In some cases perhaps there may be legitimate excuses for athletes not competing in varsity sport. Indignity, outside work, or another sport may interfere and wisecracks will point to this athlete as an example of the interfraternity evil. This would be an injustice to the man and to his fraternity and it would be wise to proceed rather slowly in any accusations of laxity in college sport.

Nevertheless we must admit that where there is smoke there is fire and it would be a great idea if a few of the fraternities would send some of their reps over to Coach Young and get them into a varsity track suit. It may take a few little cups from the mantelpieces of some societies but it will add a few varsity men's pictures to the wall, and in later years when these cups have tarnished and have been thrown out, these pictures will remain as evidence of a duty well done.

At present the group is working on a program to be given the night of Feb. 1 during Farmers' week. Two groups of numbers will be given that evening.

This will be the first public appearance of the student chorus this winter term and although a number of new faces will be noted in the group, the majority of the members who have longed last term are back again with redoubled interest. Mr. Farwell continues to urge new members to join and special arrangements have been made whereby the action is made possible even at this late date.

The girls' chorus meets Wednesday from 5 to 6 p. m. and the men meet on Tuesday from 5 to 6. The entire chorus convenes Thursday from 5 to 6, all meetings being held in the auditorium, room 200 of the Horticulture building.

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# STATE CAGERS DROP TWO HARD BATTLES ON WEEK-END TRIP

## Spartans Lose to Loyola 21-23 and Marquette 18 to 21 in Hard Battles.

### ONE OVERTIME GAME

#### Loyola Game Goes Into Two Overtime Periods as Irish Win.

On the first long trip of the year the Michigan State basketball squad suffered two defeats, one Friday evening at the hands of the Loyola university five at Chicago by a score of 23-21, and the other on Saturday evening by the Marquette university cagers at Milwaukee, Wis., by a score of 21-18. The Friday evening contest took two overtime periods to decide the victors while in the Saturday tilt the Spartans almost regained the lead after a desperate rally, only to lose by three points.

Both games which were played by the Michigan State team were the week-end were wonderful defensive games. Only a few shots were taken in either game and these had to be taken under a great deal of pressure. The Spartans' offensive attack was severely handicapped by several of the veterans being slightly over edge after the trying games of the past week. Felt, Colvin and Russo, the regulars that were most afflicted by stiffness. None of these men was able to play the game that he is capable of and the team suffered as a result. The reserves who were used at various periods during the two games did expectantly well when called upon. Tolson, Sheathelm, and Russo all showed fine form when substituting for the regulars. Don Herder was the main point getter for Coach VanAlstyne's outfit in both games. In the Loyola game he caged nine points while in the Saturday evening game this fast Grand Haven cager scored five field goals and two free throws for 12 of State's total of 18 points. In the first game he was used at forward while during the second tilt he was used at forward center and guard positions. His playing was the outstanding performance of the trip. Schan played fine defensive games on both nights.

The Loyola game on Friday evening was lost in the final minutes of the second overtime period when Loyola forward, caged two exceptionally long shots from beyond the center of the playing floor to put his team in the lead after Dickson gave State a two point lead in the opening minutes of the period by dribbling in for a short shot. The Spartans played a defense game during the first half and in the second half the Loyola five beat the advance of the half, 12-5. In the second half the Michigan State boys led by Don Herder came near breaking Loyola's record of having won the 14 straight games on their home floor by opening up an offensive drive that tied the score 19-19 just as the last minute of regulation play was over. In the first overtime period the Spartans had possession of the ball for the larger portion of the time but neither team was able to score. During the second extra period Dickson scored on the first tipoff to put State in the lead and then Lawless' long shots sealed the doom for the Spartans. The game was said to be one of the best that has been played at Loyola in many years.

# INTER-FRAT MEET TO BE HELD SAT

## Preliminaries to Take Place on Thursday and Friday Afternoons.

Keen competition is expected in the annual interfraternity indoor track and field meet which is scheduled to be held in the State gymnasium on Saturday afternoon. Most of the fraternities are expected to put strong teams in the field and the rivalry will be just as strong as ever.

Fraternities are urged to send in their entries as early as possible because the deadline has been set for Wednesday noon. Each man may enter each event from each fraternity, but only two will be allowed to start. Only active members of the fraternities will be eligible to compete. Members of varsity and freshmen track squads are barred.

Preliminaries will be held in the 40 yard dash and high hurdles at 5:15 p. m. Thursday and the prelims in the 100 yard dash event will be run off at 5:45 p. m. Friday. The finals of these three events and the preliminaries and finals in the pole vault, 440 yard dash, 220 yard dash, high jump, shot put, 880 yard run, will be held on Saturday afternoon beginning at 1 o'clock sharp.

Ribbons will be given winners of first, second, third and fourth places and a large trophy for the winning team. Last year the Phi Kappa won the trophy while the Gamma Epsilon held the award in 1925 and 1926.

# SPARTANS SNATCH LAURELS FROM CHICAGO MATMEN IN CLOSE BOUT

The Michigan State wrestling team won its second victory of the season when they defeated the University of Chicago at Chicago Friday night 18-17. This is the second time in as many years that the Spartans have beaten this Western Conference team.

After losing the first two matches of the evening by decision, Stomer, for State turned the tide by winning his match in the 145 lb. class by virtue of a time advantage. Capt. Landsturg and Bean then won their matches, which gave State a total of 13 points against the 6 points for Chicago.

In the 175 pound class, however, Kurde for State was outclassed and pinned to the mat by Krough for Chicago. This victory put the Chicago wrestlers back in the running and the score stood 14-11 for State before the final match began. The victory of George Ferrari, Michigan A. T. heavy weight champion in 1926, won the meet for the Spartans.

The three falls and one victory by decision gave the Michigan State men their margin. Capt. Landsturg's victory over Capt. Penstone in the 145 pound division was the sensation of the evening. Penstone of Chicago was runner up for the Big Ten title in his class last year but the Spartan grappler pinned him to the mat in 9 minutes and 5 seconds.

Many Michigan State alumni who live in the vicinity of Chicago were on hand to cheer for their alma mater. Coach Leonard's team left for Chicago on Thursday afternoon and will be in a very short time before training camp. They are expected to have a meet with the Armour Tech wrestlers of Chicago on Saturday evening. Thursday the State athletic department of the University of Chicago will be in the city on the occasion of the meet. The Spartans returned from Chicago Saturday afternoon.
