NOTED VIOLINIST TO HEAD VIOLIN DEPT. AT STATE

Michael Press Brings Talent of Wide Experience to College.

COMES FALL TERM

Michael Press, internationally known violinist and conductor, has been selected to head the violin department of Michigan State college starting in an announcement made in Lansing.

Mr. Press will come to East Lansing in September when the newly established Institute of Music and Allied Arts opens its doors to the general public.

Michael Press was born in Russia and began his artistic career as appearing on the concert stage at the age of 10.

In 1901 Press accepted the post of professor of music at the Moscow Imperial Conservatory of Music and simultaneously became head of the violin department.

Press was awarded first prize in 1903 in the famous Moscow competition series of concerts participated in by 20 of the world's best known violinists.

Following the Bolshevik revolution, he left Russia and conducted symphony orchestras for a period of two years.

In 1924 he came to the United States and for the last three years he has devoted his time to conducting a large class of violin students who have come to him and will come from Europe as well.

During this same period Mr. Press has been employed as soloist with the leading symphony orchestras of the world and has conducted several important engagements with the Boston Symphony orchestra, the Philadelphia orchestra of Philadelphia, and other important symphony orchestras.

Aside from instruction in the violin, Mr. Press will conduct chamber music and orchestral classes.

### HILLTOP THINCLADS NOSE OUT STATERS SATURDAY

Marquette Univ. Comes from Behind to Win Dual Meet; Four Records Broken.

Marquette university track team came from behind Saturday to take a thrilling dual meet from the Michigan State college Spartans, 59 1/2 to 52 1/2, over 850 people witnessed the meet, the first dual meet between the two schools since 1925 when the Green and White fell to the Badgers.

Four gymnasium records were broken during the afternoon and one tied. Paul Smith tossed the shot 43 feet 2 1/2 inches and Captain Henry Wylie beat out "Dutch" Pfeiffer in the mile in 4 minutes, 39.5 seconds. McAtee and Glazer disappointed the fans by failing to do over 12 feet, both men being capable of much better marks.

The meet had all the earmarks of being a one-sided affair for the Spartans were leading at one time 31.7, but Marquette staged one of the greatest uphill battles ever offered by a Hill top team and finally nosed out the Spartans. The meet was decided by
