Functions of "Y" for Next Year to Be Increased

New Program of Innovations Planned at Waldenwoods Retreat.

At the annual retreat for program organization for the coming year, May 23 and 24, the local Y. M. C. A. incorporated some innovations for the schedule to be followed out in the fall. Deputations under the supervision of Richard Holland, 33, will include more work in dramatic production than has heretofore been the case. Trips will be made to Lansing and nearby churches, according to Rev. Norman W. Kunkel following the retreat at Waldenwoods, near Brighton on Saturday and Sunday.

Publicity will be handled by Newell Hart, 33, with a view for greater success along that line.

Gordon Fischer, 33, head of the committee in charge of Freshman Week in the fall, cites five items decided upon at the business meeting. An information booth on the campus and one in the Union; a freshman mixer cooperating with the Y. W. C. A.; a stag party out-of-dots; freshman visitation and two weeks' membership drive; and a come-to-church Sunday on October 18.

Discussion of current campus problems will be held at mid-week program meetings of which William Cooper, 33, is committee head. Several of these group meetings are scheduled for fall term, and eight for winter term.

Student-faculty friendship groups will be under the direction of Walter Scott, 33. These get-acquainted meetings at the homes of faculty people are seven in number to be distributed: two in the fall; 4 in the winter; and 1 in the spring.

Ray McMullen, 34, heads the committee in charge of social service and hotel work. This committee also furnishes the entertainment for one Fun Nite program each term.

Pertinent Bits of Historical Information About Michigan State College.

Abbot hall was built in 1888 and named after President Abbot. From 1884 to 1896 it was used as a men's dormitory. In 1896 the first home economics course was started here and from then until 1899 it was used as a women's dormitory. For about 15 years after that it was used for men again. Since the World War it has been inhabited by women.

Before adequate drainage was installed, the baseball field was flooded each spring and the home games had to be played on fields in Lansing.

When the college was founded, Lansing consisted of three parts, upper, middle and lower. The distances and partition woods between them were sufficient to make them distinct towns.

Lansing had no railroads when the college was in its infancy. The nearest were the Detroit and Milwaukee at St. Johns and the Michigan at Jackson.

One of the pastimes of the boys in so many years ago was to decorate the spruce trees on the campus with toilet paper just before Christmas.

The college hospital was built in 1874 and was used as the president's home for many years.

Narrow Mindedness

It is an old saying that there are two sides to everything. It is also true that the same side of a question can be viewed in several different ways. And it is as any college student soon finds out, also possible to say the same thing in the same way from the same point of view many different times.

This latter method of presentation is that adopted by all too many of the professors at our dear old Alma Mater. Not content with saying a thing in lecture, the professor will be viewed in a textbook can be made about the same thing as written by him in a textbook. Just what reason he has for this is hard to guess. In his lectures he delves into the ramifications of the subject, investigating as many as possible and studying as thoroughly as possible those which are selected. No matter how many of these ramifications he may take up, there must always be more which he left unthought of. In spite of this vast ground which must necessarily be left unexplored by the lecturer it is not unusual to assign some material of the lectures and have the same say and in similar words. Some courses go so far as to say a thing in lecture explain it again in a recitation section and then assign it again as reading. Somehow instructors always manage to give examinations which are not nearly enough so that it is necessary to have all three present, not well learned in order to obtain a satisfactory grade.

There is but one possible justification for the repetition of nearly the identical thing, perhaps it is a misnomer to call that a possible justification. Pedagogy is certainly the sole justification. But a pedagogical method which is merely repetition is only worthy of contempt when it is employed in education. If repetition is ever called for in the college student, it is only in the lower steps of education.

Is College Liberalism Dead?

After lamenting the fact that college liberalism has ceased to exist, and that university men are becoming "collared conservatives," Will Hale, Hays, in the New Republic, makes the following suggestion:

It should be the duty of the university heads themselves to introduce provocative and controversial lectures. Of course the capitalistic trusts and corporations which dominate the scene are averse to an such dangerous experiments, but they are frightened by any of the other "isms" which are such barbeds in most peoples' minds.

Such a course of lectures would not contaminate the minds of the students, but they might stimulate in a few more of them a thought or two which would be a real service to humanity. College authorities need not be afraid of the bugbear of the "isms" and they could properly welcome a few radicals as they have sometimes done in the past, who could present ideas to counteract that set conservatism which leads to the blind acceptance of the status quo and a kind of social and intellectual stagnation.

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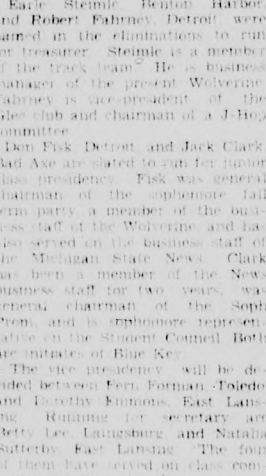

State Nine Defeats Michigan, 8-4; Goes On Road

KOBSMEN HAVE NO DIFFICULTY IN DOWNING WOLVERINE TEAM IN FIRST CONTEST OF SEASON

Spartans Journey Into Illinois; Meet University of Chicago Tuesday and Northwestern University Wednesday; Both Teams Certain to Provide Tough Opposition.

