## TO HOLD SECOND ANNUAL SERVICE FOR WAR HEROES

Theme of Last Year's Memorial Service to Be Used Again; Musical Groups to Take Part.

## COMMEMORATE HEROES

The second annual memorial service in honor of those alumni of the college who gave their lives in the world war will be held in the armory on Sunday afternoon, Nov. 4 at 4 p. m.

The theme of the play will again be centered around Walter Binners' "Canticle of Praise" which made such a lasting impression upon those who were present at the service a year ago that it has been requested for this year also. The music for the Canticle was written by Prof. Arthur Farwell of the college who was associated with the music department of the University of California at the time of the signing of the armistice in 1918. Mr. Binners was also connected with the California university at the time.

## GRADUATE STUDENT DOING RESEARCH WORK ON DAM

Professor Allen, head of the civil engineering department, has announced that O. E. Slaughter, a graduate student of M. S. C. has received a leave of absence to do research work on the dam in California. There are to be published two bulletins one by Mr. Slaughter on "The Disposal of Dairy Wastes" the other by H. A. Preston, a graduate student of M. S. C. in 1929, on "The Effect of High Temperatures on Aluminate Cement Concrete." The state makes dairies treat their wastes, which oftentimes are thrown in the rivers in a sanitary way. Mr. Slaughter did research work on the subject and his results will be published in the bulletin. The other bulletin discusses "Aluminate" which sets in 24 hours as hard as the ordinary cement sets in 28 days. There is a registered surveyor enrolled in civil engineering, who is a freshman.

### BUY COUPON BOOKS

A campaign to sell Union coupon books has been inaugurated this week among the students. All society houses, dormitories, and other groups are being approached by those engaged in the sale. This movement is being substituted for the plan of giving books out on the fees, which failed to go through due to objections of the state board.

The effort basically is to obtain student support of the Union, to increase patronage among the students of facilities offered. There has always been somewhat of a lack in this respect. Before the present home of the Union was erected the great need for a student headquarters of this type was most apparent. Much work and energy was expended to make it a fact. Now that the building has been on the campus and in use for a few years, there is absent a great deal of that spirit which made it a reality and which must exist if the Union and its services are to be completed and expanded.

More than anything else, it is necessary that the Union, an organization really of the entire student body be patronized by these same students. Unusual as it may seem, the situation ex-

ists here of the owners of a business neglecting to support that identical project and thus unavoidably injuring their own welfare.

If the sale of books is large, it will mean increased business for the Union services. This in turn will put these facilities upon a paying basis and enable those in charge of the building to go ahead with plans for completion. Until the present divisions of the Union are extensively used by the student body, it is useless to expect expansion or enlargement. Everyone desires completion of the building and the quickest way to realize this desire is to devote some efforts, or at least, patronage.

Purchase of a coupon book takes money from no one's pocket book. It merely means that the money will be spent in the Union. And money spent in the Union need by no means be considered a waste or a luxury. There are articles and services which are a necessity during the term and which will easily take up the purchase price.

It is the duty of all members of the Union and that includes every student, to buy at least one coupon book during this campaign and support the organization with your trade.
