WELCOME BACK, ALUMNI

Homescoming Day is but a few days away. Hundreds of alumni will return to their alma mater for a day of reunion and celebration. Old acquaintances will be renewed, old friendships will be revived and an atmosphere of cheerfulness and good fellowship will prevail.

We, as students of Michigan State, are hosts to the returning alumni. The men and women who will return Saturday have done their bit for their alma mater and deserve a royal welcome. They have reminiscences of the college as it was in the old days and they hold those memories sacred. It is our duty then to reverse all the old traditions and customs that these former students have held sacred so that when they return, they will feel at home.

Let's not see any thoughtless under-graduate breaking any old established campus tradition. Let's conform to every rule and custom that is emblematic of true Spartans. Let's stick to the stands at the football game until the final whistle blows. Let's give the old grads the glad hand and heartily welcome them back to their alma mater. We want to show them that their alma mater appreciates them, is proud of them and is glad to have them back.

UNLIMITED CUTS

Haverford is giving its year-old unlimited cut system for upperclassmen another trial, despite strong faculty opposition. Success for the plan is predicted by Dean Frederik Palmer who believes that an increasing sense of responsibility among the students will gradually overcome the evils of excess absence. Wholesale cutting of a class by a majority of the students enrolled and individual cutting of one particular class by particular students are the two points about which faculty protest centered. Little or no ill effect on grades was noted during the

next year under the plan, said Dean Palmer, who added, "personally, I hate to go back to the old system."

At the University of North Carolina the faculty has given evidence of its faith in the students by continuing the unlimited cut system instituted last year. The reform was advocated by Dean Addison Hibbard of the College of Liberal Arts who wished to emphasize the secondary importance of class attendance as opposed to accomplishment. His point evidently was well taken by the students, the Tar Heel pointing to the grades for the experimental spring quarter as one at par with those of previous periods, and in some cases higher.

This same colorful toposit in synopsis says that "Roman Summer" is the engrossing story of a middle-western boy who is something of a genius, something of a mystic, and whose youth has been curiously warped by his constant relations with his mother. It is the problem of how to get away from his mother's house, her utter lack of understanding of him that has tortured John Austin through his younger days. Finally he makes the break and goes to Rome, where in the sunlight of a Roman summer he first meets Esther Anson. Their friendship is inevitable, their love as well, and Mr. Lewisholms uses his rare author's talents to tell the story of these two young people and the barrier between them with as rare delicacy and tenderness.

Miss Nancy Hoyt has added another story to our growing library in "Unkind Star". Some clever reviewer puts

RUSHING RULES

Many of the men and independent organizations do not understand the system of rushing, bidding, and initiation into sororities. It is the purpose of this article and the following ones to give a few of the fundamentals of this system.

To limit the evils of rushing and to bring about and preserve a fraternal spirit is the purpose which has caused the Pan-Hellenic Council to create and maintain a few sorority and inter-sorority rules.

These rules go into effect immediately upon arrival in East Lansing. During Freshman Week there is no rushing of any kind either in the houses, dormitories, or private homes. No sorority matters are mentioned and no sorority jewelry is worn.

Rushing begins the first week of school and covers a period of fourteen days. No entering girl may be pledged during this time. The rushing dates may vary according to societies but in number shall consist of eight parties, four each week on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday. No rushing date lasts over four hours and cards of registration form are sent out by each sorority to the rushers. These are taken to the house matrons between noon and two p. m. on the day previous to the rushing date, and are called for at 8 a. m. on the following day.

Invitations to downtown girls may be delivered to the mail boxes at the homes and the rushers may respond by telephone. No society may ask a rusher to a future rushing date while the rusher is being entertained at the sorority home.
