be had on Sundays through special arrangements. Emergencies will be cared for at any time.

LEGISLATURE TO LIFT TAX LIMIT

College Will Receive \$1,541,800 if Bill Passes State Legislature.

According to a bill introduced into the state senate last week, Michigan State may receive a yearly sum of \$1,541,800 if passage of the bill is effected. The bill was introduced by Senator Seymour H. Person of Lansing.

The bill would provide for the removal of the present limit of \$1,000,000 from the proceeds of the one-fifth mill tax on each dollar of taxable state property.

The assessed valuation of taxable property in the state is \$7,700,000,000.

The trip south disclosed the fact that Albert "Lefty" Tollen is about the only capable moundman State has. The southpaw who went so well last season hurled three games and succeeded in winning two of them. A sore arm troubled the Spartan ace on the losing occasion.

Trimmer offered a couple of different types of baseball, but with the expert ones he pitched should be able to weather the storm in a number of games this season. A little more confidence spirit would see a long way toward making the "Bough" south a better athlete. His confidence should come after several appearances on the mound, however.

After the first basketball campaign in the newly formed Central Intercollegiate Conference, of which Michigan State is a member, attention was turned to honors of the association. Notre Dame winners of the C. I. C. Championship and Butler University runner-up for the title were conceded to be the superior teams of the circuit.

To Year Dickson of Michigan State College goes the high score honors of the Central Conference. He outdistanced the field and easily outbalanced most of the opponents he met during his first year in intercollegiate ranks. In selecting two forwards for the 1937 All-Central Conference team this writer feels justified in naming Dickson of State and Wakefield of Butler, after reviewing the opinions of the various basketball coaches and athletic directors of the association. Wakefield was the offensive mainstay of the Butler team and teamed with Chadd, a splendid guard, those men virtually accounted for the success of the Indiana job. Team captain is given the other guard berth on the All-Conference choice.

With Dickson and Wakefield at the controls, and Conroy teamed with Chadd to comprise the first team guard duo, the selection of center was an easy task. John Nyikos, sensational pivot man and captain of the Notre Dame five was in a class by himself during the past season. Named captain of the All-Western and All-Indiana honor teams, he is placed as captain of the All-Central Conference quintet. His leadership ability as captain of the Irish was a contributing factor in the success of the South Bend crew, and for that reason he is chosen as an ideal center and captain.

The only man who was next enough to Nyikos within the Central Conference to warrant consideration was Carl Felt, Michigan State Center. Felt, like his teammate Dickson played his first season in college ranks.

STATE TRACK MEN TO COMPETE AT DETROIT MEET

Only four Michigan State College track athletes will compete in the National Town and Country club indoor meet in Detroit Friday night, according to Ralph Young, coach of the Spartan track team.

The meet is to take place in the General Motors building. The event, which is sanctioned by the Michigan A. A. U., is sure to draw the cream of Michigan amateur talent.

The State men will compete in six events. Alderman and Lang will run the 50, 75 and 100 yard dashes, while Wareham will enter the high and low hurdle races and Tibbottson, the shot put. The latter has not been in competition since the Central Intercollegiate where he pushed the iron ball more than 45 feet for a new record. He will, in all probability, be met by Zuber of Detroit City college Friday night.

Grin, State's world record holder in the 75, will not run this week because of a slight leg injury. Fans and track officials were highly desirous of having the State champion appear along with Captain Fred Alderman, but Coach Young deemed it better not to take any chances with the big sprinter.

Lang and Captain Alderman should make a great record for themselves in the three events they will compete in. In the hurdles Wareham has been coming along in good style. He appears to be a natural athlete and has been showing vast improvement under the tutelage of Assistant Coach Mike Castrol.

Coach Ralph Young declares the other men will not compete because they have not had much time to practice since the vacation period ended. The first few days of school always create havoc with athletics and this year is no exception.

After this meet the State men get a two week rest before swinging into action in the Ohio Relay events at Columbus. The Buckeye meet has been coming to the fore with great

speed since its conception a few years ago. State has attended every Ohio meet held in history. At this meet the Spartans will be pitted against the cream of the mid-west's track talent. With the several weeks of practice the men will get, they should be able to distinguish themselves as much as at the Illinois Relay carnival.

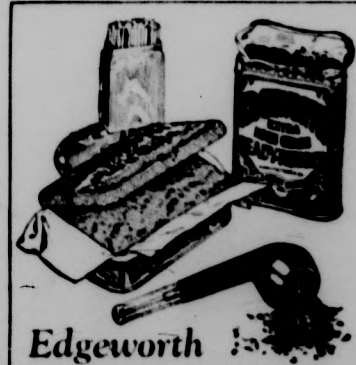
