26 STATE CAGERS ANSWER INITIAL CALL OF COACH

Eight Lettermen Led by Captain Carl Felt Start Training for State's Stiffest Schedule.

HOLD PRACTICES DAILY

Preparations for one of the toughest basketball schedules to be played by a Michigan State team in the history of the college were begun Monday evening when 26 men answered Coach Benjamin VanAlstyne's initial call for candidates for the 1928-29 team. Practices will be held daily during the remainder of the season.

The list of candidates was headed by Carl Felt, veteran Spartan center. Other lettermen who reported were Don Grove, VanZylen, Totten, and DenHerder, Dickeson, Schau and Russo, lettermen who are at present engaged in football will report later after the end of the grid season. McGilchuddy, another letterman, will not be available this year as he is attending the University of Michigan where he is studying medicine. Hark Hooper, Clark, Bayerle, VanZanden, Scott, Baker, Prondergast and VanAntwerp, members of the freshman team last season, were among those who reported while Smead, Norberg, and Grove, who are out for football, will report later. Others who have reported for practice are Leavitt, Shestakoff, DeWard, Thomas, Adams, Brown, DeWitt, Schaubel, Breitenbacher, Besant, Bentley, Green, Irwin.

With about six weeks in which to form his team before the season opens early in December, Coach VanAlstyne will have his hands full. The schedule which the Spartans will face calls for games with such teams as University of Detroit, University of Michigan, Notre Dame, Colgate university, and Pennsylvania State.

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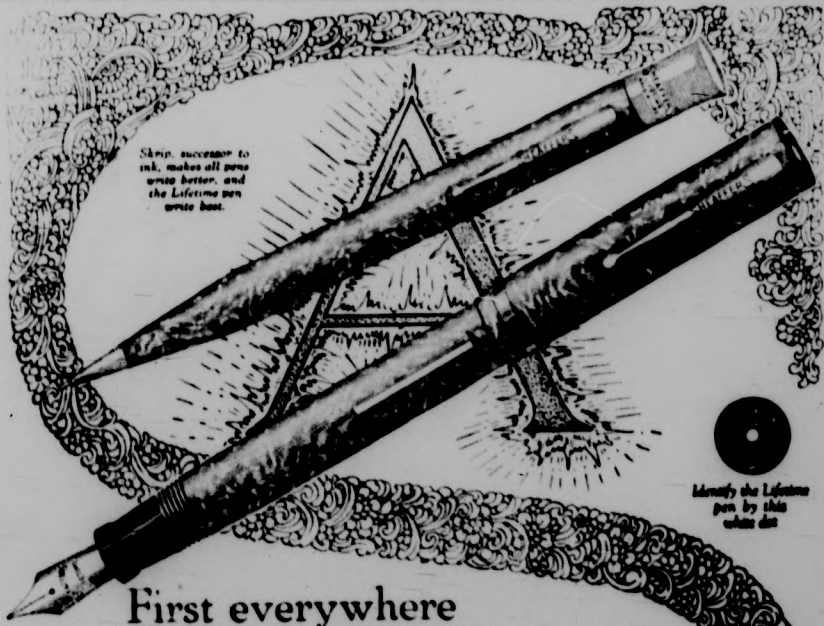
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
