Records Tumble in Annual Michigan Relay Carnival at Gym

CREAM OF COLLEGIATE TRACK CROP KNOCKS PROPS FROM UNDER SEVEN MARKS SET HERE IN PAST MEETINGS

Spartan Freshmen Half-Milers Set New Record. While Barnhill of Western State, State Normal Fresh, Schrier of Western State, and State's Own Chamberlain Come in On Slashing.

MICHIGAN'S collegiate track talent ran wild in the annual Relay Carnival at the gymnasium Saturday afternoon and evening, and when the wreckage was sifted seven of the old marks had gone where all good records eventually go, into the ash heap.

Kenneth Barnhill, Western State's Garantuan shot-putter, showed the brass marble 46 feet 2 1/2 inches, almost two feet past the carnival and gymnasium mark held jointly by himself and Jack Lovette of the University of Michigan, in the initial event of the day. He did this, how-

ever, after the real event was over. He was handicapped in the actual competition by the proximity of the running track to the putting ring. Once he started the spectators by heaving the 16-pound weight up on the track itself. Following the end of the event, the course was reversed, and the stocks Hilltoppers made his record loss on the third attempt.

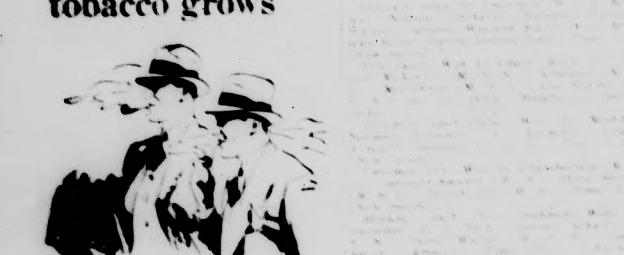

Marquette again took the lead early in the overtime period but Scott and Haga cashed in their three free goals to give the Spartans a 21-18 lead at the close.
