ACCEPTS CHALLENGE

I cannot see that...

From a purely personal standpoint, if the opportunity pleases you, if it will give you pleasure to unload personal opinions, I will be glad to debate some time during the first month of the winter term, on a basis of individual responsibility only. If I have colleagues, that will probably become apparent in due time, otherwise I shall continue as I started without any pretense of an organization.

Compulsory military training at the schools and colleges of this country is not a good thing for the men taking it for the country teaching it, or for the world that both live in. Any military training is wrong because it is the biggest factor in a mammoth preparation for war to prevent war, a program now being carried out by this country. To the militarists who advocate this policy really believe that preparation for war will prevent war. They say they do perhaps they do but they should be ashamed to admit that they are spending such a large share of the nation's resources to that end in that way. With the same amount of money and time a much more modern and scientific method could be worked out to settle quarrels between countries. War is not legal. It has always been the accepted way to settle differences between groups. The world has advanced and countries are now brought closer together by the various inventions and projects of the world as a whole. In peace everything is progressing splendidly and the world grows on beautifully. But some countries make a misstep some men commit a tiny peek and the countries must all be defended. Force is used. All the results of a peaceful period are destroyed and an economic and social turmoil is incurred. No one should uphold the theory

that war is the best method of maintaining peace. It is not sensible. And I can not see why preparation for war is the best method of preventing war, if that is the object of preparation, which I doubt.

Student militarists, who turn their thoughts from an all-night perusal of the current humor magazines to writing emulating the Campus Forum, should emulate the Ring Lardner or H. L. Mencken style, should accumulate a few facts and present them in a more dignified manner, if they are to save compulsory military training from the fate which is coming to it, as an accessory to war. A long time will be required for the outlaws of war as the only sure method of protection and safety from invasion, but I believe that such a costly and destructive form of national or governmental entertainment is going to be thought about by the people and they will think very seriously about an institution which robs them of the greater share of the national wealth, every year kills their young men, demoralizes their entire population, and destroys their property, and which, as a body, does them no direct or indirect

good, and prevents from them no harm which can not be prevented by more sane and modern methods.

However, I present the above line of thought merely to point out the futility of war as a means of making peace, and not in direct opposition to the local military training. Personally, I think that, while the local military training is wrong in principle, it has enough advantages and offers enough benefits to make it very valuable to the student, and for these benefits, it should be compulsory. As other students have pointed out, it makes a man of a fellow, although I am not convinced that it is the best method of achieving that end.

But we must remember that, in spite of these advantages, military training will go following in the wake of all other barbarian tendencies which can not survive the ultra-modern ideas of

a more advanced civilization than this world has ever reached before according to present knowledge. As a college activity, training is excellent, and aside from the expenditure of money, does little visible harm, but unfortunately, it has a much deeper and more ominous object for the youth of the country than the mere physical training that we think we are getting.

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SPARTANS FACE SOUTHERNERS WITH HIGH HOPES OF VICTORY

Squad of 27 Men in Perfect Physical Condition.

NORTH CAROLINA STRONG

Carolians Expected to Center Attack Around Ends.

With hopes running high and in perfect physical condition, the Michigan State football squad is waiting in Raleigh, N. C., tonight to meet the Scarlet and Gray of North Carolina State tomorrow.

Head Coach Young, Assistant Coaches Kipke, Traynor and Casted, Trainer Jack Heppinstall and a squad of 27 men, upon whom rest the hopes of the Spartan followers, comprise the State delegation to the Southland.

Although pre-season scrimmages amounted to much and the play of the Spartan eleven has been erratic this year, much optimism was in evidence among the squad when it departed for Raleigh. North Carolina has lost only one game in nine this year and is ranked among the leaders in the south. The Spartan machine has been slow in rounding into its true form, but if any team can be gained of its ability from the showing made against Albion and Butler in its last two engagements, it is difficult to predict a Spartan defeat.

The interference that the Spartans have been putting into effect the last two weeks for the ball carriers, has carried everything else off and if it functions properly against North Carolina, the Carolinians will have a full afternoon's work out for them in stopping Verne Dickson, Henry Schau and Paul Smith. Off tackle plays will probably be the keynote of
