## COUNCIL HEARS MEETING REPORT

Carruthers and Ladd Review Business Taken Up at National Conclave.

Reports of the two Student Council representatives, President Douglas Carruthers and Vice-President Charles Ladd, who attended the National Students Federation of America at Atlanta, Georgia during the holiday vacation, was the major matter of business brought up before the Council at the first meeting of the term held Tuesday afternoon.

As a result of the discussions which took place at the southern convention from Dec. 2 to January 3, several improvements are expected to be worked out in the Michigan State Council of Organization. According to the State representatives, the conclave was attended by nearly three hundred delegates representing 15 of the leading divisions, regional and general meetings, more results in the sort of student interest.

Among the questions discussed was the matter of representation of faculty on the various student government organizations, the subsidization of the employment problem, and other matters of student interest.

Following the lead of the opinion expressed at the national conference, the Michigan State Council is considering the introduction of a change in representation. Because the Council has been hampered somewhat in recent years that worked out less of the membership year before, other colleges and universities have found it advisable to elect a few members for two or more years period which makes for a strong organization. The idea will be worked out here during the present term if possible.

Several other improvements such as faculty advisory aid, and closer harmony and co-operation between the women's and men's self government organizations, were brought up and will be considered at a later date. In order to discuss the problems of mutual interest for this term, the Student Council and Associated Women's Students group will have a joint banquet at the Union on Tuesday.

# Spartan Quintet Invades East To Play Colgate Twice

## ELEVEN CAGERS TAKEN ON TRIP; STATE HAD EASY TIME BEATING XAVIER QUINTET TUESDAY 32-19

Games With Maroons to Be Played Friday and Saturday Evenings; Art Haga Cops Individual Scoring Honors Against Musketeers; Last Half Comeback Wins



MICHIGAN STATE will invade the east tonight when Coach Ben Van Alstyne's Spartan quintet meets the powerful Colgate court combination at Hamilton, N. Y. Two games will be played with the Maroons, the second game being played Saturday night.

Last year was the first time the cage teams of the two schools met and the eastern team managed to eke out a one-point victory in a hectic battle, featured by unusual officiating. The final score was 36 to 35. Colgate has several veterans back from their last year's team which gave "The Flying Dutchmen" one of their rare setbacks.

The Spartans tonight will be on edge to avenge the defeat of last year and also to increase Maroon respect for State athletic teams in general. The Maroons will not soon forget what happened on a dismal day last fall when Len Macaulay, All-American fullback, and his cohorts went down to a bitter gridiron defeat, 14 to 7. The Spartan athlete who scored the first points against Andy Kerr's formidable 1936 grid machine will be seen on the Maroon court tonight. Fog Grove, versatile Spartan, will attempt to show eastern critics that a man can start in basketball as well as in football.

State's court squad left Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock on its eastern jaunt. The cagers will return Sunday afternoon, arriving at the Union depot about 1 o'clock. The players making the journey are Roger Grove, Dee Pinneo, John Gabe, Bernard Monte Holcomb, forwards; Art Haga, Ed Wayne, Scott, Alton Kitcher, William Vonholte, guards; Randy Boedkow, Gerald M. Caslin, John Wojtyla, centers; Robert Carrothers, manager.

Xavier university of Cincinnati, Ohio, furnished little opposition Tuesday night when State's court combination finally started to click and the Musketeers were routed to the tune of 32 to 19. After the first half Coach Van Alstyne's men had everything their own way and seldom lost possession of the ball. During the first half there were a few occasions when it looked as if the game might develop into a real battle, but the Musketeers were always training and the half ended with the count 17 to 12 in favor of State. The first half was featured by the basket shooting of Art Haga, who hooped in four field goals for a total of eight points. A couple of the shots were of the long lay kind, the variety the sleepy looking Muskegon star used to thrill the crowd with last year.

As in the Marquette game, the Spartans seemed to gain new life in the second period and Randy Boedkow snared a shut out in the first few records of play since the rest period. Haga then dropped in a charity shot to make the score 20 to 12.
