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SPARTANS JOURNEY TO MILWAUKEE FOR TRACK MEET SATURDAY NIGHT

State Conceded Slight Edge in Contest; McAtee-Glaser Duel to Be Highlight.

THIRD CLASH OF YEAR

After a week of hard practice in preparation for the dual meet with Marquette university on Saturday, the Michigan State track team will leave for Milwaukee, Wis., tonight. The Spartans are anxious to retain their string of dual track meet victories that stretches back nearly two years.

The Michigan State thirdinals are conceded a slight edge in the meet Saturday owing to the show-up which the two teams made last week in the Central Intercollegiate at Notre Dame. State was second with 22 1/2 points while Marquette was third with 19 1/2 points.

One of the highlights of the meet is expected to be the third meeting of the year of Glaser, Marquette's ace and Harold McAtee, the Spartan sky jumper. In the pole vaulting event early in the season McAtee climbed over the bar when it was set at 13 feet 1 1/2 inch in the Michigan A. A. U. meet here. A week later, however, Glaser completed against McAtee here in the Michigan State Relay carnival and won the event by successfully going over 12 feet 6 inches. Last week at Notre Dame the two rivals were tied for first place at a height of 12 feet 6 inches. This event there also is expected to come out about even.

Marquette will hold the edge in the high jump and hurdles, it is expected, while the remarkable performance of Pfeiffer in the distance runs at the Central Intercollegiate indicates that Mark Mason's men will have plenty of trouble in the mile and two mile events.

With Smith and Tillotson entered in the shot put, the Spartans are expected to cop this event. Lang, Benson, Peterson, Henderson, Kroff, and Salmon should successfully defend the State outfit in the sprints, while the relay teams in the 880 yard and one mile events are expected to come through with a good performance.

OLYMPICS WIN INTER-FRAT BASKETBALL CUP

The Olympic society team became champions of the Inter-Fraternity basketball league last night when they defeated the Phi Kappa Tau in the final, 15 to 7. The Olympics earned their right to the finals by a 12 to 7 victory over the Phi Delta, while the Phi Kappa Tau trimmed the Delta Sigma Phi, 12 to 2, in the semi-finals. In winning their block title, the Olympics defeated the Psi Chis, 20 to 4, the Epsilon, 18 to 6, the Gamma, 16 to 6, and the Phi Gamma, 28 to 6.

Those who played on the winning team throughout the season were: Fogg, Fricker and Watkins, forwards; DeVries, Plante and Wilson, centers; Kelly, Garcia, Doyle, Needham and Kurde, guards.

Roosien and Hackney will probably run in the half mile for State and should pile up some points in this event. Captain Wylie, Roosien and Willmarth are entered in the one mile run. Brown, Grove, and Willmarth will run in the two mile event.

The Spartans this season have made a good record so far. In the first meet of the year the Green and White team won the Michigan A. A. U. championship here. Then they took a dual meet from Ohio Wesleyan with ease and the next week took major honors in the Michigan State Relay carnival. Last week the Spartans took second place in the Central Intercollegiate at South Bend, Ind. After the dual meet Saturday only one more meet is left for the indoor squad, competition at the University of Illinois, held at Champaign, Ill., on March 17.

SPARTAN FRESH TAKE TWO GAMES

Calvin College and Grand Rapids Juniors Fall Before State Cagers.

Comprehending both the Calvin College and the Junior College fives of Grand Rapids on their own floors was what the Michigan State College freshman basketball team accomplished in putting a suitable closing to their school year last week end. On Thursday evening the Spartan cagers won a victory over the Calvin College aggregation, 33-26. The following evening the undefeated Grand Rapids Junior court team met its first defeat at the hands of the State five whom the future city boys had previously defeated in East Lansing by a margin of four points. The yearlings won 34-25 after piling up a large lead in the first half.

The Calvin-Michigan State game was featured by the fast passing of the winners who completely fooled the Grand Rapids boys. The Spartan Fresh worked smoothly and easily outplayed their opponents. Peary, right forward for State was the high point man for the winners with thirteen points while Clark, at center and Grove at guard were second and third with nine and eight points respectively. Besides these men, Coach Traynor

used Hagn, Prendergast, Scott, Bayler, and VanZanden.

The Friday evening game drew more attention however, because of the fact that the Grand Rapids Junior team had won fourteen games straight this season while the Spartans have only lost one game, that being at the hands of Junior. Among Junior's victims are Flint Junior, Kalamazoo College, and Calvin. The game turned out differently than the Grand Rapids fans had hoped for, and the State fresh team easily won 34-25.

Clark, center for State, drew the first blood when he scored a field goal in the opening minutes of play. Grove and Peary quickly followed with one apiece before the bewildered Furniture City lads could score. Forman, G. R. forward, then caged a long shot. This was the extent of Junior's scoring until the Spartans had run the score up to 13-2. In the remaining minutes of the first period Coach Traynor's men caged five points to their opponents six, the score at the half being 18-8 in favor of State.

During the second half the Michigan State team maintained their lead by the strong defensive game they put up. Grand Rapids Junior tried to rally several times but it was to no avail.

Roger Grove was the high scorer of the evening with five field goals and

four free shots for a total of fourteen points. Clark was second with ten points. Scott played the outstanding defensive game for the winners.
