GROUNDLESS FEARS

The long contemplated and expected action of the State Board was taken last Tuesday. President Butterfield resigned his position as head of the administration in one short sentence, after holding this document up as long as possible. This culmination of the months of dispute and dissatisfaction between the various parties concerned was inevitable.

Now that this part of the regretful episode is complete and Robert S. Shaw, dean of agriculture, has been chosen as the president of the institution, rumors and subsequent fears are existing on the campus that the college may be returned somewhat to an agricultural status, that the recent advance ment towards a broader curriculum will be hindered. An impression has been formed in

some manner that, since Dean Shaw is head of the agricultural division and is representative of the older group on the faculty which is predominantly agricultural, this division will have precedence over others and funds may perhaps be more expended on agricultural matters.

Fears of this type are groundless. It is only necessary for those who anticipate retrogression to look back over the record of the two other terms in which Dean Shaw has ruled to see that progress in the more cultural direction has not been impeded but has been definitely aided.

We are confident that Dean Shaw will continue the development of the college in this respect. He is reported as saying that he will resign as head of the agricultural division and devote his entire time to the administration of college affairs, solving the many serious problems which are confronting him. This move seems to show evidence that he has the proper realization that he is the head of a single division of the college no longer, but is the chief executive of an institution composed of many divisions and departments. Rightly the college as a whole should now occupy its entire attention.

As to the man himself, it is known that Robert S. Shaw is a Scotchman, and does have the traditional canny sense of business and balance for which that race is noted. Dissension among the faculty should disappear under his fair treatment. When the student body becomes more acquainted with him they also will repose their trust and confidence in him.

But above all this, there exists another quality in Dean Shaw which seems far more important. He has a vision of the institution of the future which few others have or could possibly have. His many year's work and labor here has given him an intimate acquaintance with the institution's problems, its needs, its possibilities. Vision of this type is all important in a man who holds the responsible office in an institution of this character.

However, above and beyond these things, surpassing the ambitions, beyond the scope of the State Board, there remains the institution. Michigan State College is greater than any man included in it or at the head of it. It moves ahead and in moving ahead carries with it its component parts. Of course those who are guiding the college have a small effect on the

speed with which objectives are reached. Nevertheless, these objectives of a greater college, a broader curriculum, increased enrollment, educational prestige, are inevitable. It is a question merely of how soon. We are willing to go ahead with President Shaw. And finally, we hope that affairs will assume a greater stability and this campus will become a more fertile ground for confidence. Pace Requiescamus.

NEW X-RAY EQUIPMENT IN PHYSICS DEPARTMENT

The latest type of General Electric X-ray diffraction apparatus has recently been installed in the physics department at Michigan State college. It will be used for the analysis of the structure of crystals, the structure of solids, and other lines of investigation.

The first diffraction photographs were taken from the machine Friday, May 18, after an exposure of 27 hours. W. G. Keck, a junior electrical engineering student, who is taking special work in physics, has installed the machine under the direction of members of the physics staff.

M. H. Jones, of the Physics X-Ray Lab at Detroit, is presenting the department with some interesting X-ray diffraction patterns.

This meet is probably the oldest one held in America. Competition will be very keen, as there is almost certain to be athletes from all parts of the country.

State will be represented by men that the coaches believe have a very good chance of winning places. The two miniature two-milers, Willmarth and Brown, have not been seriously pushed this year. It will be interesting to see what they will do under the stiff competition at Harvard stadium. Under good conditions they ought to do some fast stepping.

Captain Wylie and Clark will represent State in the mile run. They both have been going pretty strong lately. They are capable of time under 4:30 which ought to make their chances for places up in the front rank rather certain.

Michigan State's pole vaulter will not attend the meet at Cambridge, as the coaches feel that a little rest will put him in better shape to compete at the Central Intercollegiate meet at Marquette university a week from Saturday where he will again meet Roy of Notre Dame and Glazer of Marquette.

FROSH BEAT FLINT JUNIOR COLLEGE

SPARTANS HOSTS TO THINCLADS

805 High School Athletes from 161 Schools to Compete in 22nd Annual Meet.

Michigan State is the host of eight hundred and fifty athletes from one hundred and sixty one high schools of Michigan at the 22nd annual track and field meet which began at Michigan State stadium this afternoon with the trials. The trials will start tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.

This meet is a "Tri-L" that is, four classes will be competing, class A, B, C, and D high schools. Members will compete with others in their own class. In order to keep up the meet, only those who qualified in the seven regional meets last Saturday will compete. This meet will therefore bring together some of the best high school athletes of the state.

As usual the Detroit schools will enter strong teams. Detroit Northwestern, the winner last year, will have sixteen men in action. They plan on repeating their victory of 1927.
