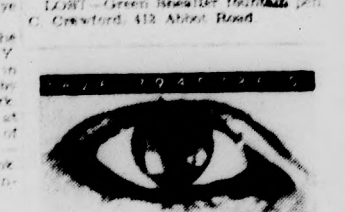

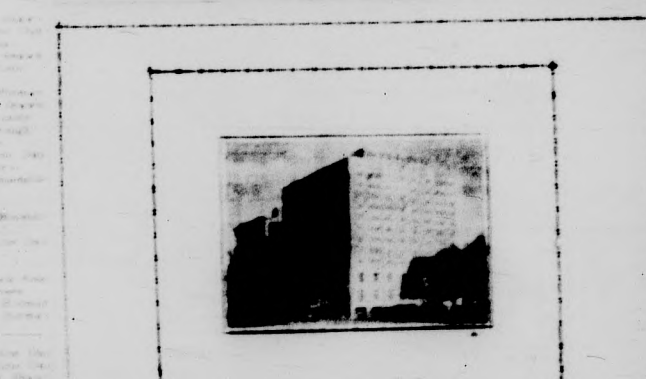

Spartans Wallop Colgate Twice

STATE PROVES SUPERIORITY OVER EASTERNERS ON COURT AS WELL AS ON GRIDIRON WITH DOUBLE WIN

Coach Van Alstyne's Athletes Return With Pair of Scalps Dangling From Belts After Invading Hamilton, N. Y.; Win 41-31 Friday and 50-30 Saturday.



COLGATE UNIVERSITY now has little doubt about the athletic prowess of Michigan State college, because on two successive evenings the court team of the eastern school was snowed under by the fast traveling Spartan quintet who administered the first trouncing Friday night, 41 to 31, and followed it up with another smashing victory Saturday night, 50 to 30. Coach Ben Van Alstyne and his victorious eagles returned Sunday afternoon from Hamilton, N. Y., feeling amply reprieved for the more or less odious defeat that was handed them in 1929 when the Maroons emerged with a one-point win after a hectic battle, the final score being 36 to 35.

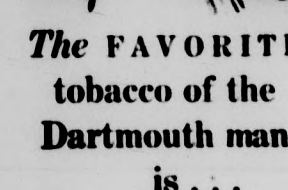
Friday evening State's eagles set a scoring record for the season by piling up 41 points, but they completely smashed that record the following evening when they literally played Coach Jordan's men off their feet to amass a total of 50 points. The outstanding stars of the first evening's encounter were Roger Grove, Spartan forward and Art Hagg, guard, who accounted for 12 and 11 points, respectively. On the next night the Spartan quintet had an even bigger scoring bonanza, collecting 50 points. Grove and Deo Pinner led for scoring honors with 14 points credited to each. The Maroon coach tried every combination he could muster in a desperate effort to check the surging Spartans.

Friday's game was the more thrilling of the two encounters from the spectators' standpoint. At half-time Coach Van Alstyne's men were trailing the eastern team by three points. The Spartans received their characteristic inspiration and helpful instruction during the rest period and came back to put the game in the bag with a comfortable margin soon after the second half opened. Alton Kiecher sophomore guard and Monte Holcomb second year forward also saw service in the closing minutes of play. Holcomb crashed through with six points as his evening's work.

Saturday night the Spartans came near wearing out the Maroon medals dropping the ball through them for repeated counters from all points of the floor.

Randy, Dee Score
The game had hardly gotten under way when Randy Boeckool, Spartan pivot man, slipped away from his man and dropped a shot over through the hoop. Deo Pinner, State half-back, eager anxious to prove stature, wasn't essential to point setting, then snared a ducer to add to Boeckool's counter giving State a 4 to 0 lead. The Maroons were completely baffled by the elusive Spartans and the scoreboard head 16 to 0 before the Colgate men had garnered a single point. State's attack was effective in long as well as in short shots, and the first period ended with Colgate trailing on the end of a 32 to 0 score.

At the second half the Maroon offense led by Anderson and Peckham functioned a little better and Coach Jordan's men cashed in on more scoring opportunities than in the first period. The Spartans, however, were never headed and State's court mentor allowed two of his reserves to get some action towards the end of the game. When the final gun barked State had 50 points to the 30 accumulated by the easterners.

