MICHIGAN STATE TO PRESENT STRONGEST LINEUP IN BATTLE WITH WOLVERINES TOMORROW

Traditional Football Classic Expected to Draw Largest Crowd in History: Fane and Hands on Starting Team Which Will Attempt to Stop Powerful Maize and Blue

Keved to a fighting pitch, Michigan State's football team left at 1:30 this afternoon for Ann Arbor where the final workout in preparation for the game with Michigan is to be staged in the Wolverine's big bowl. Coach James H. Crowley took a squad of 28 players, all that he has an uniform to the Michigan gridiron.

With four days of hard work behind them, the Spartans have only a light practice on their hands this afternoon and will do little except runs through signals and change in kicking and forward pass work in the bowl. With their exercise completed they will retire to Ypsilanti to remain until near game time Saturday afternoon.

FROSH DEFEAT OTHER CLASSES IN ANNUAL RUN

Take Lead Over Juniors With 57 Points to 36; Sophs are Third

Michigan State's freshman track team showed a fine total of 57 points to win easily over their opponents in the annual intercollegiate track meet held this week at the Spartan stadium.

The Juniors with 36 points were second, followed by the Sophomores with 25 points. The Seniors were not represented in the scoring.

The individual honors of the meet went to Hoff of the Spartans, who accounted for nearly half of his team's points by winning first in the three dashes, second in the two hurdles, and third in the high jump and shot for a total of 25 points. Kienbock was high point man for the Juniors with firsts in the high jump and discus, a second in the shot put and a fourth in the broad jump for a total of 14 points.

Serie also topped the high and low hurdles, while his classmate Aurand won the pole vault. Falcenter in the javelin, and Sandstrom in the broad jump were the only sophomore first place winners. TenEyck gave the freshmen a win in the shot put while Otrey in the two mile run.

The meet marked the end of fall term practice for both varsity and freshmen teams. Coach Young believes that a rest until the start of the winter term will prove valuable.
