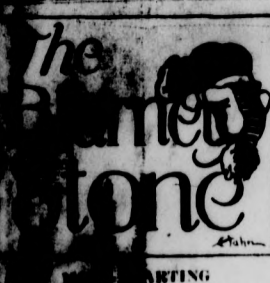

**RENEWAL.**  
 Raising the curtain on a new year, the State News again takes up its work on the campus with this issue. We greet the returning students and stances present in the many phases of an increase in the size of the student body and unusually propitious circumstances present in th many phases of campus life. It appears that real progress should take place.

The State News policy will continue to be very much the same, that is, a constructive attitude generally and destructive when the need is apparent. Much was accomplished last year, but there still remain a number of things mentioned heretofore toward which we shall continue to work.

It is to be hoped that student government organizations, and we mean the four principal ones, will continue to receive the support and aid of the administration. Especially is it necessary at this time that those two governing the activities of the various societies be given the backing to enforce rules relating to the usually chaotic "every man for himself" period of rushing. Only by firm and determined action can it be controlled.

Equally important is the attitude both on the part of the student body and the administration, toward the student council and the W. S. G. A. council. Relation of the councils to these two groups is entirely that of an intermediary. It is their duty to be of service to both in that capacity. Inasmuch as prestige and strength are gained by increased use, it will be immensely to the advantage of all concerned to avail themselves of it.

Also, among the most important of those points which were outlined in the State News last spring and for which we shall still strive is that of improvement of the personnel of the teaching staff of the college, both through elimination and addition. Some departments are strong as they are, but others are in need of reinforcements or rearrangements. We feel that nothing can benefit the institution more than amelioration of these weaknesses as soon as possible.

### 43 SEEK BERTHS ON VARSITY TEAM

Gridders Round Into Form as Kipke Puts Them Through Scrimmages.

About 50 men reported for varsity football practice to Head Football Coach Harry Kipke and his staff on Sept. 10 when the Spartan coaches began training the 1928 Michigan State college football squad for the annual grid schedule. Since that time more candidates have reported, but owing to a recent cut, there are but 43 left on the list.

Two practices a day was the program mapped out for the football camp and in the two weeks preceding the opening of college the squad was put into fairly good condition. Fundamentals took a good share of the grid men's time for the first 10 days but Coach Kipke called for a scrimmage on Tuesday, Sept. 18. At that

### TICKET RULES TO BE ENFORCED

Rules governing the use of student athletic tickets and the purchase and disposal of tickets obtained through the exchange of coupons will be strictly enforced this year, according to L. L. Frimond, assistant director of athletics and fiscal dispenser of tickets at Michigan State college.

Wholesale disregard on the part of students and members of the college staff in the use of student athletic books is given as the reason for the future "on your mark" attitude to be employed by athletic department officials.

The conditions under which student athletic books are sold to students and members of the college staff, says Assistant Director Frimond, are plainly stated on the back cover of each book. In the first place, he books are not transferable and can be used only by the purchaser.

Coupons from student athletic books can be exchanged for football tickets only by the purchaser of the student athletic book. Such tickets are not transferable, neither can they be sold to outsiders or other students. People who purchase tickets at the chance of having the tickets confiscated at the game.

The athletic department has a record of every ticket sold for each game. At a glance it is possible to tell in whom each seat has been sold and whether it was purchased with cash or with a student coupon. Careful checks at the gates and in the stands have revealed that the privileges of student athletic books have been flagrantly violated. In the future the rules governing their use will be strictly enforced.