SPARTAN SPORT SHOTS

WELCOMES SURPRISES

MICHIGAN STATE sprung a big but welcome surprise by turning back the highly touted Colgate university quintet twice on successive evenings during an eastern invasion over the weekend. The Spartans triumphs were even more gratifying because they were scored by safe margins of 16 and 20 points each.

Coach Ben Van Alstyne's eagles all went into a fast stride with the regular scoring freely. Pinner, midget forward, failed to tally from the court Friday evening, but came back strong and rang the bell five times with field goals in Saturday's game. Dee is showing a steady improvement and showing himself a valuable cog in Coach Van Alstyne's high powered basketball machine.

Colgate State's quintet had not been the form typical of last season's starting combination, many followers held their breath for the chances of victories in the east, especially in both games. A large number of fans would have welcomed an even break in the two tilt, but the double win is an important achievement.

COACH VAN ALSTYNE TOOK HIS 1930-31 COURT COMBINATION TO HAMILTON, N. Y. FOR TWO GAMES

Over the week-end Colgate is his Alma Mater and the Maroons eked out a slim victory in 1929, but the Spartans amply satisfied their mentor with their double victory this season and at the same time gained sweet revenge for the defeat suffered in the first meeting of court teams from the two schools. It was the third triumph of the college year which State sports teams have scored over Colgate. The football team administered the only defeat suffered by the Maroons, who won the championship of the east.

ROGER GROVE DOES SOME HEAVY SCORING

Over the two games played with Colgate over the week-end and displaced Art Hagg as the leader in individual scoring on the State basketball squad. The Spartan forward and captain now led his co-captain and guard by seven points. Grove accounted for 26 points in the two tilt with the Maroons, while Hagg scored 19, a creditable performance for a guard.

Deo Pinner, midget atom of Coach Van Alstyne's 1930-31 team, more firmly entrenched himself in third rank in scoring by chaffing up 16 points in the two eastern games.

Two Spartan Cinder Stars Achieve All-American Track Honor Roll

For the fifth time in six years of competition, Michigan State college has been honored by the inclusion of one or more of her athletes on the All-American honor roll in track, according to notes received recently by Coach Ralph H. Young from the office of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. Lauren Pringle Brown, last year's captain, and Clark S. Chamberlain the running mate and 1930 cross country leader, both attained the coveted honor for their brilliant individual performances in the two-mile run.

Brown's chance came in the indoor season last winter when he rounded the boards at the University of the National Collegiate Athletic Association for a new indoor record of 9:12. Chamberlain, ineligible during the indoor meets, proved himself a distance runner of All-American caliber during the outdoor season when he outran the field at the Central Intercollegiate in Milwaukee to set a new state meet and vastly record of 9:32 flat.

Each year the National Collegiate Athletic Association picks the five best performances turned in by any winning event, and includes these men in its honor roll. Since 1925 the sophomore year of Freddie Alderman, State's lone Olympic star, Spartan athletes have been named fifteen times on this list. Alderman was mentioned in both the 220 and 100 yard dashes in 1925, 1926 and 1927. In 1927 he also placed in the 440 and as a member of State's famous 880 relay team. The other members of that team were Lyle Harrison, Bohm, O'Brien and Purcell. Lane in 1928 under Mori Mason's instruction, two Spartan distance men took their places in tracks private hall of fame when Henry Wylie ran a 4:22 mile in the Central Intercollegiate meet and Brown turned in a time of 9:37.5 for the two-mile in the same meet.

The year 1929 was a barren one as far as official recognition for performances is concerned. However in the National A. A. U. meet at Denver following the close of school Harold McAtee, pole-vaulter 13 feet nine inches a height that would have won him a place on the mythical squad had he done it in college competition. In 1929 also Brown ran what was probably the fastest two-mile of his career at the I. C. A. A. A. meet. He was clocked by Mason in 9:26 but inasmuch as he failed to take first place his time was not considered in the final check-up.

STATE SEXTET MEETS DEFEAT

Detroit Puck Chasers Outclass Spartan Hockey Team Saturday

Michigan State pucksters went down to their first defeat of the season Saturday afternoon when Haley's A. C. Detroit took them down the line for the count of 4 to 1.
