

FIGHTING STATE ELEVEN SCORES IMPRESSIVE 38-0 VICTORY OVER CASE TECH HERE LAST SATURDAY

Spartans Show Powerful Offense and a Stubborn Defense to Down Engineers; Fumbles Mar State Attack.

STATE LOOKS TO 'SSIPPI GAME

MICHIGAN STATE GRIDDEERS READY TO LEAVE WEDNESDAY ON TRIP INTO THE SOUTHLAND

Crowley's Team Determined to Break Old Jinx By Bringing Back Victory Over Mississippi A. and M.

Determined to break the jinx that has followed Michigan State football teams onto foreign gridirons in the past years, a hard fighting Spartan grid squad will leave Lansing Wednesday evening for Jackson, Mississippi, the scene of the Michigan State-Mississippi A. & M. football game, Saturday.

Since 1923 Michigan State grid elevens have played on many foreign fields but have failed to come off them with victories, according to statistics dug up by the Associated Press recently. One fall day in 1923 a Green and White eleven walked off the field at Detroit with a 2-0 victory over the University of Detroit team. Many times since that time Spartan teams have tried to defeat their opponents in their own lair but to no avail.

James H. (Sleepy) Crowley's 1929 aggregation, following impressive victories over Adrian, North Carolina State, and Case Tech on the State gridiron, have a good chance to regain some of the prestige lost on foreign fields by bringing home a win over the formidable southerners from Mississippi. For the past ten days the Spartan mentor has been punning his charges for the Mississippi tilt with the idea of getting set for the final game of the season on Nov. 16 with the strong University of Detroit eleven.

Another State regular is listed with the casualties for the Mississippi game—Carl Nordberg, speedy ground gaining halfback, injured his knee in the Case tilt Saturday and will be out of the Dixie game this week. It is hoped that Nordberg will be able to play in the U. of D. clash next week.

With the absence of Nordberg from the line-up, Crowley will depend on Max Crall, flashy reserve half, and Capt. Dickeson, clever ball carrier, to take up the right halfback duties. Gerald Breen will be relied upon for the left half post duties with Roger Groves, State's capable punter, running the team. Duke Schan, who proved his worth by his ground gaining plumes in the North Carolina State and Case games, will do the brunt of the fullback duties with Johnny Wilson, lanky back, doing relief work.

yearling squad, but is not looked on as a prospect. O'Neil and Grouch, fine players who were looked to as the men to take the vacant places are ineligible.

With such a puzzling situation, Veenker is not at all sure of what he can do. Captain Chapman, all-conference forward, though a center, may be the solution of one guard place. He will jump center as before, but may drop back to guard after the tip-off as he is a "crack" guard.

Daniel, star forward, may get a chance to work into the team if Chapman goes to back guard, and may add scoring power in which the 1928 champs were none too strong.

The Wolverine schedule looms up as particularly formidable, in fact the stiffest possible, with Indiana, Purdue, Illinois, Chicago, Minnesota and Iowa to be met twice each, provided his last mentioned team is still in the conference.

Likewise it was Schan who was largely responsible for carrying the ball down the field to the 15 yard line in the final quarter when State scored her last cougar as Jerry Green drove through left guard for the score. Groves' kick failed. Crowley sent in a flock of substitutes in the fourth quarter and the game ended with the score 38-0 in favor of the Green and

MICHIGAN ISSUES FIRST CALL FOR BASKETBALL

Coach Veenker Pessimistic Over Chances of Championship Team.

BOB CHAPMAN CAPTAINS

Team To Miss McCoy and Rose, Two Mighty Good Guards.

Basketball practice at Michigan began the past week with the issuance of the first call for candidates by Coach George Veenker, and at this early point prospects of repeating last year's title snatching performance are

slim. Captain Ernie McCoy and Danny Rose, regular guards of the 1928 champions have graduated and Coach Veenker has practically no guard material coming up from last year's freshmen.

Close guarding and almost impregnable defense made Michigan champion last season, and without them the prospects are far from good.

Captain Bob Chapman, Marion, Ind., Bill Orsini, Ann Arbor and Joe Truskowski, Detroit are regulars returning, but they are the center and forwards respectively. Lovell and Kanitz, other letter men returning, are not considered enough capable to fill the gaps.

Lovell is a guard and Kanitz a forward. Orsini will not report until December and Truskowski is on the football team, while Kanitz has just undergone an operation for appendicitis.

Of the new men in the best prospects are Norman Daniels of Detroit and Henry Weiss of Cleveland forwards, and Bill Jones of Bay City, center. Clifford Ricketts of Covington, Ky., is the only guard coming up from the

Michigan State has two good forward walls which the State coach can depend upon. Fogg, Lewis, Fase and Haun are the ends that will see action.

Ferrari, Riddler, Exo, and Joslin, tacklers, Gross, Hayden, Streb, Jacking, and Buckirk, guards, and Smead and Mackrey, centers. State's line was a problem during the early games but its performance in the last two games gave indications that the Green and White should prove effective against Mississippi A. & M.

Coach Carberry has worked hard with the big linemen and the results of his labors has done much to put the Spartans into the winning column again.

About 25 members of the State gridiron squad will make the trip. Leaving Lansing after practice Wednesday at 7:15 (Eastern time) the Spartans will travel by train into the southland.

They will arrive in Jackson, Mississippi Friday morning and will make headquarters at the Hotel Edwards in that city. Following a lecture session late Friday morning the Spartan gridirons will warm up on the foreign gridiron Friday afternoon in preparation for their game Saturday.

The Michigan State traveling squad will leave for home late Saturday evening and will arrive at 10:49 a. m. Monday.
