ACCIDENT FATAL TO SOPHOMORE; 2 OTHERS HURT

Lowell Walker, Sophomore Forester, Killed in Crash Near Mason

FRESHMAN INJURED
Lowell Walker, a sophomore forester, was fatally injured and Thomas Mack, a freshman engineer, was hurt in an automobile accident which occurred last Friday evening on highway H. B. 177, two miles north of Mason when the two students were returning to their homes in Jackson county for the weekend. The funeral services for Lowell were held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. David Walker, parents of the boy in Brooklyn at 7 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Witnesses of the accident asserted Monday that the two boys were driving at a high rate of speed when they crossed a sign on the pavement and crashed head on into a car driven by H. Frank Brinker of Lansing. Brinker was on his way to Lansing.

Walker was moved to the office of Dr. R. B. Cannon in Mason where he died before medical aid could be applied. Mack, who sustained a broken nose and several lacerations on his face, was taken to his home near Clark Lake. Brinker was not slightly hurt at all and his address was given at the sheriff's office at Mason on 12th Street, Lansing.

DIXIE GRIDDERS HOLD STATE TO TIE SCORE IN HARD GAME

Pappenheimer Leads Southern Attack; Nordberg and Danziger Feature State Offensive.

SMALL CROWD PRESENT

Featured by a quick touchdown in the first quarter by Michigan State and a last quarter score by the Mississippi A. and M. eleven, the second inter-sectional battle of the year on the Spartans' schedule ended with a deadlock 6-6, Saturday afternoon on the State gridiron. Playing on a rain-soaked field, the south, battled the north in a hard fought line assault before the smallest crowd that has witnessed a Spartan game this year.

State got off to a fine start when they took the ball for the first time early in the initial period on their own 46 yard line and then marched down the field for the first score of the game. Nordberg made it first down on the first play when he ran 28 yards around his own right end to the visitors' 27 yard line. Grove then carried the ball to the 19 yard line and Danziger failed at the center of the line. Nordberg made it first down on the Dixie 16 yard line and Danziger punched to the 10 yard line. A lateral pass which gave Nordberg the ball accounted for the lone Spartan score. Smead, State center, made his first attempt of the season at drop-kicking, but it was blocked.

Mississippi threatened a minute later when the Dixie boys carried the ball deep into the Spartan territory only to lose it when Grove intercepted a pass on his own 20 yard line. After an exchange of the ball the Dixie team threatened again when Pappenheimer star back made several runs, which carried the ball to State's 20 yard line where the Kipke-men held for downs. An exchange of punts ended the period.

Both teams battled about even until late in the second quarter when a long run by Pappenheimer put the Dixie eleven in position to score. Smead intercepted a pass on his own 11 yard line and Nordberg made three yards as the half ended.

Early in the final half State carried the ball down to the visitors' 24 yard line but a penalty robbed the Spartans of 15 yards and the threat stopped. After an exchange of punts the Spartans were in possession of the ball near midfield when a bad pass from Smead made Grove fumble and Pittman, Dixie lineman, recovered it and started for the goal line. Smead brought him down on the Spartan 12 yard line. A pass, Pappenheimer to Harris, put the ball on the 5 yard line but the Green and White forward wall

strengthened and held the Dixie eleven for downs which ended the Maroon scoring threat for the period.

The final period opened with both teams battling fiercely. Mississippi received the ball in midfield on a punt by Grove. Pappenheimer passed to Harris and it looked like the Dixie end was away for a touchdown but Nordberg, State safety, stopped him on the Green and White 21 yard line. Stone was stopped twice at line and then Pappenheimer passed to Brooks on State's 8 yard line. Pappenheimer then tried the line twice to no advantage. Pappenheimer passed to Harris who caught the ball over his shoulder and stepped over the State goal line just as two Spartan tacklers hit him. Anderson blocked the Mississippi try for the extra point. Play surged back and forth near the center of the gridiron during the remainder of the game.

Mississippi brought a fine team to meet the Spartans. The backfield led by Pappenheimer, clever signal caller, opened an offensive that taxed the Spartan forward wall at various times. Broken field running, returning of punts, and line punting by Pappenheimer was the feature of the game. Several times he broke away for long runs, one being 42 yards in length, some did the line bucking for the Dixie team. Aggressive play on the part of the Mississippi line was also the cause for plenty of comment on the part of the spectators.

As for the Spartans, they started out like a house afire but seemed to lack the generalship in the trenches. Nordberg matched the running of Pappenheimer. Grove gave a good account of himself with his kicking while Danziger plunged into the visitors' line many times for six, eight and ten yard gains. In the line Smead played the best game but as a whole the line opened holes big enough to allow the backs to scamper through for good substantial gains.

PURDUE BACK SAID TO HAVE CAUGHT BALL FROM PLANE

Lafayette, Ind., Nov. 5.—(IP Pat Welch, Purdue's brilliant halfback who won fame for himself last year by defeating Harvard in football almost single-handed, is believed to be the only man who ever caught a football thrown from a speeding airplane nearly 200 feet in the air.
