### TROTH SUBMITS WINNING WATER CARNIVAL THEME

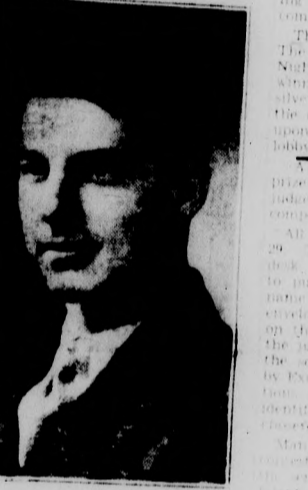
Novel Plan, "Praise of Learning,"  
to Be a Tribute to College  
Departments.  
DEPART FROM PRECEDENT  
Each Department in College Re-  
presented by Float During  
Annual Venetian Night

Paul Troth, 30, was announced as the winner in the 1030 water carnival theme contest in a selection made Tuesday night. His theme was chosen by the committee from an unusually large number of entries. This year's Venetian nights on June 1 and 13 will be quite different from others previously staged as Troth has been very original in laying out the pattern for the event. He has called it "Praise of Learning," and has built it around the various departments of this college. To quote from the theme: "Inasmuch as the annual water carnival is presented by the senior class and is one of the final functions of that class before leaving the college, it is my suggestion that the theme be not a tribute to ancient gods nor a fantasy of folk lore or story books, but a tribute of praise to the college which has prepared us for graduation. Felt Announces.

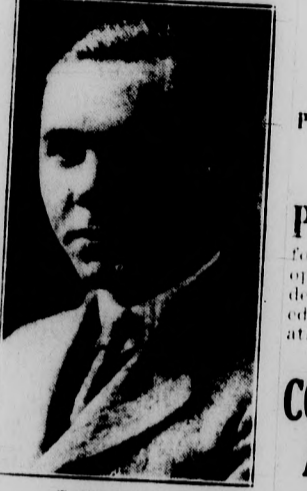
Response to the song contest sponsored by Excalibur, local senior men's honorary fraternity, is considered good particularly among members of the music department, according to the committee in charge of arrangements to procure a high caliber Michigan State college song. Carl Pitt, president of the society, states that the faculty and students of music are doing much intensive work on their composition.

There will be three prizes awarded. The winners will be announced on Cap Night, and at that time the first prize winner will be presented with a large silver loving cup. As a permanent memorial the composer's name will be engraved upon a silver trophy to be placed in the lobby of the Union.

Second prize of \$1000 and a third prize of \$500 will be awarded. The judge will be some outside person with competent ability.

All songs must be handed in by May 29. They may be left at the Union desk. It is important for contestants to put the submitted music with no name in the composition in a sealed envelope with the contestant's name on the outside. This is done so that the judge will not know the author of the song. The envelope will be tied by Excalibur and the musical composition will be numbered, numbered to identify them after the judge has chosen the winner.

### INDIFFERENCE IS SHOWN TOWARD SELECTION OF CLASS OFFICIALS, YEARBOOK PUBLICATION HEADS

Polls to Open in Union Lobby at 8 O'Clock Monday Morning and to  
Close at 5 P. M.; Athletic Council Representative and  
College Cheer Leader to be Chosen.

PREDICTIONS of an exceptionally light vote are forecast for the annual all-college spring term elections scheduled for Monday, May 26. Polling booths in the Union lobby will be open all day from 8 to 5 o'clock under the direction of the Student Council for the selection of officers in three underclasses: athletic council representative, and Spartan cheer leader.

Three weeks of nominations, eliminations and campus political activity will be climaxed Monday when junior, sophomore and freshmen classes stage the last voting of the year. Well-oiled machines in both junior and sophomore classes have discouraged independent action, though minute flickers of opposition were discovered in the second year class. Indications point to a dull election day with little but routine casting of votes by political interests.

### SWINGOUT TO BE WEDNESDAY

Symbolic Senior Event to Take  
Circuitous Route Around  
College Campus.

Senior swingout, the opening ceremony of the graduating activities of the class of 1930 will start next Wednesday evening, May 28, at 7:45 o'clock. Seniors are asked to appear in traditional cap and gown at the Old Armory at 7:30 to prepare for the march.

Headed by the Michigan State college military band with the class officers immediately following, the parade will parade the campus in the customary ceremony of swingout. The circuit of the college grounds will be completed before the class approaches the Forest of Arden for the climax of the evening.

Under arches erected by underclasses among the oaks of the college lawn, the graduating class will symbolize the passing on of senior responsibilities. Don Grove, president and President Robert Shaw will be the speakers on the program to be staged on the platform in front of the camanille. Senior class officers will then take part in the traditional swing-out in the Forest of Arden.

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## GO TO THE POLLS, MONDAY—

The returns of the all-college elections, Monday, will show more than the mere selection of class and campus officials, it will determine whether or not Michigan State students are vitally interested in the manner in which campus affairs are handled.

During the past few years only a small percentage of the total student enrollment has taken the trouble to go to the polls. For illustration, only around 1,000 votes out of the 3,000 enrollment were cast at the winter term elections this year. This evident lack of interest shows a likewise scarcity of interest in campus activities which does not speak very well for the student body as a whole. Something is lacking.

Almost always an occasion arises during the school year at which time class officials are condemned for certain acts. The student body hears the rumor and quickly rises indignantly to denounce the class officers. The students who usually object the loudest are those who failed to cast their votes at the all-college elections the previous spring.

The whole question resolves itself to this, Monday, every student should either turn out to take part in the selection of capable leaders or stay at home and keep still next year.

