State Nine Plays Irish In Foreign Tilt Saturday

KOBSMEN LOSE TO HOOSIERS IN RAGGED DIAMOND CONTEST STAGED HERE TUESDAY, 6 TO 3

Spartans Make Seven Errors to Contribute to Triumph for Indiana; Gain Even Break in Two Games; Captain Gibbs Leads Hitters With Homer and Two Singles.

MICHIGAN STATE'S BASEBALL TEAM will not make another home appearance until June 20, when the University of Michigan team plays here again in the third game of the Spartan-Wolverine diamond series. In the meantime, the Kobsmen will play four games on the road, meeting Notre Dame university at South Bend, Ind., Saturday, Western State Teachers college, Kalamazoo, Michigan State Normal college at Ypsilanti, and the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor. All of these are certain to be bitterly contested games, and the Spartans must win the last three to have a claim to the Michigan collegiate baseball championship for the second year.

Coach John H. Kobs' team did not fare so well in competition this week. State's nine played two loose games with the University of Indiana and won the tilt Monday, 10 to 9, but was not so fortunate Tuesday and lost, 6 to 3. The Spartan stickers won from the Hoosiers Monday largely through the visitors' errors, and bobbles by State players played a big part in Indiana's victory Tuesday.

The pitching of youthful "Red" Wright gave Indiana a good start toward a victory, but even his good hurling would probably not have yielded a victory for his team if it had not been for Spartan bobbles. Wright limited State to eight hits, which were scattered over five innings.

Harris Jumbo Kahl, senior right hander who pitched for State, gave up 11 hits and might have gotten by with a victory except for the ragged support which he received. The Spartans went to pieces completely and bobbled seven times, and usually in crucial moments when misplays meant runs for the Hoosiers. The failure of Coach Kobs, usually reliable keystone combination to perform capably, and the failure of "Jabber" Barnard, Spartan catcher, to play his regular strong game were important contributing factors to State's defeat.

Rain so far has made play almost impossible although some of the preliminaries were run off yesterday on the courts down town.

FRESHMEN GAIN MORE LAURELS ON CINDER PATH

Yearling Track Team Pleases Coach Young During Past Season.

A freshman track team that Coach Ralph H. Young sees bearing more than the usual amount of varsity material is representing Michigan State college this spring. The Spartans' 2300 ft. relay team, consisting of highly successful season, defeating Alma college varsity and freshmen and trimming Adrian college in the only actual race staged. They will engage in a 1000 ft. relay meet with Marquette university over the weekend by way of closing out the season.

The team boasts no brilliant individual prospects, counting its strength on balance. Coach Young's youngsters have established seven new freshman records during the season, a very commendable performance. They set up new marks in three relays and four individual events.

Arthur Buss, Benton Harbor freshman who was awarded a gold watch for being the most improved football player in spring practice, has heaved the discus out to a record of 131 ft. 1 in. to beat the mark of 121 ft. 6 in. that was held by Melvin Pflug, present varsity athlete. Wesley Hard and Otto Pongrace, Detroit pair, ran a dead heat in the mile to create a record of 4:31, beating the mark of 4:32.8 owned by Rossen and Swanson of other years.

ADRIAN SWAMPED BY STATE FROSH

Buss Is High Scorer of Day, Winning Firsts in Two Events.

Four meet records were lowered, one was equalled and three freshman records were broken Monday night at the stadium as Michigan State's redoubtable freshman tracksters took down their time-honored Adrian college rivals by a score of 115 to 16.

Buss, the Spartan Yearlings' stellar weight man, ran off with first place in the shotput and the discus, and was third in the javelin for a total of eleven points to be high scorer of the day. Heffner won both hurdle races, picking up ten points, and Keast collected nine in the dashes.

Meet records were broken in the 880 by Griffith of Adrian, who turned in a time of 1:58.1, in the mile by Hurd and Pongrace, who tied at 4:31.1, in the discus by Buss with a heave of 123 feet 4 1/2 inches, and in the mile relay by Murphy, Hovey, Keast and Ryan. The mile relay marks were also also freshman records.

Ken Warren, taking second in the 6, turned in a time of 1:59.5, which broke the previous freshman standard for this distance.

CHAMBERLAIN GETS CHANCE TO REGAIN HONORS

Slim Distance Runner to Be Pitted Against Cinder Stars of Midwest.

When Clark Chamberlain takes his marks in the two-mile run at Chicago Saturday in the National Collegiate meet, he will be one of four men who are writing "final" to their out-door track careers at Michigan State. Chamberlain left, but for three of them, Kenneth Yarger, Robert Olson, and Robert Russell, it is the end of their intercollegiate sports trail.

Kenneth Yarger, one of the greatest hurdlers ever to wear the Spartan colors, will be seeking one last victory in his favorite event, the high hurdles. Twice winner of the State Intercollegiate and Central Intercollegiate crowns, present holder of the varsity record of 1:52, and the strongest cog in the shuttle-hurdle relay team that recently pushed Ohio State to a new world's record, "Ken" has been a consistent performer all through his varsity career depending on sheer excellence of form for his success, rather than any exceptional speed.

Bob Russell, probably Yarger's closest competitor in four years of hurdling both as a freshman and varsity performer, is co-holder with Clifford Liberty of the 220 low-hurdle record of 24.5, established in the State Intercollegiate a few weeks ago. When he takes his place in the line Saturday with America's best low hurdlers, he will be bringing to a close another track record that has meant a lot of much-needed points for State teams.

Bob Olson, co-captain of the 1931 team with Chamberlain, will be out to make a final bid for the Spartans in the pole vault. With a vault of thirteen feet in the State meet to his credit, he is expected to rank high in this competition Saturday. If he has a good day, he should be up with the leaders. Olson again has been a very consistent point-winner, and usually a first-place winner during his three varsity years.
