WESTERN STATE TEACHERS' COLLEGE of Kalamazoo will furnish the opposition for the Michigan State college baseball team this week. Coach John H. Kobs will pit his diamond combination against what is expected to be the stiffest competition of the home season to date in the game with the Teachers on Old College Field Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

The pitching assignment was undecided Friday, but either Charley Griffin or Harris (Jumbo) Kahl will do the pitching. In view of his performance in turning back Central State Teachers' college last Saturday, Griffin will have the edge to receive the starting call. His port-side flipper was in splendid condition last week and if he is in his usual good form he should be able to silence the Western State bats very effectively. Kahl's slants were working well against Michigan Normal of Ypsilanti two weeks ago and the big right-hander should be able to handle the assignment Saturday.

JAPANESE TEAM BEST IN COUNTRY

The Japanese are here for games on May 11 and 12.

Yearling Thinclads Maintain Wide Margin of Points Over Sophomore Runners-up.

LAFAYETTE COPS LEAD

With four events yet to be held Michigan State's freshman track team now stands in a position to run away with the honors that have been theirs so far in their college career by piling up 49 1/2 points to lead their interclass rivals in the interclass meet this week at the stadium. The sophomores with 27 1/2 points are second, and the juniors and seniors are trailing with 23 1/2 and 19 points respectively. Kenneth Lafayette, Jr. leads the pack with a double win in the dashes for ten points, had passed by Bob Kibby, Jr. who has three second places to his credit, both dashes and the broad jump, and Stan Oswald, Sr., with a win in the 100-yard dash and a second in the 200-yard dash.

Norman Smith, Sr., topped the high jump with a leap of five feet eight inches. Cliff Liberty took the high hurdles, Rex Steele the low hurdles, and Monte Holcomb the pole vault to account for the rest of the sophomores' first places. Among the freshmen Dittich in the broad jump and Beaumont in the javelin were the only first place winners. Buss Pfug contributed the only win in the shot put and Stan Oswald won the ducts for the seniors with a heave of 112 feet 8 inches.

The remainder of the events of the program, the mile relay, the half mile and the two mile will be run off next week after the Ohio relays.

Both teams will play two engagements this week. The tennis crew goes to Michigan for a match Friday and to Ypsilanti for a tilt with Michigan Normal Saturday. Philip Dune had a collection of players that averaged below 75 for the day while Michigan's team was almost as good. Howard Mauer of Battle Creek remains the only Spartan to win points. He shot a 74 to win Michigan's only points against Michigan Normal.

Gandhi from childhood was taught the doctrine of non-resistance which can be put as I will not strike anything, I will not kill anything that has life, I will not cooperate with the enemy by resisting their attacks.

At 19 Gandhi went to England for an education. At 26 he graduated with a law degree and joined a firm of English-Indian lawyers. With this firm he had an opportunity to go into South Africa and use his influence in matters strikes. There he first put into practice his non-resistance policy. He was successful.

When still a young man he met Count Tolstoy, a Russian idealist, and instilled with Tolstoy's idealism and his own policy of battling oppression with the weapons of peace he was able to get the idea into the minds of his fellow citizens. The struggle with England which has just ended reflects the value of such resistance, according to Dr. Fisher. Fisher attributed the success of Gandhi to his ability to think and also to his voice. His voice very deep for such a small man, has a strange quality that attracts and holds one's attention. Success depends very much on his voice.

The lecture was well delivered by Dr. Fisher. He was very informal and has a good voice that added effectively to the lecture. The crowd was unusually small.
