MUST WE GO DOWNTOWN?

For the past two weeks we have been unusually interested in the work of the East Lansing women bent upon prohibiting a theatre in East Lansing. Since it is an issue which reflects directly upon the Michigan State college student, we were anxious as to their success with their efforts. We withheld relief when they abandoned their total abolition scheme and compromised with a plan to prohibit Sunday shows. But even on that issue the interests of the student body will be involved.

As we understand the issue, the East Lansing women feel that the Sabbath is a day which rightfully belongs to the People's church and they are taking their stand on this platform. We appreciate the viewpoint and agree that Sunday is a day in which the People's church holds the respect of the community. However, for several years during the summer afternoons there is a general body of over half of the student body of a safe margin to assert its being theatres. The student body demands some form of entertainment or amusement and the theatre affords the widest variety possible. In view of this fact, the only point we can visualize the East Lansing women making is the forcing of the student body to board a street car or trolley to the Lansing theatres in preference to enjoying a theatre close at hand under the direction of East Lansing business men with shows presented within their supervision and censorship. We offer this comment as what we believe to be the sentiments of the Michigan State students.

During the past week, Michigan State has been favored with the presence of the members of Pi Kappa Delta national fraternity, holding their annual convention on the Michigan State College campus. We wish to indicate our interest in their activities and continued advancements. The local chapter of Pi Kappa Delta, we feel especially should be rendered the

congratulations of the Michigan State students. From a plane which excited little interest from within the school or in their contacts outside, the local organization has brought their activities into notice both at home and abroad. Debating this year has required an unusually popularity at Michigan State. Such a worthwhile activity deserves our continued encouragement.

We are revising a custom maintained several years ago by the Michigan State News of printing the minutes of the student council meetings. The student council is the organization on the campus which is best fitted to meet the desires and aims of the faculty and student body, whether it be between the student body as a whole or small groups or organizations. The work of the council is not familiar to the student in the fashion that it should be. This fact not only gives the individual a mistaken conception but decreases the utility of body in part in operating in the behalf of the student. Watch for the activities of the body in the future and respect your self with its work.

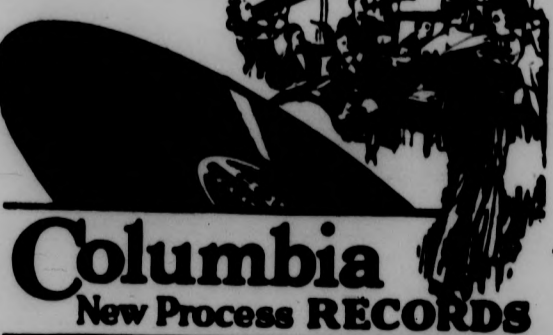

Philip Barry's satire on American family life, "The Youngest", was presented Tuesday evening by Theta Alpha Phi before an audience which comfortably filled the social rooms of the People's church.

The production was, in name and in truth, the "youngest" attempt that the dramatic organization has made at his-tonic effort this term. What was meant to be a semi-serious criticism of domestic domination became a hodge-podge, which we call burlesque, because the characters were either woefully misused or the direction was insufficient to bring out their true acting ability.

With the pleasing exceptions of Alan Martin, the lawyer, Mrs. Winslow, the mother, and Marian Trumbull, the daughter, every individual was lax in portraying his role. An excellent comedian proved to be a weak young intellectual. A sweet young miss failed to approach the spirit of a dominate personality. A rather good character actor became a colorless business man.
