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### TRUE HOSPITALITY

The cordial welcome extended by college authorities to the inspecting officers from headquarters of the Sixth R. O. T. C. corps area is worthy of much commendation. Probably the attitude of the college officials had as much to do with the favorable impression obtained by the visitors than any other one thing.

Remarkable co-operation between the R. O. T. C. heads here and the college authorities has always been the rule in the past and events transpiring during the past week makes one believe that the trend in this direction has been bettered. Surely a king himself could not be accorded more chivalrous treatment than was tendered.

The reception by Pres. R. S. Shaw, the noon luncheons by the college and the Seaboard and Blade, the work of Colonel Davis and his staff, and the attitude of the students themselves show that not only does Michigan State college excel along military lines but in setting the school when the occasion demands it.

It would be exceptional if these most important and distinguished visitors should not recommend the M. S. C. military unit for distinguished rating, as it is rumored that it will be, in view of the seasoned performance of the troops and the general impression authorities must have made.

Anyone closely connected with R. O. T. C. work could not help but notice how well every individual responded in classroom and parade inspection. It often happens that the underclassmen consider that the burden of the work lies with the advanced students and the regular officers, failing to realize that without the co-operation of both nothing can be accomplished. Steadiness in the lines, snappy bearing, neat dress, and good drilling all showed that the first and second year men had the interest of the local unit at heart. They showed that they were open to reproof and criticism—some of it harsh sounding—and responding as a good soldier should.

After this year's banner performance everyone can look back with the satisfaction of work well done and point to the mark set as a level for future attainment.

Ability is a necessity for class leaders and mere popularity is not always a sign of exceptional executive ability.

## KOBSMEN WHIP HOPE COLLEGE 13-5 IN FOUNDERS' DAY TILT; PLAY WESTERN STATE, CHICAGO

MICHIGAN STATE'S CRACK BASEBALL TEAM, with a record of seven victories in eight starts during the home season, takes to the road for two foreign tilts over the week end. The Kobsmen will play their second game of the season against Western State at Kalamazoo Saturday and will be striving for another victory over the Teachers. The State diamond squad will go to Chicago and will be guests of the White Sox Sunday and will meet the University of Chicago Monday in an attempt to score their second win over the Maroons of the Western Conference.

The Spartan nine had an easy time swamping Hope college diamond team, 13 to 5, in a Founders' Day game Wednesday afternoon. The contest might well be termed a "Comedy of Errors" for the Wooden Shoes made 11 misplays. The game was devoid of thrills and the outcome was never in doubt after the third inning.

Pete Brose, big sophomore hurled his first varsity game and got along reasonably well. He held the Hope team to eight hits. ### M. S. C. IS HOST FOR MICHIGAN THINCLAD MEET

Bitter Contests Looming in State Intercollegiate Friday, Saturday.

### SPARTANS DEFEND TITLE

Seventeen Colleges Have 256 Entries; Four Squads Vie for Superiority.

What promises to be the most bitterly contested track meet ever held in East Lansing will be staged at the Michigan State college stadium Friday and Saturday, when 256 athletes from 17 of the leading colleges of the state, exclusive of the university, will compete in the 16th annual Michigan Intercollegiate meet.

Entries thus far received include: Albion college, Adrian, Olivet, Western State, General Motors Tech, Hillsdale, Detroit Institute of Technology, Hillsdale Park Junior college, Alma, Michigan Normal University of Detroit, Grand Rapids Junior college, Detroit City, Central State Normal, Kalamazoo, Hope, and Michigan State.

Although Michigan State goes into this meet the defending champion having won last year by a comfortable margin a real battle is expected Saturday with Western State Michigan Normal and City College of Detroit all bringing well balanced teams with a few sparkling individual stars to furnish some stiff competition for the Spartan tracksters.

The Green and White superiority in the distance runs will be severely challenged when Swartz of Western State and Crozier and Arnett of Michigan Normal clash with Clark Chamberlain and Slim Patterson of State in the mile. Each of these men has run well under 4:30 this spring. Captain Lauren Brown of State is expected to win the two-mile with his harded competitor coming from Arnett. In the 300 yards of Western State leading champion looks as the lead man in the state but Mackey of State should give him a hard chase for first honors.

Lewis of Detroit City, 1929 American Olympic team member, seems to be the best candidate for sprint honors. He entered in five events: the 100, the 200, the 300 low hurdles, the 440 and will run on the mile relay team. He has run time to form he should present last year's performance and score 1 point for his team.

The remainder of the events seem to be in doubt. Western state has some strong weight men and hurdles is strong. The Spartans, a good day, and Detroit City and Michigan Normal are expected to furnish the Green and White pole vaulters and jumpers with their hardest opposition. The javelin will be a tossup between Hayden of State and Felo, Western state's stellar spear thrower.

Three relays are scheduled, the mile relay for varsity contestants, and the 800 and two-mile relays for the freshmen. State has a strong freshman team this year and should place well out in these events.

Preliminaries in the dashes, hurdles, jumps, and weights will be held on Friday, starting at 2:30 p. m. The final will begin at 1:30 on Saturday afternoon.
