In the ninth gridiron contest between the two institutions, two new traditions will be established. Followers of the two elevens should remember that football games are won on the gridiron and not in visits following the game. The speaker was introduced by Prof. W. W. Johnston, head of the college English department, who is in charge of the course.



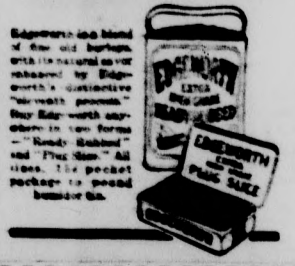

STEEL under the microscope

Burnished mirror-bright, etched in an acid-bath, a shiny square of steel is placed in the projector microscope in the metallography room at Crane laboratories.

To the layman, the texture disclosed is surprising as the filigree design of magnified snowflakes. Sometimes it is like a relief map of mountain ranges, sometimes like finely veined marble, sometimes like cumulous clouds.

But to the scientist in metals who judges it with a connoisseur's eye, the surface tells a far wider story. It discloses coarse uneven or beautiful fine grains, tells of disproportions and proportions of constituents in the alloy, speaks volumes concerning malleability, ductility, hardness . . . gives a key to action of the metal in service, all based upon knowledge of the product.

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Spartans to Meet Titans Saturday

STATE GIVEN CHANCE TO CLIMAX SEASON WITH WIN OVER HIGHLY TOUTED U. OF DETROIT ELEVEN

Best Green and White Football Team in Recent Years to Take Field Against Gus Dorais Invaders; Seat Sellout Is Certain.

WITH THE BEST FOOTBALL RECORD in many years behind them Coach Jimmy Crowley's rugged Spartans will attempt to add a fitting climax to the season's record by repelling the invading Titans in the Spartan stadium Saturday afternoon. The game with the University of Detroit promises to be one of the bitterest encounters ever waged between the two schools. Both teams have suffered defeat this year but they have also shown splendid courage and stamina in several classic encounters this season. Whatever the scoreboard says at the end of the game, both teams will know they have been in a struggle.

Assistant Director of Athletics Lyman L. Fridovich reports practically a complete sellout for the game with only a few pastboards calling for bleacher seats left. A big Detroit contingent is coming with the Doraismen and can be depended on to afford the Titans plenty of support. Many Spartan alumni will be returning to their Alma Mater to witness the season's finale.



Coach Crowley watched the men of Detroit give Marquette a hectic battle last Saturday in Milwaukee, the game ending in a narrow tie. The visit to the Wisconsin town greatly influenced the Spartan and mentor's attitude toward tomorrow's encounter. This week has seen long and strenuous practices on the field for his men and when they trot out on the field tomorrow they are going to give the visitors plenty to worry about.

The first part of the week saw Coach Crowley sending his men through some heavy scrimmage sessions. Every member of the line received plenty of exercise and the Spartan coach was not sparse with criticism if it was needed. Blocking was especially stressed and the Maroon forward wall should have to exhibit all their power if they with-

C. I. C. HARRIER RUN WILL BE HELD HERE

Chamberlain Should Win, but Stiff Competition is Assured Saturday.

Michigan State's cross-country team will wind up its 1936 season Saturday morning over the Spartan five-mile course, when several of the strongest teams in the mid-west come to East Lansing in an attempt to wrest the Central Intercollegiate crown from the Green and White harriers.

Entries have been received from State Normal, Butler University, Notre Dame University and Western State Normal. Based on records so far this season, indications are that the battle for the team title will be close. Michigan normal beat out Western State last week in the State Intercollegiate, State holds a dual victory over Butler, Butler defeated Notre Dame and Notre Dame in turn won from State.

Clark Chamberlain, State's best captain and newly-crowned National Intercollegiate champion, should win the event easily if he has sufficiently recovered from his grueling race of Monday. His principal challenger Saturday will be Roger Arnett, Michigan Normal captain who is also undefeated this year and at present holds the State Intercollegiate record. Arnett also set a new mark for the Spartan five-mile course last week.

Coach Mason will start six men in the race. Don Conrad, Earl Steimle, Stanley Frisbie, Don Price and other boys Elliott or Howard Galphouse will be Chamberlain's running mates.

The last few nights has seen the development of the Green and White aerial attack. "Big" Grove, Spartan quarter, tossed a goodly portion of the passes, but other members of the backfield were also given a chance at heaving the puskkin. Coach Crowley took special care in perfecting the Spartan defense against the Titan overhead attack. On several occasions the State mentor heaved the oval himself.

Crowley's exact lineup will not be known until his white-jerred warriors ramble on to the field tomorrow but there will be few exceptions from his regular lineup.

Jack Pace and Myron (Red) Vandenberg can see flankers from western Michigan are having a battle royal for the right end job. Both of them will probably be called on to play during the game, with the flaming haired Grand Rapids star having the starting edge.

Cecil Fogg will be in shape to function at top form on the left end of the line. Harold Bean, Fogg's solid man, was incapacitated this week and Louis Handley or possibly Pace may be switched to left end if Fogg's old injury gives trouble.

Don Butler and Ralph Brunette will be at their respective tackles and should combine the down-fallers, that the Spartan line will have period Claude Webb and Mill Gross will be at the guards with Budie Mason at the third position.

The Spartan attack will be led by "Big" Grove, Spartan quarterback, who will back up for the full time as a spare utility. Bob Margret is without a rival for left half and will end a year of brilliant gridiron feats for his college teammate. The right half job is the doubtful position with either Jerry Brown or Don Warren slated for duty. Brown has a slight edge but both may see service. Abe Kluwe will lead kick because his status as official line backer through the Kluwechase also may bring a chance to punt in some of his terrific passes at fullback.