## WELCOME TO OUR CAMPUS—

Approximately 850 high school students from all over the state will be here today and tomorrow to participate in the track and field championships. Through the medium of actions rather than by verbosity the whole college will attempt to make them feel welcome at our institution and to give them an impression that will cause them to reflect favorably upon our college after they have returned to their home towns.

No better time could have been set for the meet to find the campus at the height of its beauty. Known all over the country for its beautiful landscaping Michigan State college grounds should have some significance to our visitors. The hail-fellow-well-met atmosphere which abounds in such a democratic institution as this goes hand in hand with the natural advantages that we already have.

The provisions for entertainment and lodging provided by Blue Key is commendable and offers a wealth of opportunities for the newly initiated members to show their ability in selling the school. The plan if handled properly will put the organization across to the entering freshmen next year and will show the character that predominates in both the students and the school.

## A GOOD MAN IS LOST—

The departure of Captain Ross Larson is highly regretted by every student that has come in contact with him. A soldier to the nth degree, a strict disciplinarian, but a man in every characteristic—this tribute voiced by his fellow officers and R. O. T. C. men tells much about his five year stay here.

Because of the changing personnel of the U. S. army such events as his leaving cannot be avoided. If it were the will of the students Captain Larson would be here indefinitely. Intelligent, capable, and cultured men are the rule in the higher branches of the service, but if a successor is appointed here that so well fits these qualifications as the Captain, the post will consider itself fortunate indeed.

## FROSH BEATEN BY YPSI NINE

### Michigan Normal Yearlings Again Trounce Spartan First Year Men.

Coach Lyman L. Framingham's freshman baseball nine absorbed its second beating at the hands of Michigan State Normal's frosh team this year when it emerged on the short end of a 6 to 5 score Wednesday afternoon. The Ypsi diamond game was featured by costly errors on the part of both teams, although the Spartan aggregation exhibited slightly superior batting ability. Their bats however were more scattered than those of the Normalites.

### Prof. Chapman to Take Charge of Meeting Held Here on Saturday.

Meeting here Saturday, May 24, for the first time in five years, about 100 physics instructors and professors representing all Michigan colleges, the University and normals, will gather for instructional lectures, a luncheon and a general college visit.

At 10:00 the delegates will meet in the physics building for a general program which will include lectures on up-to-the-minute problems and research in the physics world.

Gathering at the Union building at noon the physicists will have luncheon and will be entertained by the Laconia quartette, an organization whose popularity has recently put it on the air over the Detroit station, WJR.

The college has taken steps to entertain the delegates with a general tour of the campus and farms in the afternoon. Transportation will be afforded by farm wagons and teams. The horses will be decorated for the occasion and a two-hour trip is planned.

winning theme particular study. As each goes on to apply himself in the business and professional world he is indebted to his Alma Mater for the training he has received.

Again, drawing from the depths of the past, it was a practice in ancient days for the gods to send a deity to set forth on a journey or conquest to make some world that offering to his gods and to seek favors in their sight and their help and protection. From the school of Physical Education: Athletics for men, athletics for women, and dancing.

From the school of Applied Science: Chemistry and physics, mathematics, botany and bacteriology, and entomology.

From the school of Agriculture: Farming, fruit raising, horticulture, landscape, and forestry.

From the school of Engineering: Civil engineering and surveying, electrical engineering, mechanics, engineering and industry.

From the school of Home Economics: Clothing selection, millinery and design, textiles, food and dietetics, home arrangement, and child study.

From the school of Veterinary Science: Veterinary medicine and medical history. From the school of military science: national defense.

Each fraternity and sorority will have charge of one float. Troth has made detailed suggestions for each but the societies are free to emarge on them if they have a better plan.

Most of the carnivals of the past have lacked a unity that would make it appear to be closely connected. To overcome this the theme carries the plan to have one senior in cap and gown in each float. They will serve as a connecting link between floats that do not appear to be a part of the whole.

## KOBSMEN WALLOP MIAMI TEAM, 11-3, IN GAME FEATURED BY HEAVY HITTING OF SPARTANS

### Two Ohio Hurlers Pounded for 15 Safeties in Contest Here Friday; State Gains Revenge for Defeat Suffered on Southern Trip; Seek Tenth Victory.

OBERLIN COLLEGE in Ohio will send its baseball team here to appear on the local diamond Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock in the twelfth game of the home season for the Michigan State college nine. The Spartans will out to score their tenth win of the season.

Spartan bats rattled merrily Thursday afternoon when Coach John H. Kobs' hard-hitting State team smashed out an 11 to 3 victory over Miami university. The victory provided the Kobsmen with sweet revenge, as Miami eked out a win over State during the annual spring training trip.

The State diamond athletes collected 15 hits off the delivery of two Miami pitchers and went on a batting spree in the fourth inning to drive in six runs and practically decide the outcome of the game. "Little Pete" Bulloch went along steadily and although he allowed 10 singles, he was only in real difficulty once as he kept the bingles well scattered and received good support.

Sachs, Griffin Lead  
Six Spartans hit safely twice in the Miami game and Capt. Al Sachs and Charley Griffin shared hitting honors with two safeties in three official trips to the plate. Gibbs laced out a home run and some circus catching robbed him of two more almost certain extra-base bingles. Griffin and Jabber Barnard both got two-base hits.

Miami got away to a good start and scored one run in the first inning and threatened to tally again. Bullochno fled out to Gibbs with the bases full to pull Bulloch out of the only serious difficulty he encountered during the game. State retaliated neatly and counted one run in the last of the first when Gibbs drove out a home run into deep left field.

Both teams scored again in the second frame. The Ohio nine counted on a brace of singles and Madonia's error while Griffin doubled and Bulloch's single produced the tally.

Jones of Cornell set the former intercollegiate record at 4:14 in 1913.
