### Star Spartan Fencer Awarded Major Letter; Honor Five Others

For the first time in the history of the sport at Michigan State a fencer has been awarded a major letter. It was a recognition of a spectacular record that has extended over a three-year period of competition. The athletic council has awarded George L. Bauer a senior from Hastings, the major "S."

Bauer has compiled an unusual record. He won 64 bouts while losing only 21 in three seasons. During the campaign which just closed Bauer was victor in 15 out of 21 bouts with opponents from Big Ten institutions. He won 10 from Northwestern University opponents and four each from Michigan and Chicago fencers.

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### THE VOCATIONAL IDEAL IN COLLEGE

Washington State Evergreen

According to Morris M. Proffitt, consultant for the United States office of education, American college professors fail to give proper attention to the social and professional value their subjects occupy in the practical life of the nation. Hence, they scantily educate to students in quest of employment after graduation.

He says further that thousands of students graduate from institutions throughout the country only to be bewildered in trying to find a means of earning a living.

Professors year in and year out teach "orthodox" courses falling within specified fields and the students are encouraged to take them after graduation. They can fall or survive and far beyond.

The trouble lies with professors who do not inform themselves on the occupational demands of the subjects they are teaching.

Students are being taught subject after subject in fields in which there is already an overflow. A little vocational guidance or even some friendly advice by teachers as to employment conditions in various fields would save many a young man or woman from spending several years acquiring a skill for which there is no practical demand.

NEVADA GOES "OLD WEST"

Nevada has apparently set its heart on being a wide open state with the enactment of new low percentage open gambling and obtaining of divorces in six weeks.

Recently Governor Fred B. Balzar signed the new gambling bill which merely made legal those practices which had been going on in the nominal cover of years. His signature on the bill was the signal for an unbridled patronage of the gambling resorts rather than the inauguration of new ones.

At the principal gambling resort in Reno hundreds played and strolled about the roulette wheels, faro tables, mechanical dice throwing and other gambling games. The hum and hubbub of gambling machines and poker chips was broken only by the staccato voice of an air drill which was employed in cutting through massive stone, brick and mortar walls to enlarge the gaming room.

Dozens of other so-called "speakeasies" where divorces and others play in an atmosphere of recreation and a measure of "excitement" enjoyed generous patronage under the new law.

On top of the new 42 day divorce law this later statute marks another step in Nevada's bid for popularity in the nation. Will other states follow or auto Nevada? If so, what will Nevada do to remain attention.

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#### TEACHER VS. EDUCATION

Dean Alexander Meiklejohn of the Experimental College of the University of Wisconsin announces that he is ready to terminate the novel institution at the close of this academic year. After five years of existence to give the authorities a chance to assess the value of his work.

He assumed the original reputation of a "radical" and effective teacher of philosophy at Brown University. He resigned this position to assume the presidency of Amherst college. There the conservative members of the faculty opposed Meiklejohn's innovations and after six years his appointment as president was rescinded in the spring of 1937.

A Wisconsin Dean Meiklejohn was given charge of an experimental college composed of a selected group taught intimately by a carefully chosen corps of instructors.

The curriculum was unique. In the freshman year students were taught scientific and technical subjects on the basis of their own interests and needs. Then they were turned back into the regular curriculum and pedagogical methods which were typical of an usual insight into our present civilization and how we had attained it.

From the standpoint of intellectual attainment the experiment proved a success. But the experiment was never a success as a university endeavor. At Amherst Meiklejohn was criticized for his lack of traditional scholarship and departmental responsibilities had been dominated by the chief lesson is that not all of our education should be in the hands of a few men.

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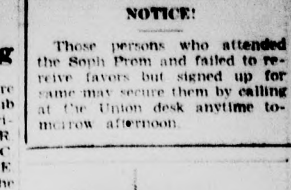

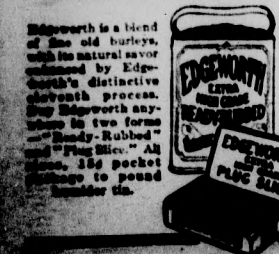
