With the aid of charts, Professor Wynyarden traced the trends of business during the last 150 years and pointed out that each generation must face at least "one good crash."

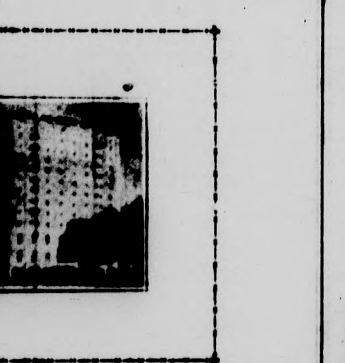
