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## THETA ALPHA PHI PHYSICAL ED DEPARTMENT HAS LARGEST ENROLLMENT

Next Tuesday evening Theta Alpha Phi, the honorary dramatic society of the campus, will present their first play of the year at the State theatre. This group of amateur dramatists have been achieving an unusual reputation for interpretation of worthwhile plays during the last two years. Audiences have steadily increased, making it necessary to change from the limited seating capacity of the Little Theatre to the larger and more adequate stage and auditorium of the State theatre.

Last year, under the able tutelage of Prof. King, a number of the best reality plays were staged with rather fine results. The selection announced for presentation this year indicates that the standard established has not been lowered.

With the cessation of productions by the Wright Players in Lansing, Theta Alpha Phi remains alone in presentation of stage plays in this part of the state. An unusual opportunity is thus presented to draw an audience from a wide territory. With the proper promotion there is no reason why the work of this group of dramatists should not be enlarged and expanded to the scope of some of the better known "Little Theatre" groups of the country.

An activity such as this, with the type of entertainment given, well deserves the full support of the student body. Next Tuesday evening should see a capacity audience at the State to receive the first offering of Theta Alpha Phi.

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## State College Student Is Author of Book of Poems

"Love and Life are inseparable. Without love there is no life but death. Go thou and conquer it." This is the theme and philosophy of a volume of poetry, recently published by John W. Boldyreff, 374 Grove street, a Russian "emigre" and senior at Michigan State college.

The writer of this collection, "Dreams of Life and Love," was born in Veronezh, Russia, and has been in the United States since January, 1922. At present he is majoring in economics at State, having completed his elementary work in East high school, Cleveland, O. Prior to his arrival in this country, Boldyreff attended universities in Russia, Japan and in Germany, where he spent several years in medical research work.

Although "Dreams of Life and Love" is Boldyreff's first book of poetry, he has contributed to the International Poetry Magazine, the American Poetry Anthology, Contemporary Poets, Anthology, Fermentforschung (Berlin), Van Liberty and other periodicals of a less specialized nature.

The work of this recently discovered poet has received unusually favorable recognition from the International Writers League, of which Boldyreff is a member. His poetry deals with "Love" as an all embracing term for brotherhood, humanity, tolerance and justice. Although philosophical in nature, the poems show a remarkable beauty in the delicate and exquisite treatment of nature and man's soul.

# SUPERIOR DETROIT AGGREGATION FORCES STATE TO DEFEAT 39-0

### Superior Line and Fast Backfield Make U. of D. Attack Invincible.

## BATTLE FOUGHT IN MUD

Unable to withstand the forward wall attack which the University of Detroit eleven resorted to in the gridiron tilt at Detroit Saturday afternoon, the Michigan State team was badly beaten 39-0. The game was played on a field which was literally a sea of mud, thus making anything but straight football impossible. Saturday's victory was Detroit's 13th straight win.

Detroit's superior line and fast traveling backfield clearly outclassed State in every department of the game except possibly the punting. The forward attack at the line by the Titans netted the large majority of the Detroit gains as they only resorted to the forward pass route successfully once. Time after time the heavy, aggressive, and machine-like U. of D. team marched down the field always pushing back the Spartans who fought at every step.

Detroit's scoring came in the second and third quarters. In the initial period both teams fought hard but neither could gain much headway until late in the period when the Titans began a 90 yard march for a touchdown which was to come in the opening minutes of the second quarter when Brazil took the ball over the goal line for the first touchdown from the six yard line. Two more touchdowns were made shortly after but Capt. Connell failed in three attempts at goal kicking for points after touchdowns. In the third period the Detroiters started off with a bang and three long runs by Malone, Connell and Brazil accounted for touchdowns. Capt. Connell was successful in kicking all three goals. In the final period with a sprinkling of substitutes grazing each line-up neither team could score.

Spartan fans had but one consolation and that was that the team representing Michigan State did not stop fighting. Even after the Titans had piled up a large score the State team kept on trying to stem the advances of their opponents who outwitted them at almost every position. Detroit made 14 first downs to State's six.

Capt. Connell this week is preparing for the annual battle with his Alma Mater, the University of Michigan which will be played at Ann Arbor on Saturday Nov. 17. The squad reported to the Spartan coach in fairly good condition following the tough battle at Detroit.