THE MICHIGAN STATE BASEBALL TEAM is on the road for the first part of the week to play two more Western Conference teams after trouncing the University of Michigan, a Big Ten foe and bitter rival of the Spartans, 8 to 4, here Saturday afternoon. Coach John H. Kobs and his Spartan stickers invaded the Windy City for a game with the University of Chicago Tuesday and Wednesday will journey to Evanston for a tilt with Northwestern University.

The Maroons of Chicago were one of three teams to beat the State nine last season. The Spartans beat Chicago here early in the season, but dropped a foreign game played on a muddy field later in the year.

BUSS WINS AWARD AS FOOTBALL MAN

Benton Harbor Freshman Grid Star Outstanding Spring Prospect.

Arthur Buss, Benton Harbor, has been named the most improved football player at M. S. C. The yearling tackle won the honor awarded by the staff of coaches and will receive a gold watch. Buss weighs 200 pounds, stands six feet and showed amazing improvement in form during the spring football practice. He performed at the tackle post that was left vacant by Don Ridler, one of the stars on the Spartans' fine line last fall.

Buss is also a bright prospect as a weight man on the freshman track team. He specializes in the discus where he is credited with an unofficial heave of 132 feet this spring.

Unbalanced temporarily, Griffin walked. Captain Tompkins, forcing in a run. Superko scored when Hudson forced Tompkins on a ground ball hit to Madonna. Duffley peeled a triple off Griffin's delivery scoring two more runs. The rally ended when Kieglar threw out Duffley at the plate on a ground ball hit by Daniels and Moadie rolled out to the box.

The Spartans aroused by having their lead cut to one run scored two off Kieglar in their half of the same inning.

Ehowitz opened with a double to left. Kieglar singled to right. Ehowitz stopping at third. Kieglar stole bases with nobody out. 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Clark Chamberlain Lowers Record In Two Mile Run

SPARTAN THINCLAD CONSIDERED AS OLYMPIC PROSPECT BECAUSE OF SPLENDID RUNNING IN C. I. C.

Crack Distance Athlete Comes Within 9 10 of a Second of Ancient Best Mark for His Favorite Event; Green and White Team Forced to Accept Third Place at Milwaukee.

LED BY CLARK CHAMBERLAIN, Michigan State's first Olympic hope since Freddie Alderman, the Spartan track team made a valiant battle for second place in the annual Central Intercollegiate meet at Milwaukee Friday night, but were finally forced to be content with third place and 32 1/2 points, behind Notre Dame and Marquette. The Ramblers piled up 48 points, either winning or placing in all the events except the mile and pole vault. Marquette had 37 1/2 points, Butler 27, and University of Detroit 8.

Chamberlain came within nine-tenths of a second of the American college record in the two-mile run, a mark that has stood since 1912. With practically no competition Clark ran the distance in 9:18.7, lowering his own C. I. C. mark by more than 13 seconds, for the fastest two-mile run this year in intercollegiate track. This marks the second time within a week that he has turned in a performance of this type, his mark of 4:16.8 in the mile against Ray Swartz in the State meet last week being also the best mile run this year in America.

NOTRE DAME TO PLAY SPARTANS MEMORIAL DAY

Kobsmen Play at Chicago Today; Meet Northwestern Wednesday.

Notre Dame university, an ancient baseball rival of Michigan State, will send its team here Saturday for the first of the annual home and home series with the Spartan nine. The game is to be a feature of the Memorial Day sports program that also includes the R. O. T. C. horse show.

Coach John Kobs took his team to Chicago for a pair of games Tuesday and Wednesday. The Spartans were billed for a game with Chicago Tuesday afternoon and with Northwestern Wednesday afternoon. Victorious over Michigan by an 8 to 4 score here last Saturday in the first taste of western conference competition, the Kobsmen were hopeful of adding further laurels to their growing collection in the two-day stay in Chicago and will be back here Saturday to give the home fans a treat in the struggle with the Irish.

Wendell Knisel, the Bluefield senior, has again popped back into the third base picture. He played the hot corner against Michigan in a fashion that was entirely approved by Coach Kobs. His return to the infield sent Capt. Edward Gibbs back to the old center field berth, a place where he feels very much at home. Knisel handled every chance in the Michigan game without a slip, turning in two nice pieces of fielding and made a couple of throws that pulled the Spartans out of trouble.

Charlie Griffin the Shelby junior who made a brilliant record last spring as a sophomore, seems in a fair way to duplicate his performance this autumn. Griffin twice defeated Michigan last year and added the third Wolverine belt to his collection here last Saturday. He allowed Michigan only seven hits. It is probable that he will set the call next Saturday against Notre Dame, another team that he turned back twice in 1930.

This unique idea is to be carried out very cleverly both in the decorations and in the program. The ballroom will be transformed into the deck of a ship on which the passengers raty sail.
