STATE DEFEATS TITAN SQUAD IN HARD FOUGHT OVERTIME TILT 17-13

Playing a strong defensive type of basketball, the Michigan State team defeated the University of Detroit five at Detroit Friday evening in an overtime period which had to be played when at the end of the regulation time the score was tied 13-13. The victory was the second of the season over the Titans by the Spartans, earlier in the season the Detroit five having lost a game here in overtime play also.

Holding the advantage at the end of the first half, the Spartans led until within two minutes of the end of the regulation game when Brazil, star guard for the Titans, dropped in a basket from the center of the floor, thus tying the score 13-13. In a wildly played overtime period, both teams battled to get possession of the ball. Late in the period, Duke Schan, after bringing the ball down the entire length of the floor, passed to Don Herder in front of the basket, and Freddie tossed in the first basket of the overtime period. On the next tip off the ball was tipped to Don Herder who quickly passed it to VanZylen who was under the basket, and another basket was marked up for the Spartans. A minute later the game ended.

With Felt on the sick list for a couple of days, the State coach, Benjamin VanAlstyne, started Totten at center. Dickson and Grove got the call at forwards and Russo and Schan were assigned the guarding positions.

After two minutes of play, both teams having tried to score several times but failing, Grove scored the first basket of the game and Felt was sent in for Totten. David for Detroit then scored a free throw and Brazil a field goal to put the Titans in the lead 3-2. Grove regained the lead for State by shooting a long shot. Coach VanAlstyne sent in Don Herder to take the place of Dickson. The U. of D. then caged a free throw and a field goal to lead 6-4 but Don Herder dropped in a basket from the side of the court to tie up the count.

M. Gilliland, was substituted for Russo at guard and then Felt scored his first basket of the evening, thus giving State a lead which was not overcome until the last two minutes of the game. For several minutes neither team was able to score, because of the strengthening of both defenses. Felt caged another basket a few minutes later, giving State a four point lead, 10-6, which stood for the rest of the half. Detroit sent in "Cowboy" Connel and Phelan in place of Butler and Maloney, but to no avail.

Both teams came back on the floor at the beginning of the second half

with the same lineup that was in the game at the end of the first period. Several times in the first few minutes of play the Spartans tried to score but failed. Then Felt, taking a short pass from Don Herder, gave State two more points. State, holding a 12-6 lead, began to play a careful passing game and held possession of the ball most of the first part of the period. Detroit added three points to their side of the ledger when Phelan scored a free shot and David caged a field goal.

With the score standing 12-9, the crowd began to get excited. When the Detroit fans razzed Cleary, the referee, on an out of bounds play, this official called a technical foul against the U. of D. team. Felt was delegated to 1/2 for goal. With a steady hand he dropped in what proved to be the only free shot of the game for the Spartans. At this point Butler, who had been sent back into the game, scored a field goal, which closed the gap to but two points. Dickson, who replaced Grove earlier in the game, was then substituted for by VanZylen, Brazil for Detroit was called on to tie the score. This fast guard had tried many shots all evening but had only scored one previous to this shot

from the center of the floor which was the cause of overtime play.

In the overtime play the two teams both played hard, but VanZylen and Don Herder were able to decide the issue in States favor by their field goals in the latter part of the period.
