INTERFERENCE

Recently there has been considerable agitation about the steps concerning the recommendation of the athletic council to the state board of agriculture upon the personnel of the athletic department for next year. Petitions have been circulated and numerous movements promoted in opposition.

A majority of the students perhaps have given their approval in some fashion to the movements through signing petitions or in similar ways. But we wonder if proper consideration has been given the problem. Has not emotion been aroused at the thought that some one has been given a poor deal and then the emotion played up on to engender dissatisfaction with the athletic council's acts? There was but one side of the case presented with the petitions. Perhaps there are some elements on the other side.

Without doubt the athletic department is tabling at the present time under a heavy load of expense. Main tenance of equipment, salaries, stadium debt, and other items make great demands on other appropriations. There is no questioning the value of the move of the athletic council in obtaining well known and competent men as head of major sports. They went to their financial limit to obtain them. In order to bear up under the heavy load, cuts must be made somewhere. This they did, knowing all the facts, figures and demands to be met.

The athletic council is composed of members of the faculty, alumni, and students chosen for their ability to take care of such problems. It is their duty to run the athletic department in such a way as to benefit the majority of the student body. This they are attempting to do. They were vociferously applauded last fall when new coaches were added. No one questioned their wisdom. It is apparent that some sacrifice had to be made. Now that we have to make the sacrifice, cuts of objection go up.

It is said that minor sports are to be eliminated, that students pay a sum of money each term and that they will not receive the proper benefit from it, that only a small number of athletes will receive attention.

Minor sports are to continue. This branch of physical education will not be removed. Of course, those participating may not receive such high salaried instruction as was formerly the case, but that is the sacrifice being made. It is small in comparison to that which we have traded for it.

Let us back up our athletic coun

cil. They are a new body, still in the first year of their existence. We have given them the work of handling athletic affairs. Why attempt to cover their heads and take charge of things. Are those people who are attempting to assume direction, not willing to figure out a way of meeting other problems of the department? Can they point to better solutions of remedying the high-borne expense account? Interference should stop and the council permitted to function as it is compared to.

THE CONTROL OF WOMEN

A survey of the social regulations in force at 30 of the best known universities in the United States shows that standard women have a set of the most liberal rules in the country. The University of California is the only college where the university authorities allow 2 o'clock leave. At the southern branch of the University of California living groups are permitted to formulate their own rules, subject to the approval of the administration, and 2 o'clock leave is allowable by certain living groups for some week-end nights. The only administrative restriction is that no

cellers must be out of the living group by 10:30 on week nights and 11 on week-end nights.

Closing hours for the living groups at the 30 colleges surveyed vary from 8 o'clock to 10:30, with 10 o'clock proving to be the most popular time. Other colleges have an 8 o'clock week night deadline while Louisiana State and the University of Texas have the most liberal. Elsewhere, The western colleges had the 10 o'clock rule the most popular. O. S. C., Colorado, Nevada, and Washington State, observing it. Idaho enforces a 9:45 lockout rule, and at U. S. C. we find it is 9:50, while Washington provides a 10:15 limit.

The greatest diversity in the rules at most colleges exists in the difference of treatment of freshman and upper class women. At Washington State College, the freshmen lead a sheltered life, being forced to stay in their living rooms every week night after 7:30. In Montana they are allowed no dates on week nights, while Cornell's women's self-governing group requires sophomores and freshman women to be in by 8 o'clock. Seniors have more liberal privileges at most of the universities.

Stanford's parties of less than six persons has been hosted at in the past, but Florida State College for Women requires a party of 10 for a long hike on the highway after dark, provided the women are freshmen, in accordance with the University of Tennessee's regulation that no less than two couples may go boating, driving or dining in a public place.

Michigan's rules resemble those in force at Stanford more than the regulations at any other college. They are identical with our old rules, except that 12:30 is the limit for Saturday night leave.

Smoking is permitted only at Bryn Mawr under certain conditions. In the regulations of the other colleges it is either ignored or prohibited.

Phi Kappa Phi to Initiate New Members at Banquet

Phi Kappa Phi is purely a national honorary society and membership therein is an award for distinguished scholarship. The original society was organized in 1897 at the University of Maine. Chapters now exist in 45 of the colleges and universities of the country.

In kind it is classed with Sigma Xi and Phi Beta Kappa, differing from these only in that its elections to membership are made from any one of the several divisions of the college.

Thinclads Lose Dual Meet to Indiana Squad in Hot Contest.

SMASH RECORDS

Michigan State will be the host of several Michigan colleges Friday and Saturday in the 15th annual intercollegiate track and field meet.

Notre Dame won the dual meet Saturday from State's tracksters by a foot and a half, or by two points. The score after a breath-taking half mile was 64 to 62. State was on the short end.

The fact that Notre Dame secured seven first places out of a possible 14 shows the closeness of the meet. They also secured four second places and 13 thirds.

State's one mile and two miles performed even better than was expected. Bill Brown of Notre Dame was the chief contender of the Spartan miles.

One of the finest exhibitions of distance running was staged in the two mile which was another record smashing event.

Another varsity record was shattered in the javelin throw by Hayden of State when he hurled the stick 182 feet 1.14 inches.

The Irish's crack sprinter, Elder, started the meet off by winning the 100 yard dash from Benson of State.

State won both the discus and the shot put. Ellotson took the discus and Smith, former captain of the foot ball team, captured the shot put.

The Indians won both the high jump and the broad jump. Baldwin tied for second and third with Griffin of Notre Dame in the high jump.

Although Fred Alderman broke Morrison's record of 24.7 for the 250 yard dash, his time of 23.9 seconds will not be officially recognized because of the breeze that was at his back.
