# Wolverine Starts Drive Wednesday

## Mass All-Time Winter Term Enrollment Peaks

### WINTER ENROLLMENT RECORD BROKEN AS LATE REGISTRATIONS PUSH TOTAL OVER 3,000 MARK

#### Classification Held Up by Failure of Students to Submit Cards to Class Officers; Divisions Report Quarter to One-Half Charges Still to Finish.

Michigan State college was shattered Monday night when it appeared that at least 3,000 students had registered. Of the total only 2,800 had paid fees, and approximately 700 to 800 of those registered had still to complete their entrance requirements. Winter term enrollment in 1930 reached its highest point at that time, coming in 1933. Fall term enrollment for the year totalled 3,113, only an average register over the Christmas vacation. Definite figures are out of the fees paid to the treasurer. It was estimated that 2,800 had completed the requirements of that department with an unusually large number of registrants going through the process.

### Announce Fischer Winner of Contest In M. S. C. Oratory

Gordon Fischer, 33, East Lansing, won the first prize in the Michigan State college oratorical contest held in the Peoples church on Dec. 14. His oration is entitled "Penology and Public Opinion." Clarence Von Lopik, 33, Grand Haven, was the second prize winner with his oration, "Enoch's Sin of Intemperance." Fischer will represent State college in the Michigan oratorical contest held at Albion in March. Von Lopik will alternate. According to Rex Wilkes, oratory coach, there is a possibility that one of these men will represent State in the National Pi Kappa Delta contest in April.

### Radio Relay Installed in Union

Installation of a radio system in the Union building was completed over the vacation period. It was announced today by Ray Riggs, Union manager. Broadcast of programs to all parts of the building is obtainable under the plan. A master set was installed in the Union lobby from which point programs are relayed to the soda grill, cafeteria, ballroom and second floor dining room. These loudspeakers with maximum capacity of being heard several blocks carry the broadcast, although they are capable of being tuned to a whistle.

### CROWLEY SIGNS NEW CONTRACT

#### Coach to Guide State's Grid Team Three More Years.

President Robert S. Shaw springs somewhat of a surprise at the annual football banquet held on the campus on Dec. 20 when he announced that James H. Crowley, Michigan State's successful head football coach, had signed a new three-year contract to guide the grid team at State in 1931, 1932 and 1933. This announcement contradicts the reports circulated around the campus last term to the effect that Michigan State might lose Coach Crowley.

Coach James H. Crowley, who jumped into the breach in the fall of 1929 to give State a solid season on the gridiron, followed Harry Kipke as head football coach at Michigan State in 1930, although handicapped early in the season. Jimmy Crowley led the Spartans to their first ever national championship in 1931, a year in which they were defeated by Notre Dame and eleven other schools.

### Announce Contest Deadline

Deadline for the competition being staged on the campus by the Union board to elect a student-writer librettist for the annual Union Opera has been set for Saturday, Jan. 10. It was announced today by Ray Riggs, Union manager.

Announcement was made during the fall term that the Union board had decided to ask Michigan State college students to submit librettos for the popular student opera for several years an outside writer, Kit Boleyn, stating that with the increasing success of the music and dramatic departments on this campus, and the growing student interest in these matters, the board offered to make the opera an all student written and directed affair.

Along with the discovery of a student written opera already on the campus, has come expressions of interest from other students who amplified their intentions of participating.

#### Many Notables Conduct Sessions During Eighteenth Annual Conclave.

County agricultural agents, home demonstration agents, 4-H club leaders, and specialists in the various fields of agricultural extension work gathered from all over Michigan to meet with their state leaders here Dec. 17, 18 and 19 for the 18th Annual Extension Conference.

During four days of lively general sessions the 1931 extension program was worked out in detail while several speeches by notables in agriculture and related fields served to focus attention on outstanding problems. Wednesday afternoon, Dec. 17, was devoted to group sessions of county agricultural agents, home economics extension workers and boys and girls club leaders.

In the afternoon session Dr. Herman Wynar, associate professor of economics, spoke on the business depression.

#### Has Support of Campus Officials and Organizations; Yearbook Editor to Speak Over Union Radio System Every Noon.

BEGINNING WEDNESDAY MORNING the Wolverine subscription drive will be launched by William Pratt, yearbook editor; Earle Stearns, business manager, and a staff of over fifty assistants to push the subscription list over the goal of 1,400. The intensive campaign will gain personal contact with every undergraduate in the student body during its ten day duration, with the co-operation of all the major campus organizations, Pres. R. S. Shaw, and the Michigan State Union. Every day at noon Pratt will speak for four minutes over the loud-speaker and amplifier system in the Union Memorial building, thereby creating an innovation in collegiate yearbook campaigns.

### A. W. S. EXTENDS ENTRY DEADLINE

#### Dormitory Name Contest Limit is Advanced Another Week.

Because students have shown so little interest in the contest to select a name for the women's dormitory which is now being constructed on West Michigan avenue, A. W. S., the organization sponsoring the competition, announced that the time limit would be extended to Monday afternoon, January 12. All suggestions must be in Dean Conroy's office before 5:00 o'clock on that date. Each contestant may enter any number of names which should be enclosed in an envelope with the contestant's name on the outside. All suggestions will be submitted to the State Board of Agriculture for the final choice.

The contest must be brought to a close as soon as possible so that the stone-cutters may begin work in the near future and the cost of this operation will be substantially increased if the name is withheld longer. In spite of the fact that A. W. S. is offering a prize of ten dollars for the winning name, students have shown little enthusiasm in the contest. Several lists of suggestions have been filed in the dean's office, but only two of these came from students, the rest were entered by various alumni.

