Whether such a condition is pleasing, displeasing, or merely to be tolerated, is a matter of sentiment and rests with the individual. We do not say that it is desirable to see coeds strolling down the street puffing at a cigarette. No more do we maintain that coeds should be prohibited from partaking of this doubtful pleasure. As far as personal injury to the individual is concerned, reputable doctors state that the female is affected to more than the male of the species.

Despite the fact that a majority of the coeds have taken up the habit and opinion is predominantly in favor of freedom in the matter, the enforceable rule remains hanging over their heads. Punishment for the offenders, if brought before the W. S. G. A. for the act, is probation. Fortunately, the coed council during the past year has seen fit to be lenient in the matter of maintaining strict enforcement of the rule.

Retention of the rule on the books can have no other than the opposite effect intended. To the adventurous it is a direct invitation to disobey it. That which is prohibited always has more of an appeal than that which is permitted. No doubt the repealing of the law would cause smoking to lose its attractiveness to many.

Generally speaking, however, smoking is a matter of the individual and no such should be left to the individual to decide. As a matter of upholding personal freedom, the governing coed body should eradicate clauses in its by-laws on matters such as smoking over which it rightfully should not attempt to maintain jurisdiction.
