

Every personality demands personal attention and consideration. A man with blue eyes of one shade photographs decidedly different than a man with another shade of blue eyes. The man with grayish blue eyes will look stare under certain lighting conditions and dark eyes under another. The man with dark brown eyes oftentimes looks as if his eyes were bold or button under severe lighting and in soft light the coloring of the same eyes photographs a soft gray permitting the slightest expression to register sharply. The color of the hair, the angle of the jaw, the nose, the throat and even the ears are all matters the makeup man can by his knowledge of cosmetics and photographic values change considerably.

To attend the makeup of each candidate who comes before the camera during the making of tests on the college campuses, First National executives have selected William Stroh and Mel Burns. Stroh has had 14 years experience in motion picture work as an assistant director and makeup man and as an actor. Recently he served with James Cagney in the making of "Old Ironsides" and spent 17 weeks at San Antonio with Walter Wellman making "Wings."

In selecting two forwards for the 1937 All-Central Conference team, this writer feels justified in naming Dickeson of State and Wakefield of Butler, after receiving the opinions of the various basketball coaches and athletic directors of the association. Wakefield was the offensive mainstay of the Butler team and teamed with Chadd, a splendid guard, these men virtually account for the success of the Indiana polls outfit. Leon Conroy is given the other guard berth on the All Conference choices.

With Dickeson and Wakefield at the Hawkins and Conroy teamed with Chadd to comprise the first team guard due to the selection of center was an easy task. ## STATE TRACK MEN TO COMPETE AT DETROIT MEET

After this meet the State men get a two weeks' rest before swinging into action in the Ohio Relay events at Columbus. The Buckeye meet has been coming to the fore with great

speed since its conception a few years ago. State has attended every Ohio meet held in history.

Shortly thereafter, because of his special interest in the instrument field, he was dispatched on an engineering trip abroad, visiting and working in England,

Norway, Sweden, Denmark, and France. Upon his return he entered commercial work and was assigned to the Pittsburgh territory—including such industrial centers as Cleveland, Youngstown, Pittsburgh—as specialist responsible for the sales, service, and operation of watt-hour meters, instruments, and relays in this important district. Here he will be found today, acting as intermediary between the sales force on the one hand and the engineering and factory departments on the other. He backs up the salesmen with a highly specialized knowledge. He advises with the engineers and with the factory in the design and manufacture of apparatus that is best suited to commercial requirements.

His own pioneering spirit has still found field for play, so that this year he demonstrated to the A. I. E. E. the first advance in the method of calibrating watt-hour meters in thirty years. Some 16,000,000 tests of watt-hour meters are made in this country annually. They cost about 20¢ apiece. Sparkes has devised a practicable method that cuts more than 50% off this bill—a tidy saving. It eliminates the human element; it gives greatly improved accuracy.

Thus his first ten years at Westinghouse—and not unlike that of other college men who bring with them, when they come here, energy, imagination, and the groundwork upon which to build superlative engineering proficiency.

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
