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## THE PETITION

The petition presented to the Student Council asking for faculty supervision of elections raises a vital question to the student body. The question that will be before the electorate June 6 will simmer down to whether we are to have student government as we now do or whether we will only have duly elected representatives who will be tied strictly to faculty supervision.

The petition as presented is taken as a measure to check on the student council, principally in elections. In this there can be only one assumption and that is that the Student Council is corrupt. The signers of the petition, if believing this to be true, are perfectly right in taking steps to correct any corruptness that may exist but is this the proper place to remedy the evil?

If the petition is passed by the student body it will become an act that can properly be termed "cutting off your nose to spite your face." The place to correct any corruptness is at the root of the evil—those who are the elected servants of the public—and not in restricting the powers and duties of the present system. The present members of the Council have been duly elected by the student body and if they are not competent, the proper remedy is to elect ones who are and not attempt to remove the last vestiges we have in the shape of student government.

The principal and most important function that the Council has is the supervision of student elections. Shorn of this responsibility the Council may as well fold up and be laid among the relics. The present Council is making a valiant effort to "come back" and again establish the Student Council as a power of good on the campus. It has already done much this term and stands in position to do much more before the term is completed. Are we to remove all hope of its ever amounting to anything?

After all the question that is to be before the voters on election day will be:

## IN DEFENSE

The State News is further criticized for mentioning only three of the signatories of the petition. It was only through the greatest effort of the News that the names of these three were identified in connection with the movement. Other names will be gladly received when forthcoming.

## CAMPUS FORUM

To the Editor:

The news story which appeared in the last edition of the State News concerning faculty supervision of all-college elections was quite radical and unfit for publication in a paper which has as high an aim as that of the school paper.

Part of the material in the news item was based on assumptions rather than on facts, such as the statements quoting "originators are unknown" and "sororities disclaim any knowledge of the source of the petition and refuse to be quoted as supporting the move." Any effort on the part of the author of the editorial would have obtained for him such information as to the originators, and perhaps prevented him from misconstruing the petition as an underhanded attack. However, it looks as though the author did not care to seek the information due to the satisfaction of writing some of his own vague ideas.

Further, no one was induced to sign the petition unless in favor with the idea which it carries. Everyone whose

signature is found on the petition read the object of the issue before applying their approval.

The editor also mentions only three of the men circulating the petition and in a manner intended to ridicule three students for an issue which is supported by four hundred and ninety-eight students. Was the number of names on the petition mentioned? No! Why?

The author of the article was certainly careful not to place too many facts in his story in order to show only one side of the issue. He should try to be a bit more broad-minded in the writing of such articles.

The story also states that "campus politics emphatically raised its head on an attack on student administration." That one statement is quite a reflection on a certain few. The petition is not an attack on student administration because such a measure would serve as a protection to the Student Council and in the future there would be no cause for discussion concerning elections.

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# RECORDS FALL AND NEW CHAMPS ARE MADE IN HIGH SCHOOL MEET

Twenty-third Annual Track Meet Results in Four New Class Champions

The twenty-third annual state high school track and field championship meet held at the Spartan stadium Saturday resulted in four new class champions and 19 new state records. Detroit Northwestern topped the class A meeting with 36 points. Class B went through for second with 14.1 points followed by Detroit Northern with 14. Northwestern captured its seventh state championship in 19 years, supplanting Northern in 1919 title holder. Deception surrendered its class B championship to Northwestern, which did not enter a team this season, while Detroit failed to retain its Class C supremacy by a half point margin displaced by Northern.

Besides placing the individual high point winner in the person of Ekegren, Northwestern slipped two records from the board. Class B led in breaking records, winning six marks from the board, followed by Class C with five, and Class A and D each with four new standards. Preliminaries in the dash and eight events were run off Friday afternoon 11. Ekegren directed the meet.
