Annual Forestry Shindig To Be Staged in Old Armory

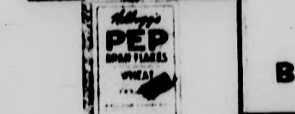

Track Team Will Open Season Saturday

SPARTAN THINCLADS FAVORED TO WIN CLOSE CONTEST FROM DETROIT CITY COLLEGE SQUAD

John Lewis, Negro Star, Scheduled to Compete in Eight Events Against State in Initial Meet; Green and White Strong in Distances.



EACH RALPH H. YOUNG'S track men start the outdoor track season by taking their marks against Detroit City college Saturday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock in the annual dual meet between the two schools, and it will almost be a case of the Spartans versus Co-Captain John Lewis, Detroit's versatile negro athlete. Lewis, a member of the 1928 American Olympic team, runs both the 100 and 220 yard dashes, the 440, and the 220 yard low hurdles. In his spare moments he broad jumps, puts the shot, and hurls the discus, besides running as anchor man on the hurdles.

As was the case last year, the Green and White strength lies largely in the distance events. With Captain Lauren P. Brown, Clark Chamberlain, Loring Fullerton, Lewis Hackney, and David Swanson, all capable, proved performers as his first line of offense. Coach Mort Mason hopes to shut out the City college athletes without a point in the mile, the two mile, and the half mile. Swanson, running in his first year of intercollegiate competition, showed up well indoors. Running behind Lewis in the Chicago dual meet a few weeks ago, he pushed the star Chicago half-miler to a new record, he himself going under the two-minute mark.

In the pole vault, Bob Olson and Field will battle with Nosanchuk of Detroit for sky-dusting honors. Cole and Bayless will do the high-jumping for State, and the broad jumpers who will fight it out with Russell and Beauvais of Detroit are Bayless, R. K. Russell and Yarger.

The Spartans should show up well in the weight events, with Phil Dill, Josh, McCabe and S. C. Wait leading both the shot and the discus. Hayden will assume the javelin throwing burden, assisted by Russell and Breim.

BYRNE FARMED OUT

Jerry Byrne, former Spartan mound ace who signed with the Chicago White Sox late last fall, was in East Lansing Tuesday enroute to Springfield, Ill., where he will play in the Three-I league. Jerry has been farmed out to the Springfield club by Manager Donnie Bush, but the Sox piolet has not forgotten about the former State hurler.

Byrne, a pleasing chap who made his home in Parnell while attending college here, will be remembered as the pitcher who twice defeated the highly touted University of Michigan nine. In 1928 he pitched Coach John Koks' aggregation to an 8 to 4 triumph and in 1929 set the Wolverine diamond team down 4 to 3 in a thrilling 10-inning battle.

GOLF PRACTICE TO BE SATURDAY

Crowley Will Coach Linksmen; Veterans Back; Complete Stiff Schedule.

The first official practice for polo team candidates will be held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, according to Coach Jimmy Crowley who is dividing his time this spring between the coaching of golf and spring football. Candidates will meet at the gymnasium at 10 and proceed from there to the links.

All except one of last year's track team which was defeated but once in seven starts, reported for the preliminary meeting last Saturday. Headed by Captain Howard Miner, of Battle Creek, the list of veteran mashers-swallers back in this year's competition will be Charles Huwer, Larry Pace, and Max Doers. These men will be pushed by such men as Don Jones, A. W. Duffield, Lewis Haigh, and C. D. Harrington for places on the team.

Nine matches have been arranged for the turf artists this year, the most important of which will be the one with the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor on May 7. The first tilt will be on May 2, when the Spartans will meet a team from Grand Rapids Junior college on a local course, which has not as yet been designated.

KOBSMEN FACE YPSI SATURDAY

Spartan Nine Favored to Win With Bulloch or Langdon Hurling.

The Michigan State college football squad invades Ypsilanti Saturday to meet the veteran Michigan State Normal college in the first foreign game of the home season. Although Coach John H. Koks respects the strength of the Ypsilanti diamond team he plans to start one of his second string pitchers, either Peley Bulloch or John Langdon.

The rest of the lineup was expected to remain about the same as that against the University of Chicago nine here last week. Max Crall was slated here last week with Chum Cullbertson at second, Pee-Wee Devic at third and Johnny Madonia at short-stop. Captain Al Sachs and Ed Coombs were certain to start in the outfield with either Charley Griffin or Jabber Barnard in the other garden.

Byrne was the probable choice to work behind the plate although either Jim Hayden or Barnard might be called upon to catch.

The Spartan diamond men scored an easy 12 to 4 victory over Chicago in their first game of the home season and are favored to defeat the Normal college line if they continue their string.
