## Music -- Art and Drama

### A Review of "The Clean-Up"

If "The Clean-Up" had only been called "The Come-Back" it would have been just as well named, and the new title would have described Theta Alpha Phi's return to favor, to boot. For if this last play didn't, exactly cause a furor and break curtain-call records, it was still, all-round, so far above "The Mistress of the Sun" that "The Clean-Up" seemed a brilliant accomplishment by comparison. For that matter, it compares creditably with most any local production, for certainly it had its share of good points. Mainly, they were these:

The plane of all the acting was a high one for an amateur show. Every player was an asset, and after the first act, when things got going, all awkwardness and uncertainty seemed to give way to a spontaneity which carried the action smoothly and convincingly, at times even excitingly, to the customary happy ending.

As to the stage-scenery, Theta Alpha Phi took a great step for the better. The stage was presentably dressed to suit time and action. It was a background which fitted the picture.

The play itself—a Barry Connors work—was more true-to-life for its use of only normal humans, omitting all eccentrics and clowns. The laughs were not frequent, but what there were were good ones, produced by humor of a high order.

The best thing about the play was its plot—a useful one, smoothly and logically handled by an author who had a wise eye for its greatest possibilities. It gave us action, humor, suspense and human interest. Take a play with such ingredients as these and administer it to the public in such an acceptable fashion as "The Clean-Up" was administered, and you have a product which tickles the palates of the listeners, and which earns sincere praise for the cast and director who turned it out.

Out of a field of four candidates for the Student Council, the freshman class named two in their meeting held in the Chemistry lecture room. Jack Clark and Lewis Thornton placed highest in the polling. The results were: Clark 43, Thornton 40, Roy Jensen 30, Clyde Lambert 10, James Mitchell 30.

One man will be elected from the three men left in the voting for the Union Board. Those that will run are Richard McDonald, Don Lau and Horton Stickle. The polling was: Lau 32, McDonald 38, Stickle 32, Lyle Hauger 9, Carleton Spencer 11, and Charles Fawcett 28.

No junior class elimination was held due to the fact that not enough persons were nominated to make that necessary. The candidates placed in the preliminary nominations will be placed on the ballot with the exception of Gerald Breen who has withdrawn his name from the list of Union Board candidates.

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## REGARDING THE JUNIORS—

The report of the J-Hop financial condition and the proposal of a special assessment upon all members of the class to make up the deficit of the class comes from the leaders of the class after long deliberation on their part to find a plausible way out of the class debt.

Inasmuch as the class must be on a sound financial basis next year and well out of the red in order to properly carry on senior activities and the commencement week program, it is essential to the best interests of the class to clear themselves of this debt while it is still fresh on the books. It was due to a lack of interest on the part of juniors in supporting their class activities that the Hop first went in the hole, and it is only right that those same class members should now contribute in bringing their class back on an even financial stand.

The assessed amount as figured by the class leaders is just sufficient to pay off the outstanding bills and to bring the books back to balance. Inasmuch as the class officers are men of student choice, they deserve the support of the students. And it is to the best interests of the junior class and its members to accept the only apparent way out of this difficulty and cooperate in clearing their class of all financial embarrassment.

## BLUE KEY IN ACTION—

Following a lull in activity, Blue Key, campus service fraternity, has assumed the responsibility of meeting and entertaining the entrants from twenty Michigan high schools who take part in the State Interscholastic swimming meet on the campus today and tomorrow. The junior men have arranged to take care of some eighty high school men during their stay on the campus.

It is to the interest of the college as a whole that these high school men should be properly received and entertained during their brief visit here as it may materially influence them in making a choice of Alma Mater for their education following high school.

In this respect Blue Key has chosen a wonderful opportunity to be of service and to carry on the purpose of the society and further the interests of the college of which it is a part.

## UPPERCLASS LEADERSHIP—

As we watch the slow whirl of campus activities we are greatly impressed by an unusual situation on this campus. The noticeable lack of upperclass personnel in important campus functions. A careful study and analysis of certain organizations reveals that it is in reality the underclassmen who are carrying the brunt of the load, and that our system of weeding-out and eliminating is too severe.

We believe that the Michigan State News, as the official organ of the Student Council and the official student publication of the college, should be managed and written by upperclassmen, who have a knowledge of the campus and who are interested in printing the campus news and a frank expression of campus opinion on timely subjects. At the present time the editorial staff of the paper has but one senior man and three junior men among its personnel. The rest of the men on the staff are underclassmen, and upon them largely rests the job of news gathering.

The same condition exists on the Wolverine, where the editor, business manager, and art editor are the only seniors. And the number of juniors aspiring for the position for next year is noticeably weak. The staff of that publication is largely co-ed.

We have one word to say in favor of such a situation, the freshmen men are enthusiastic and they are not tied down by petty committee jobs. But on the whole, we are not in favor of this underclass leadership and we would like to see political friction and petty grievances overruled in favor of cooperative leadership by a group of representative upperclassmen who join together to rule and run campus publications according to campus ideals and standards. We predict slight improvement on the campus until the upperclassmen take over active leadership, instead of merely a bystander interest.

## ELECTIONS—

During the last few years, there have been a number of general elections, at which time various class officers and activity managers have been chosen. Each time, invariably, the turnout at the polls has been small, not large enough to warrant what one might call a "voicing of the sentiment of the student body toward the people selected."

The same trend has been noticeable in city, state, and national elections. It might be that the interests in the government of the country is dying out, that only those who are running for office care at all about seeing that the right man gets the largest number of votes. It is hard to believe that there is so little to the question that it does not deserve an unqualified expression from all concerned.—Purdue Exponent

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## WHAT YOUNGER COLLEGE MEN ARE DOING WITH WESTINGHOUSE



Special cars were needed... railway tracks had to be lowered, to handle the transformers these men built

A Conowingo, Maryland, is the second largest hydro-electric development in the world. Power generated here at 220,000 volts will be fed into lower voltage transmission lines of the Public Service Electric and Gas Company, Roseland, near Newark, New Jersey. The transformers that will perform this transfer of energy are physically the largest ever built, for their capacity is sufficient to serve the home lighting needs of a city of a million people. Each in number, each is larger than a house, weighs when empty as much as a large locomotive, and holds three

tank cars of oil—four specially built railway cars and fifty-two standard cars of various types were required to transport them from the factory to the job. At one point the railway tracks had to be lowered so the units would clear an overhead viaduct, so great was their size. When spectacular jobs like this come up, it is natural that they go to an institution like Westinghouse. Continued from page 1. The board will regard the question, it will be offered with the hope that favorable action will be taken.

One of the reasons why optimism is felt toward the adoption of the plan by the state board is because twice in past years the same scheme has been utilized to remove deficits from the books of the junior class when similar debt have been marked due to the failure of the financial end of the class formal function. In 1924 a blanket assessment was levied against the individuals in the junior class to the amount of \$300. Again in 1926 a fee was added of \$1.50.

The petition method was used in both cases, and the approval of the state board was secured.

The junior class has been working on a suitable plan for some time and it was at the suggestion of Pres. H. S. Shaw that the petition system was created. Every detail has been carefully considered and it is being presented early after assurance that this is the most reasonable avenue of action. A complete knowledge of the financial status has just recently been finished and this offers a concrete foundation for all calculations.

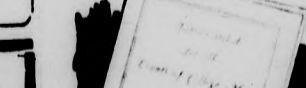
