Inter-Fraternity Council Considers Taking Over Publication of Handbook.

Discussion of the advisability of publishing the next Freshman Handbook and suggestions on the financing of the scheme in case they are adopted, were the main items on the agenda of the Inter-Frataternity Council's regular meeting last night in the Student Council room.

Because of the fact that handbooks up to date have not given new-comers to the campus enough material on fraternities, societies, and the general social life of the college, the council decided that some action should be taken to secure a better understanding of it through this medium.

Delayed rushing plans will also be furthered if the proposed handbook is given some information on the subject and put into the hands of their eyes only.

The Council intends to seek the cooperation of the societies in publishing the Bible. It is hoped that the delay a proportionate amount of the expense. It will involve a fair amount of the time devoted to other activities.

The financial problem of publishing the handbook was also discussed when Jack Pappas, chairman of the Inter-Frataternity Council, submitted his report. It was stated that expenditures of \$1000 had been placed in the hands of the societies and will continue to be collected for the handbook. The local chapter expressed itself as being pleased with the manner in which this worked out and they will continue the policy in future years.

NEW TYPE TEST RECOMMENDED

U. Prof. Sees "Comprehensive Method" for American Colleges.

A new type of test for college students has been suggested by Prof. W. H. Clegg of Brown University. He calls for "comprehensive examinations by referring to books."

The comprehensive system suggested goes to his college build, a certain day, draws a slip from a box in which he finds the subject within the field of knowledge. He must return 24 hours later with a complete report on the subject. It must be an adequate bibliography of material that he may select, and a personal treatment of the subject matter.

Topics are chosen so that the student is hopeless for the student and has possession of an adequate and data. This new method of quizzes is expected to reduce the mental strain that is caused at present among students during the final examination period.

This system is now in use in many universities and has met with wide approval from every student and instructor alike. Prof. Clegg is of the opinion that comprehensive examinations would be a boon to all American colleges and he heartily recommends its adoption.