### AG WEEK PLANS WELL UNDER WAY

#### Departmental Programs, Exhibits, Entertainments to Feature Yearly Event.

Plans for the annual Farmers' Week are rapidly progressing with the aim to have the largest and most successful one ever to be held on the campus. This year's event of which Dean J. F. Cox, of the agriculture department is chairman, and R. W. Tenny, head of the short courses is secretary, has been during the past years the highest ranking in attendance at any Farmers' Week throughout the country, and all indications are it will continue to be so.

This yearly event has been in existence for more than 20 years and is the largest, most important as meeting of the year for the farmers in Michigan. More than 30 agriculture groups and associations throughout the state will be represented.

The mornings throughout the week will be taken up with departmental programs on technical subjects, to be held in the rooms of the various buildings on the campus, including the home economics where talks for the farmers' wives will be given. General meetings for the farmers and wives will be held in the afternoons and evenings in demonstration hall and the gym for which many prominent speakers from all over the state and outside will be invited.

As usual exhibits on every phase of agriculture will be on display, all of the departments, taking part in demonstration hall, old army, as well as various other buildings. On Thursday night, Feb. 5, the largest program of the entire week will be given with a few short speeches. Last year 7,000 people attended this Thursday night program alone, setting a new record for attendance at one meeting.

### Sir Hubert Wilkins, Famed Explorer, Tells Students of Polar Adventures

Captain Sir Hubert Wilkins, noted adventurer and explorer gave the second in the series of lectures sponsored by the Liberal Arts board at the Peoples church, Thursday, Dec. 18. Wilkins' lecture was a story of his adventures in the Arctic and the Antarctic. He also spent a considerable time telling of his proposed trip to the North Pole in a submarine. Wilkins plans to start on this venture early next spring.

As a small boy in Australia Wilkins was aware of the irregularity in the weather. The long droughts coming without warning would often mean ruin to the Australian farmers and the loss of many thousands of dollars. Wilkins became interested in the weather. There was some way he thought in which these droughts could be forecast and the farmers saved much money. He realized that the weather conditions about the poles were responsible for the conditions in other parts of the globe. He therefore, decided to explore the land about both poles, and if possible, to put up weather stations at various points in the Arctic and Antarctic.

With this in mind, he joined William Stefansson in 1913 and made his first trip to the North Pole. This expedition lasted for five years. Wilkins returned to the Arctic in 1926, after having served in the war and as second in command of a British antarctic expedition. He encountered many difficulties, not the least among which was his inability to lift a tri-

### Insurance For College Athletes is Urged by Editor of College Humor

### MILITARY UNITS TO STUDY WAR TACTICS

#### To Specialize in Patrolling, Scouting, and Machine Gun Operation.

The military department starts a study of the finer arts of warfare this coming term. Colonel Dorsey R. Rodney plans to spend the greatest amount of time on military tactics and patrolling for all units. Cavalry freshmen, minus the riding "hall" for mounted training, will spend the term on the rifle range. The other units, with few exceptions, will spend their time on scouting and patrolling. Senior cavalrymen tackle military law while the senior infantrymen study field engineering. Juniors in the infantry division in particular will deal exclusively with the operation of machine guns.

The major event of the winter term for the military department is the military ball, Friday, Jan. 23. Sponsored by the officers club, this event is one of the highlights of the campus social season.

# State Quintet Scores Two Triumphs Over Christmas Holiday

## BRIGHAM YOUNG, OHIO WESLEYAN SCALPS TAKEN; WOLVERINES BEAT SPARTAN CAGERS AT ANN ARBOR

Strong Marquette Team to Appear Here Friday; is Expected to Provide Real Test for Van Alstyne's Team After Four Early Season Games.

THE most severe test of the season, especially first half of the schedule, looms for the Spartan basketball team this week when Marquette university sends its quintet to East Lansing Friday night. Coach Ben F. Van Alstyne's Michigan State basketball team won two of their three games played during the holiday season, turning back Brigham Young university and Ohio Wesleyan, but losing to the powerful University of Michigan team.

The Hilltoppers from Milwaukee, Wis., hold a 16 to 14 victory over Wisconsin in an early game and also defeated Brigham Young by a four-point margin. The game with Marquette will probably determine the possibilities of State's 1930-31 court combination and give Coach Van Alstyne some idea of what he can expect of his charges during the remainder of the season.

State's most recent basketball victory was scored over the Battling Bishops of Ohio Wesleyan Thursday night in Demonstration hall. The Spartans came through a bitterly contested rough-and-tumble game, with a final 25 to 17 victory. Twenty-two personal fouls were called during the game, 11 on each side. Wesleyan resorted to the slam-bang tactics early in the game and it was a case of the State basketballers having to use similar methods of play to combat the Bishops.

Wesleyan's shock troops started the game and grabbed a slim lead while the Spartans were getting accustomed to the feel of the new ball. State soon swung into action and went ahead. The Bishops' regulars were sent in after about the first five minutes of play, but State held the lead throughout the remainder of the game. The Ohio team was fairly successful with its tight zone defense in the first half and State was leading, 13 to 11, at the rest period.

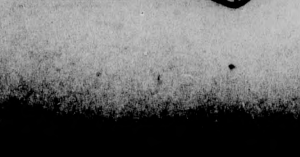
Uses Eleven Men

pre-conference schedule and is certain to be a much-fought contender for the Big Ten court championship.

One of the most impressive court combinations that developed at Michigan proved too much for the Spartans, who had obviously not found themselves so early in the season. The Wolverines took advantage of the fact that State was woefully off-stride and rolled up a 17 to 6 lead in the first half. The Spartans came back strong in the second half and out-scored Michigan 16 to 15, but were unable to overcome the early handicap.
