PLAN TO BUILD NEW DORMITORY IN NEAR FUTURE
Will House at Least Sixty Students and Cost at Least \$100,000.
MAY BE READY IN FALL To Be Financed by Detroit Trust Co.; Will Pay for Itself.

Plans for a dormitory to house at least sixty students and costing at least \$100,000 will be presented to the State Board of Agriculture for approval at the next meeting, Feb. 15. It was announced today by Secretary H. H. Halladay, who has just returned from a conference in Detroit with officials of the Detroit Trust company who are to finance the project.

Approval of the legality of the financing plan was announced in an opinion given by Attorney General William W. Potter last Monday.

The building will be built by the Detroit Trust Company and the management will remain in the hands of the college, becoming the permanent possession of the college in fifteen years. According to the plan, land will be secured by the Trust company by the college. The building will then be financed and constructed by the company and leased back to the college. A low schedule of rents will be drawn up which will enable the college to pay interest and principle on the dormitory in fifteen years.

FEES

A special election will soon be held by the Student Council in an endeavor to ascertain student opinion on the new system of fees that is being inaugurated. The fees committee has made a number of recommendations and it is up to the student body to abide with their judgment or reject their proposals.

Three propositions have been passed on by the State Board of Agriculture and the Student Council and will be submitted to a student referendum next week. One proposal calls for the reduction of the artists' course fee from thirty-four cents to twenty-five cents per term and the addition of one dollar and fifty cents as a music fee.

With the proceeds of this music fee, prominent artists, singers, and musicians will be brought to East Lansing during the next year and State students will be given the opportunity of hearing these masters at a nominal cost.

It would be a distinct advantage to music lovers at Michigan State to have the pleasure of hearing these artists and it is hoped that this can be made possible.

The Liberal Arts fee will be reduced if the students so desire, to a minimum with the result that no musicians will appear on the arts program. Lecturers and leaders in thought and activity will constitute the personnel of the Arts program if present plans go through.

It is to be hoped that all students will go to the polls next Wednesday and register their approval or disapproval of the policy of the fee committee. Only in this manner can those in charge ascertain the sentiment of the student body on these propositions. Let's all get out and have our say.
